THE ABUSE OF DRUGS

It is sad that certain men and women love to take too much medicine or too many kinds of drugs that disturb patients could be locked up and fined. Practically nothing was ever done for them in the way of treatment. Usually the superintendent was so busy with administrative duties that he had no time in which to talk to the patients, and often he had had but little training in psychiatry.

Today, psychiatrists and others are searching for funds with which to build more hospitals in which the idea is not just one of custodial care of the patients but treatment and research and study. When possible, patients will be helped to get well quickly, and to get back to work. Along the way, able young physicians with newly-discovered techniques will try to find out why the patients became mentally upset, or why some patients got well quickly and others did not.

Until a few years ago there weren't any good modes of approach to the problem; there were too few ways of studying the patients, especially with laboratory techniques. Fortunately today, many doors are opening up. In this column I will keep talking about mental diseases because today they constitute the greatest medical problem facing the world. I want all good and intelligent people to be sympathetic to the idea of doing something to solve it.

MOO-O-O'S AND MUSINGS

Occasionally, I see a person suffering from a chronic diarrhea which no one can stop. In such cases I ask if some drug is being taken, and commonly the man says, "No, none." But later perhaps I find that he is taking an overdose of some food supplement which he does not think of as a drug. When he stops this, his bowels are all right again.

I remember a man who had been getting sudden spells with a big chill, then fever, violent abdominal cramps, and finally diarrhea. Careful examinations in several cities had failed to show anything wrong. I asked the man if he was taking any drug and he said, "No." Then I saw him in a spell and noted that on his skin there had come a few big brown blotches. When I showed these to a skin specialist he said immediately that they were due to phenolphthalein, the commonest drug that is put into patented laxatives of all types. Then the man admitted he had been eating some laxative cookies, but he had not thought of them as medicine. When he stopped taking the cookies, that was the end of his spells. Evidently he had a rare and great sensitivity to phenolphthalein.

Another remarkable case was that of a woman who had been everywhere, trying to get relief from pre-menstrual spells in which she would get a chill and a fever of 105 degrees. Because, some years before, she had been to Central America, her physicians had tried hard to find some parasite in her blood or her bowel. I put her into a hospital the day before the expected period, and when I saw her temperature shoot up, I got a hunch. The spike on her fever chart was so sharp that it looked like a very high and narrow church steeple. In other words, after a quick rise, her temperature had immediately fallen back to normal. This suggested, not an infection but a violent reaction to some drug. As I started asking her what she had taken that morning, an expert blood specialist who had been looking at the blood smears just taken from the woman, called me and said, "She has changes indicating a reaction to a drug." She then admitted that always on the first day of menstruation she had taken a medicine for cramps. The drug she was using was one that has been largely discarded time to celebrate a major holiday with you? 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Family Differs in Economy Answers

Champaign, Ill. — (U.P.) — A consumer study conducted by the University of Illinois revealed that members of the same family often give different answers to questions about the family economy.

In one-third of the 237 families studied, members differed in their answers about family income and whether the family lived on a budget.

Only eight per cent of the families in which two members answered questions were in full agreement on what had been bought for family use during the six months preceding the interviews.

To cap the survey, it was found that lack of agreement in reporting purchases of personal items such as jewelry was found in 80 per cent of the families.

Water Regulation Reversal Proposed

Washington—(U.P.)—Rep. Clair Engle (D-Calif.) has introduced legislation to remedy the "disastrous impact" of a Supreme Court decision on the water rights of the 17 Western states.

Engle is chairman of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee which has jurisdiction over federal water and power development in the House.

He said a recent Supreme Court decision in an Oregon case "upsets nearly 100 years of legal precedents with reference to water rights on federal reservations on the public domain."

lands." His bill would reverse the decision. Previously, the federal government in the 17 states has acquired and held water rights under state law as a proprietor just as any other land owner, Engle said.

In the Oregon case, however, it was held that if the federal government reserved a portion of public domain for the armed forces or any other specific purpose, use of water on the reserved area would be independent of state law, he said.

The decision would cut off existing rights and make impossible water development in Western states when any part of the water originates in public domain areas which are subject to federal reservations, he said.
