# Ohio Court To Review Conviction Of Dr. Sheppard

Columbus — (U.P.) — The Ohio Supreme court today agreed to review the second degree murder conviction of Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard, but rejected a plea for a new trial on grounds of "new evidence."

The court said it would review the case record and the defense claim that Dr. Sheppard's constitutional rights were violated by a "circus atmosphere" during his original trial in Cleveland more than a year ago.

But the state's highest court rejected Sheppard's plea for a new trial on the basis of "new evidence," which Dr. Paul Kirk, University of California criminologist, claimed he had found.

The decision to review the case was the first legal round Dr. Sam had won since he was first accused of beating his pregnant wife Marilyn in their house overlooking Lake Erie July 4, 1954.

While the decision did not win Dr. Sam's release from Ohio penitentiary, it means the court will review the case in detail. The court, although it rejected the request for a new trial today, still could order a new trial after it studies and decides the constitutional question. Or the court may decide that Dr. Sheppard must serve the life sentence which was imposed by Common Pleas court in Cleveland.

## Florida Farmers Get Some Relief

Miami, Fla. — (U.P.) — A gradual warmup brought relief to South Florida farmers today but none to beach-loving tourists.

Florida will remain chilly through Sunday, weathermen predicted. The ocean at Miami Beach was a teeth-chattering 68 degrees and a sharp northwest wind still fanned the coastline.

Farmers, planning under more than \$10,000,000 worth of frost-ravaged crops in South Florida, were cheered by news that vegetable prices had jumped on the New York market.

One report said that tomatoes were bringing \$12 a bushel on the New York market, compared to \$4.50 a bushel farmers were receiving south of here last week.

Such news encouraged Dade county growers, who managed to save part of their crops. Those farmers not completely wiped out may recoup most of their money losses.

More than 13,000 acres of tomatoes, beans, squash and other tender crops were destroyed in Dade county, the hardest hit area.

## Process Authority For Loans Received

Grants Pass — Authority to process disaster loan applications for Jackson and Josephine county farmers who suffered flood losses has been received, according to William N. Young Jr., supervisor of the Farmers Home administration here.

An established farm owner or operator who suffered a substantial loss during the December flood is eligible for an FHA loan if unable to obtain from other sources credit required to continue normal farming operations, Young said. The farmer should have reasonable prospects for success with assistance of a loan.

Loans may be made for purchasing feed, seed, fertilizer, replacement of equipment and livestock, for other essential farm and home operating expenses, and for replacement or repair of buildings, fences, drainage and irrigation systems on individual farms. Loans will not be granted to pay existing debts, Young said.

# Jackson Timber Affected by Merger Of Products Firms

Grants Pass — The recent merger of two large woods products companies and several affiliated firms affects substantial timber holdings in Jackson county, it was reported this week.

The merger, effective Jan. 1, was that in which Puget Timber Company of Oregon, with headquarters at Eugene, became part of the J.H. Baxter & Co., of San Francisco. Affiliated firms which also are involved in the merger are Baxco Corp., Portland; J. H. Baxter Timber Co., Willits and Redding, Calif.; Puget Timber company, Seattle, and Puget Timber company of Oregon, a Canadian corporation, J. H. Baxter & Co., Ltd., remains distinct but associated.

**Named Supervisor**  
Ursel Waterman, Grants Pass, who was manager there for Puget Timber company of Oregon, has been named district supervisor in the timber and production departments, and is in charge of operations at Roseburg, Norway, Grants Pass, Crescent City and Redding. He has been with Puget Timber since 1938. Other personnel in the Grants Pass office are Clinton W. Wynn, Ken W. Morris, and Mrs. Margaret White.

The company, which indicates it plans to obtain additional timber in Jackson county, operates throughout the Pacific coast, with plants at the Dalles, Eugene, Alameda and Long Beach.

It markets its treated poles, piling, lumber, ties and construction timbers under the "Baxco" trade mark in all parts of the world.
