Tornado Gang Raps Ashlanders 70-56

Medford high's Black Tornado made it two victories in a row over Ashland with a 70 to 56 result here Saturday night but the second Southern Oregon Conference basketball decision didn't come so easily as the one at Ashland Friday.

The Tornado had the margin on the backboards and produced over-all warm field shooting for the second night but required a considerable rally to overcome a cold start and a big surge of points in the second quarter to establish command. Ashland, which had succumbed to the Medford spurt after taking an early lead fought the Tornado crew on even scoring terms during the second half.

Victories gave Medford a twin no-loss mark in the Southern Oregon race. Klamath Falls, the loop favorite, kept stride with its second win over the Cavemen, 65 to 57, at Grants Pass on Saturday.

Grizzlies Get Jump
Ashland got the jump on Medford in the week end series and with Stuart Baker sparking the way, got a pair of seven-point spreads on the Tornado, 10 to 3 and 11 to 4, in the first 5 1/2 minutes of the first quarter. However, the Medfordites zoomed up from that point, trailed only 13 to 12 at the end of the period, outscored the Grizzlies 23 to 8 in the second stanza and had 14-point 35 to 21 bulge at halftime.

From that point on the Tornado kept 10 points or better in front of the Lithians. Third quarter standing was 47 to 37. In the fourth and final session, Medford shot to a pair of 17-point advantages, saw the margin slip slightly to 14 points at 60 to 46 with 4 1/2 minutes played and traded almost basket for basket with Ashland from there to the finish.

Dick Cople sparked Tornado scoring with 20 points. Bob Tisdell and Neil Plumley paced the backboarding with 11 apiece as Medford out-retrieved Ashland 40 to 25 and Plumley was second high in scoring with 15.

Tisdell was the principal ball-hawking with a number of steals. One of the highlights of his performance came after Cople had tossed in a pair of gifters with one second left in the first half. Tisdell snared the Ashland throw-in and pumped in a shot from the corner at the buzzer.

Substantial Aid
Plumley and Tisdell got substantial aid in retrieving from Dick McLaughlin and Cople with six each and from Johnny Foust with five and Cople and Lloyd Cearley shared in the hawking limelight with Tisdell.

Gene Parent, who fouled out, and Phil Sword were the main Ashland point makers with 15 and 14, respectively. Baker grabbed eight rebounds for Ashland and Parent seven while Lance Locke and Harry Johnson were the ball-swiping pests.

After Ashland took its 11 to 4 advantage at the start, it was a long shot by Cearley, a steal and a dribble in bucket by Tisdell, a pair of gifters by Plumley and a swing shot by McLaughlin that enabled the Tornado to pull up. Baker in the meantime, had swished a hooker for his eighth point of the quarter.

Medford's toughening defense held Ashland to a lone field goal in the second quarter. The Tornado meanwhile picked up tallies on six field goals and 11 free shots. Ashland obtained six free points. Cople with seven markers and Tisdell with six were the main Medford point men in the canto.

Parent put in two Ashland foul tosses at the start of the second session for 15 to 12 but Cople looped a shot in close for 15 to 14. Baker fouled Cople who tied up the score and then gave Medford a 16 to 15 lead with one minute played in the period. Cearley and McLaughlin followed with fielders and Medford was on its way.

Last four minutes of the second quarter amounted to a battle of free shots. Medford got nine and Ashland four. The Tornado got two field goals in this time.

Parent with eight points headed Ashland as it outgained Medford 16 to 12 in the third quarter.

Field goals by Plumley, Cople and Cearley and a free heave by McLaughlin gave Medford 54 to 37 advantage 1 1/2 minutes into the final stanza. After Locke got two free tallies and McLaughlin scored on a fast break, Medford had its second 17-point margin of the quarter.

Sword, with four field goals and Locke with three were the main guns in Ashland's 19-point final quarter. Plumley had four goals for Medford in its 23-point ramble in the same time.

There were numerous swipes by both clubs in the tangle and steals and breaks made the Grizzlies perk in the final quarter.

Medford was cool from the field in the first and third quarters, but was warm in the second and hot in the fourth to compile a .489 goaling average for the evening.

The Tornado preps this week for Friday and Saturday night games at Klamath Falls.

Portland, paced by Jimmy Winters, gave Oregon a bad time and was ahead several times. Oregon was ahead 35-31 at the half but Portland came back and had a 50-47 lead before the Ducks got going. Winters had 15 points while Charlie Franklin was high for Oregon with 13.

Oregon State, an easy winner over WSC Friday night, could not get going Saturday night and dropped a 53-52 decision at Pullman.

Washington State went ahead to stay early in the second half.

Dave Gambee of OSC captured scoring honors with 21 points while Larry Beck of the Cougars hit 19 and Dick Rask, an ex-Jefferson of Portland player, added 16 for WSC.

Tatum accepted the head football coaching job at the University of North Carolina. Tatum's resignation from Maryland is effective January 31.

The resignation ended weeks of speculation that Tatum was ready to quit Maryland. It is reported that big Jim's alma mater — North Carolina — signed him to a five-year contract at \$15,000 a year.

Tatum was close to tears as he announced his resignation. He said he decided to leave Maryland because his family has wanted to return to North Carolina.

San Francisco Eyes Chance To Set Win String Record

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The high-riding University of San Francisco Dons have a chance to make collegiate basketball history this week.

They need only two more victories, their 38th and 39th, to equal the longest collegiate winning streak record held by Seton Hall and Long Island university.

To earn victory No. 38, the Dons will have to get by the Santa Clara Broncos on Tuesday night at Kezar Pavilion. And Coach Phil Woolpert isn't so sure that game's going to be a pushover.

Noting the Dons were "flat" when they beat Pepperdine last Friday after a slow start, Woolpert said:

"The Broncos always come up with a real game. I don't look for Tuesday's game to be any different from those in the past, when it's always been a good battle."

If the Dons are successful against the Broncos, then they'll have a chance to tie the record Friday when they meet Fresno State in Fresno. Woolpert declined to go beyond Tuesday in his remarks.

Both are California Basketball Association games. In the Pacific Coast Conference this weekend, Stanford entertains Idaho, California invades Oregon, Southern California entertains Oregon State and California invades Washington State. Washington plays Oregon tomorrow in a non-conference game and is idle this weekend.

Presumably, these affairs will feature basketball in contrast to the activities at Berkeley last week-end when Referee Al Lightner and the fans shared the spotlight with the USC and UC cage squads.

Vexed at being hit in the eye by a penny and irked at the Cal rooters for tossing pennies and waste paper on the floor, Lightner declared the game forfeit to USC. The Trojans were leading, 77-64, anyway, with only three minutes left.

The upshot of the whole thing, of course, was that Lightner was hanged in effigy. The hanging came as school officials and student leaders were trying to prevent a recurrence of disorderly conduct by rooters.

Embarrassing Slap
Student Body President Bob Hamilton, referring to the referee's penalty, said it was an "embarrassing slap at the school."

"It's bad enough that 5200 had to see it first hand, but it was worse because thousands of television viewers saw it. Maybe we'll learn a good lesson from it."

However, the Bears did salvage a split, by virtue of their win Friday night.

Board of Trade
Because of Helfand's "win," fight-manager Bobby Gleason began organizing the "Ring Board of Trade," which will replace the Guild in N. Y. State if the commission approves.

Gleason, 63, pilots heavyweight Nino Valdes, and other boxers. He also runs a gymnasium in the Bronx.

The Guild scheduled a meeting for tonight to consider "disbanding or fighting."

Promoter Tex Sullivan and his boxing director, Willie Gilzenberg, were slated to appear today before Helfand and request that they be permitted to continue with their Monday night TV fights at St. Nicholas Arena.
