

Cleveland Topples Tornado Quint 55-52 Franklin Downs Cavemen

Was turned about and the metropolitans turned at Cleveland and Franklin high schools of the Portland Interscholastic League, bounced Southern Oregon Conference opposition at Grants Pass last night to break even in their two-day double feature in the Oregon River valley.

Cleveland's upward-swinging Indians surprised most of the spectators by upsetting Medford 55 to 52 after having lost a 68 to 52 verdict to Grants Pass here on Wednesday. Franklin, however, was true to form with a 57 to 46 triumph over the Grants Pass Cavemen.

The Quakers with elongated Bjorne Jensen had the favored role despite a 68 to 53 loss to Medford on Wednesday.

The Indians of the Oregon metropolis spilled Medford's Black Tornado hoopers by outplaying them and outshooting them well into the third quarter and by jumping back in front and hanging on after being overtaken in the final stanza. Franklin found the Cavemen down at the start but pushed into command in the second period after trailing in the first quarter. The Quaker's 6-foot-9-inch Bjorne Jensen didn't become effective until that second stanza.

Springer Shines

The terrific rebounding of Hugo Springer, the shooting of Dave Roark and Springer, a tough defense which gave Medford few good shots and Medford inability to connect when it did get opportunities were factors which enabled Cleveland to grab a substantial early lead over the Tornado.

Cleveland headed the Medford quint 17 to 11 at the quarter and was on top 34 to 14 at half-time after several 12-point second quarter margins. The Tribe pushed to 40 to 26 in the third panel and then to 45 to 31 before the Tornado, finally warmed to the task, blew up a gale which almost turned seeming defeat into victory.

Medford's big rally was spurred by the point making of Bob Tisdell and Dick McLaughlin and by the ballhawking of Tisdell, Lloyd Cearley and Larry Perkins. The Tornado cut his deficit to 41 to 49 by the close of the third stanza and in the fourth poured in 11 complete whistles holding Cleveland to two, to hop on top for the second time in the ball game, 52 to 51, with a bit more than three minutes yet to play.

Tornado Stalls

Tisdell scored eight points in the 21-point four-quarter surge, McLaughlin seven and John Foust, Perkins and Cearley each two. Two free shots by McLaughlin gave Medford the lead after Perkins had sunk a fielder for a steal.

Medford went into a shell after getting ahead, aiming for a sure shot if it was to attempt to score again. But the ball was lost out of bounds. Cleveland was quick to take advantage and led in close to Rod Simonsen whose shot made it 53 to 52 with 1:30 to play. It was the Tribe's turn to control the ball and it padded its score with a pair of free shots by Tom Ballen on fouls by Gary Riley.

Tulsans Win All-College Tournament

Tulsa grabbed the spotlight in basketball's holiday tournament circuit today, bidding for national honors by capturing the championship in the All-College Tournament—the same title that catapulted San Francisco to recognition a year ago.

The Golden Hurricane's 65-58 conquest of Oklahoma City in the only major final round of a tourney Thursday night overshadowed brilliant performances by such power teams as North Carolina, Utah, West Virginia, and Stanford.

Victory in this tourney, the nation's oldest, gave Tulsa an impressive 10-1 record and a string of six wins.

North Carolina, ranked fourth nationally, stole the show in the opening round of the Dixie Classic at Raleigh, N.C., by drubbing Villanova, 86-63. In tonight's semi-finals, the Tarheels will face Duke, which whipped Wyoming, 71-54.

Tarheel Rivals Win

By contrast, North Carolina State, the Tarheels' arch-rival ranked No. 3 nationally, had to struggle in the same show for a 59-54 win over Oregon State, which upset Minnesota, 87-83, in overtime.

Utah, No. 6 nationally, blew a 13-point halftime lead but showed class in downing Marquette, 89-84, in the opening round of the Sugar Bowl Tournament at New Orleans. In the Sugar finals, Utah will face Notre Dame—which upset Alabama, 80-80.

West Virginia, title favorite in the Orange Bowl Tournament at Miami, gained the finals with a 70-60 win over Columbia. The Mountaineers thus qualified for a final-round game with Miami, Fla., which downed Tulane, 86-75.

Stanford wasn't in any tournament, but the Indians scored Thursday night's biggest upset as they beat Iowa, the nation's No. 5 team, 54-62, at Stanford. It was the third loss in six games for Iowa, the second straight on its West Coast visit.

Bill Hollingsworth was the Southern Oregon hero as the Red Raiders nipped Lewis and Clark 68-67 at Portland. Hollingsworth, who scored 24 points, hit two field goals in the last 21 seconds. Lloyd Hoffine had 28 points for SOCE, which now has won 6 and lost 2.

Portland State used two free throws by Jim Perkin in an overtime period to edge Pacific 62-62 at Forest Grove. Perkin led the scoring with 20 points.

Jimmy Winters, as usual, was the sparkplug for Portland U as the Pilots crushed Willamette. Winters came through with 20 points and Gene Kutch hit 17.

Don Porter hit 24 points for Linfield in a losing cause at Tacoma.

Southern Oregon was behind by seven points with 52 seconds to go against the Pioneers. Hoffine and Dale Bates got field goals. Bates stole the ball and passed to Hollingsworth who plunked in another two pointer.

Lewis and Clark heaved the ball the length of the court and SOC took it out of bounds. The Raiders held it until five seconds were left. Then Hollingsworth dribbled in and laid up the winning goal.

Southern Oregon had trailed all the way until those final seconds. The Pioneers' halfway lead was 29 to 27.

New York — (U.P.) — San Francisco and UCLA, two California basketball teams that traveled 3,000 miles to set up their only meeting of the season, clash tonight at Madison Square Garden for the Holiday Festival title.

San Francisco, ranked first in the nation and rolling on a 35-game winning streak, is an eight point choice to defeat the team that handed it its last defeat.

Coach Phil Woolpert's Dons have equaled the fourth longest winning streak in major college history since dropping a 47-40 decision to Coach John Wooden's Bruins at Los Angeles, Dec. 9, 1954.

Woolpert will throw Bill Russell, six-foot, 10-inch All-American center, star guard K. C. Jones and a strong group of reserves against UCLA in a bid to climax a seven-game cross-country tour with a second tournament title. The Dons, last season's NCAA champions won the DePaul Invitation Tournament at Chicago Dec. 17.

In Saturday's games, Auburn is favored over Vanderbilt by six in the Gator Bowl at Jacksonville, Fla.; the South over the North by six for the Blue-Gray game at Montgomery, Ala., and the East over the West by six for the Shrine All-Star clash at San Francisco.
