Tokyo Rose Due To Be Released

Washington —(U.P.)—The Justice Department said the notorious Tokyo Rose, who escaped a death sentence but was imprisoned for her World War II broadcasts on behalf of the Japanese, will be released Jan. 28.

Iva Toguri d'Aquino began serving her 10-year sentence in the Federal Reformatory for Women at Alderson, W. Va., Oct. 16, 1949. The slim University of California graduate is being released early because of time off for good behavior.

Partner Left Behind

She leaves behind her in Alderson a partner in treason, Mildred Gillars, who, under the name of Axis Sally beamed broadcasts to Americans from Berlin urging them to surrender.

American-born Tokyo Rose once received a tongue in cheek citation from the U. S. Navy for "greatly contributing to the morale" of American fighting men in the Pacific Theater. She could have received the death penalty in her San Francisco trial for her disc-jockey propaganda program that was liberally laced with sex and sedition.

Platinum-haired Axis Sally received a 10-to-30 year sentence for her wartime broadcasts to troops in the European Theater. She began serving her sentence in March, 1949, and will not be eligible for release until 1959.

Amnesia Victim Found on Highway

Placerville, Calif. —(U.P.)—A bridegroom who disappeared from his honeymoon suite in a San Francisco hotel was found half conscious in the middle of a mountain highway last night, an apparent victim of amnesia.

The bridegroom, Ronald Evenson, 27, a senior at the Colorado School of Mines, was brought to Placerville sanitarium to await the arrival of his wife. Attendants said he did not know who he was or how he got to Placerville.

Highway Patrol Sgt. Bernard Ball said an unidentified truck driver almost hit Evenson as he lay in the middle of U. S. 50, a transcontinental highway that crosses the rugged Sierra Nevada Mountains.

The truck driver reported the incident to patrolmen, who picked Evenson up and identified him from papers in his wallet. Evenson's car, rented from a San Francisco agency, was found parked by the side of the road, headed towards Sacramento.

Dr. L. E. Shortes examined Evenson at the sanitarium and found no marks of violence. His off-hand opinion was that Evenson suffered from amnesia.

His bride is the former Delora Gillen, 24, a high school teacher at Sterling, Colo.

Evenson, an Army veteran and former Stanford University student, is the son of E. E. Evenson, North Mankato, Minn.

Durocher Speechless When Faced With Gun

Beverly Hills, Calif. —(U.P.)—Leo (The Lip) Durocher, former New York Giants manager known for his bombastic complaints on the baseball diamond, didn't say "boo" when he was robbed by a gunman, it was disclosed today.

Duroches said he was robbed of \$20 by a lone gunman who waited near the garage until he returned home Monday night. "I was too scared to talk," Durocher said. "I gave him \$20, all I had on me. If I had had \$1500, I'd have given him that, too!"

Durocher, now an NBC executive, lives in Beverly Hills. His actress-wife, Laraine Day, was asleep in the house at the time of the robbery.

Three Hohenwarter Quadruplets Die; Fourth Gaining

Lancaster, Pa. —(U.P.)—Doctors today gave the only surviving Hohenwarter quadruplet a fair chance to live despite his tiny size and weak condition.

Norman Charles Hohenwarter Jr., the first of the quads to be born and the heaviest, was the only one still alive today although physicians had first given all four a good chance of survival.

Carl Conrad, the second quad born to a young Lancaster couple Monday night, died last night. John Philip and Mark Anthony died earlier yesterday.

Fourth Given Chance

Norman Charles, the heaviest at 4 pounds, 1 ounce, was the strongest of the four and had a fair chance to live, doctors said. He has been in an incubator since birth.

The three quads died within 38 hours of their birth to Mrs. Regina Hohenwarter, 26. Her husband, Norman, 26, works as a \$65 a week drug store and postal substitution clerk in Lancaster. The quads came as a surprise to the Hohenwarthers who had been expecting twins.

Mrs. Hohenwarter was reported in satisfactory condition today. The quads were born four weeks prematurely.

Hohenwarter had returned to work yesterday but hastened to his wife's bedside when informed that John Philip, the first of the three to die, was failing.

The Hohenwarthers observe their seventh wedding anniversary Feb. 16. They have two other sons, Stephen, 6, and Donald, 3.

Reunion With Daughter Awaited

Irrigon, Ore. —(U.P.)—Mrs. Amelia Lawson waited anxiously today for a phone call from the woman she believes to be the daughter she lost 24 years ago when the child was three.

But at Spokane, Wash., the phone of Mrs. Russell Pohl, who thought her mother had been disconnected.

Mrs. Pohl, who was born at Independence, Kan., Dec. 21, 1928, received a letter from Mrs. Lawson New Year's eve. It was signed "your very own mother."

"I've never been so confused in my life," Mrs. Pohl said at Spokane. "But I'll be awfully happy if it's true. I sent her a letter today. I sent a picture and asked her for one. It'll be the end of the week before I know any more. The sheriff's office is still investigating."

She added she had been "plagued" with phone calls since the story became known today.

Here, Mrs. Lawson was sure that Mrs. Pohl is her daughter. She remembered the birth date which Mrs. Pohl said was correct.

Mrs. Lawson explained she

had lost her daughter when she and her husband separated. She has no other children.
