Irrigon, Ore. — (U.P.) — Mrs. Amelia Lawson staged a half happy, half heartbroken reunion yesterday with the young woman she says is the daughter she left 26 years ago. But the daughter, Mrs. Russell Pohl, Spokane, said after the two hour meeting she was still "confused" about whether Mrs. Lawson is the mother from whom she was parted as an infant and does not remember.

The two women regarded each other for a moment, then Mrs. Lawson rushed forward with outstretched arms. "Hello, Olive," she said.

The stage for the reunion was set after Mrs. Pohl received a letter New Year's eve from Mrs. Lawson in which she said she was Mrs. Pohl's "very own mother." She said she had located Mrs. Pohl through Sheriff Floyd Huggins at Independence, Kan.

### Al Lightner Not to Toot At Berkeley

Berkeley, Calif. — (U.P.) — Veteran Referee Al Lightner of Salem, Ore., vows he will never again officiate a basketball game in Berkeley.

"I'm not going to risk my eyesight for the amount of money I get here," Lightner said commenting on Saturday's California-USC game in which he was struck in the eye by a thrown object. The Pacific Coast Conference official later awarded the game to the Southern California club when fans persisted in littering the courts during the second half.

Lightner denied reports that he blamed the California student body rooting section for the incident but he added:

"This is not going to happen to me again, because I am not going to work here again."

A University of California patrolman reported he saw a "13 or 14-year-old boy" throw the object which hit Lightner in the eye about eight minutes before the end of the game.

Lightner said he warned the crowd but "twice after that I got hit in the neck." He finally called the game and gave USC the win 77-64 with three minutes and 16 seconds left in the contest.

The Oregon official has been in the PCC for 11 of his 16 years as a referee. He has worked in two NCAA national tournaments and several regional tournaments in his career.

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Lloyd Mangrum has a five-stroke lead over a star-studded field at the end of the third round of the Los Angeles Open golf tournament. Mangrum has a score of 200 for 54 holes. Tommy Bolt and Jerry Barber are right behind Mangrum, each have 205.

### State Taxpayers Face Tough Year

Salem — (U.P.) — The State Tax commission warned Oregon taxpayers today they face the toughest state income tax payments in history this year.

A surtax of 45 per cent was added to state income tax bills this year by an income tax amendment passed during the 1955 legislative session.

Two per cent state withholding deductions are now being made in pay checks, instead of one per cent, to enable employed persons to make the high tax payments.

The legislature also reduced the income tax exemptions on dependents \$100 so that the average taxpayer will be paying between 50 and 60 per cent more state tax in 1956, according to Commissioner Ray Smith.

The state treasury expects to rake in between \$45,000,000 and \$50,000,000 from the additional taxes. That, with other taxes, should be enough to balance the state budget.

Only bright spot in the taxpayers' picture was that, in 1957, the taxpayer may be able to recover some of the additional money by using the state tax as a deduction on his federal income tax return.

### Virginia Voting on Private School System

Richmond, Va. — (U.P.) — Virginia voters go to the polls today to decide whether they want a state-supported private school system to evade the issue of racially-integrated public schools. Officials estimate that some 620,000 persons are eligible to vote in the referendum on a proposed constitutional amendment. Most state leaders are behind the proposal.

## Legless Vet To Continue Getting Disability Pension

Washington — (U.P.) — James Kutcher, a Newark, N. J., legless war veteran, will continue receiving his \$329 a month government disability pension. The Veterans Administration, which had suspended it on security charges, reversed itself last night.

The VA announced that a hearing board had decided Kutcher had not been found guilty "beyond a reasonable doubt" of the charges against him. The board

held a public hearing on the case Dec. 30.

The pension was suspended last month but quickly restored, pending the hearing board's decision.

The VA notified Kutcher Dec. 12 his pension had been cancelled because he belonged to the Socialist Workers party, an organization on the attorney general's subversive list.

**Aid Said Given Enemy**  
In its letter to the 44-year-

old veteran, who lost both legs in World War II, the VA said "evidence shows" he gave "aid and assistance to an enemy of the United States" during the Korean war by being a member of the party. It said the party undermined public interest and cooperation in the war effort.

Kutcher testified at the hearing here that he and the Socialist Workers party were opposed to the Communist regimes of both North Korea and Commu-

nist China. The hearing board said it had made a "very careful review" and decided it had not been "shown beyond a reasonable doubt" that Kutcher was guilty of law violations that would have justified revoking his pension rights.

### Lausche Hopes Ike Will Seek Reelection

Cleveland, O. — (U.P.) — Ohio's Gov. Frank J. Lausche last night pledged his support of the Democratic presidential candidate but added that he hoped "President Eisenhower will regain complete health and seek reelection."

Lausche told his interviewers on a television program that "Eisenhower has brought unity of thought to the nation."
