## The Medical Roundup

### AN OPERATIVELY PRODUCED MENOPAUSE

If a woman's uterus (womb) is removed, she will, of course, stop menstruating. If her ovaries are left, and if they are normal and left well supplied with blood she should not immediately suffer from menopausal symptoms, such as flushing. If her ovaries are removed, she will probably get flushes; and she may lose some or all of her sexual interest or ability to respond. Fortunately, if a woman is well-sexed and loves her husband affectionately she may remain a good wife to the end of her days, even if early she loses her ovaries.

In some cases in which the operation, only parts of the two ovaries are left, the woman may feel all right for a few years and then may go into a menopause. Many women who have had an early hysterectomy and then have married a man who wanted children, have asked me frantically if there isn't some way in which a uterus from some woman could be grafted into them. Doubtless, one could be grafted, but it would not work and it would soon slough out. A woman who has suffered a hysterectomy cannot hope ever to have a child.

Some women who menstruate weakly or for a while after a partial hysterectomy wonder if it would be well for them to take large enough amounts of ovarian extract so they could maintain their periods, but I doubt if this is desirable, even for a woman who has married a second time, and for the first time late in life, and much wants to present her new husband with a child.

Professors of surgery tell me that today they are getting ever more reluctant to remove the uterus from a young woman, even if it contains a good-sized fibroid. They no longer worry about the danger of cancer growing in such tumors, and hence, if the woman is not flooding each month and getting anemic, they leave her alone. I have seen such women who later had one or more children without any great difficulty. They were then most grateful to their good gynecologist who, years before, had refused to operate.

Sometimes when I remark in this column that many persons with epilepsy tend to have a quick and violent and unruly temper, several epileptics write to remind me of what is true and this is that some persons with this disease are not bad-tempered.

The other day a fine, interesting woman came in to say that she started having epileptic seizures when she was two years old. She said that she had always had a violent temper, and that every time she got good and angry she was certain soon to have at least one seizure and sometimes more.

One day she got so angry that, in the next 12 hours, she had 24 spells. This settled it. She made up her mind she would never lose her temper again. She has stuck to her resolve, and a result, has now gone 18 months

without a single seizure! Her story may now stimulate other epileptics to "sit on the lid," and to hold down their temper. I know that many of my epileptic patients will never start an argument with anyone, and none of them ever will attempt to spank a child. They know it might be hard to stop.

Others of my epileptic patients have learned by sad experience never to take a drink. Others have discovered what any expert on epilepsy could have told them and this is that plenty of physical exercise can cut down greatly on the incidence of the spells.

### Eden in Bold Moves To Bolster Prestige

London (U.P.) — Prime Minister Anthony Eden moved boldly yesterday to bolster British prestige in the boiling Middle East and to strengthen his own prestige. He ordered 2000 airborne troops to Cyprus, Britain's last major stronghold in the Middle East and only two hours flying time from any Middle Eastern capital.

Eden summoned a cabinet meeting this afternoon to speed up policy decisions at home and abroad before he travels to Washington Jan. 24 for talks with President Eisenhower.

Informed sources said his decision to beef up Middle East stemmed directly from the buffeting Britain took over its policy in the Arab kingdom of Jordan where young King Hussein's traditionally pro-British regime is believed wavering.

### Great Plains Drought Assistance Requested

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower has submitted to Congress a long-range federal program to help solve the "critical problems" of farmers in the drought-plagued Great Plains.

In letters to Vice-President Richard M. Nixon and Speaker Sam Rayburn, he said the 10-

state Great Plains region was "special problems requiring special attention." He "strongly" urged congressional action this year.
