Heart Attack Fatal To Frank Pellegrini

Washington — (U.P.) — Frank Pellegrini, chief counsel of the Senate Commerce committee and former assistant U. S. Attorney in Seattle, Wash., died Saturday of a heart attack while playing golf.

Pellegrini, 51, was stricken while playing golf at the Manor club golf course in nearby Maryland. He died while en route to a hospital in an ambulance.

Pellegrini, who attended the University of Washington law school with Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, (D-Wash.), was named chief counsel of the Commerce Committee in January, 1955, when Magnuson became chairman. Previously he had served as co-director of the Labor-Management Maritime committee and as counsel of the Merchant Marine subcommittee of the Commerce committee.

Pellegrini is survived by his wife, Renaan, and twin sons.

Land-Hungry Japan Dreams Of Wrestling Land From Sea

Tokyo — (U.P.) — Land-hungry Japan dreams of wresting from the sea an area half the size of that which the Netherlands has reclaimed since 1200 A.D.

If it carries out the project, Japan will owe its success to the famed dykes of Holland, which is providing the inspiration and the example.

Site of the dream—the scheme is not even on paper yet—is the Ariake Bay of Kyushu, southernmost of Japan's four big islands.

Ariake bay is on the opposite side of a 25-mile-wide peninsula from Nagasaki and Deshima, which was the site of the Dutch trading post and the only contact between Japan and the West during 200 years of feudal isolation.

In its most ambitious aspect, the vision calls for turning 170,000 hectares of sea bottom into fertile farmland. It would be done with Dutch methods, tested in the Zuider Zee, and with Dutch advice.

Proof that the Japanese are taking the dream seriously is the plan they have laid for reclaiming 10,000 hectares in the Hachiro-gata Lagoon of Akita Prefecture in the north. This project, due to be started late this year, will be the test of the feasibility of the giant Ariake bay scheme.

Land reclamation is not new to Japan. Japanese claim to rank with the Dutch in pioneering development of farmland from seas, lakes and bogs.

The most ambitious of the present Japanese projects is at Kojima Bay, in Okayama Prefecture, where Japanese engineers are building up 5,540 hectares of choice farming and industrial land.

Financing land reclamation is the chief problem. Parliament gave the government \$8,300,000 in 1955 for reclamation projects. The agriculture and forestry ministry wants more in 1956.

State Senators File Initiative Petitions
Salem — (U.P.) — Two state senators, one a Republican and the other a Democrat, Friday filed an initiative petition with the state elections division aimed at granting the right to vote to Oregon's 18-year-olds.

Filing the petition were Sens. Mark Hatfield, Salem Republican, and Monroe Sweetland, Milwaukie Democrat.

Signed by 40,093 registered voters would be required on the petitions by July 3 in order to put it on the ballot for voter action in November.

If approved, the voting age in the state would be lowered to 18 from the present 21-year-old.

Public Power magazine is the official publication of the American Public Power association, representing more than 800 local publicly-owned electric utilities. The association advocates a single federal dam at the Hells Canyon site instead of Idaho Power's three-dam plan.

The Federal Power commission has issued a license to Idaho Power for its three dams, but the association wants congress or the courts to block the company's plan.

Sweden Train Wreck Kills 10 Children
Kopparberg, Sweden — (U.P.) — Faulty air brakes were blamed Saturday for the train wreck that killed 20 persons, including 10 school children, near here Friday in Sweden's worst rail accident since 1918.

An ore-laden 34-car freight train smashed head-on into a two-car special railway bus on a steep hill between Kopparberg and Staelberg, some 150 miles northwest of Stockholm. Of the 40 passengers aboard the bus, 20 were killed and 16 injured.

Investigators said the air brakes failed to hold on the freight train which hit a top speed of 75 miles an hour as it tore down the hill to smash into the bus and continued on for more than another mile before grinding to a halt on an up-grade.

The railway bus was demolished in the collision.

Caution Urged In Aid To Education
Portland — (U.P.) — Any program of federal aid to education should be entered with caution, Eugene W. Marsh of McMinnville, chairman of Oregon's delegation to the White House conference on Education, said here Friday.

Marsh, former president of the Oregon Senate, told the City Club that White House delegates were about two-to-one in favor of federal aid for construction of schools and were about evenly split on federal aid for operation of schools.

Haystack Monument Center of Attention
Williamstown, Mass. — (U.P.) — Haystack Monument will be the center of attention here this year.

Erected in 1867, it commemorates the day in 1806 when five Williams College students dedicated their lives to "the service and well-being of people in foreign lands across the sea." This marked the beginning of the American Board of Foreign Missions program, which this year will observe its 150th anniversary.

On the monument is a replica of the haystack which on a rainy day in 1806 sheltered Samuel J. Mills, James Richards, Francis L. Robbins, Harvey Loomis and Byram Green as they consecrated themselves to the new work.

From this meeting of the five students, the American Board of Foreign Missions was founded four years later. Today it is the governing body of interdenominational work with hundreds of missionaries serving around the globe.
