He attended Washington State college for three years, and was graduated from the University of Oregon dental school. He was a member of Delta Sigma Delta, national dental fraternity. Dr. Sanders was master of the Medford Lodge 103 AF and AM in 1938, and worthy patron of the Eastern Star in 1936 and 1938. Commercial Fishing Rules Unchanged

Portland — (U.P.)—No changes in commercial fishing regulations on the Columbia river for summer Chinook salmon and summer steelhead were recommended yesterday by biologists from fisheries departments in Oregon and Washington. The biologists told a hearing that protective measures adopted in recent years not only had increased landings of summer Chinook salmon and summer steelhead but also escapements to spawning grounds. It was recommended that the summer season below Bonneville open June 20 and close July 15 and that the season above Bonneville open July 4 and close July 30.

For the spring Chinook fishery on the Columbia recommendations included that the season below Bonneville open April 30 and close May 27 as in 1955. For above Bonneville, it was suggested the season open April 30 and close May 10. In 1955, the above-Bonneville season started April 30 and lasted until May 27.

No changes in smelt fishing regulations were recommended for 1956.
