Number of Perforations Aids in Spotting Stamps

"I never would have noticed it," Jim said, waving an envelope, "if I hadn't got used to estimating the number of perforations on stamps."

It was an ordinary envelope with two cancelled stamps on it. They were one-cent Benjamin Franklin's, the type that started coming out by the million back in 1901, and which aren't worth more than a couple of cents today.

"But what do the perforations have to do with the value of these," I asked.

"Merely this, Pink," he said. "You notice these two stamps are a pair. They are joined at the narrow end, and there is no perforation between them. The perforations are just along the vertical sides."

"And that means these are coil stamps, from a vending machine," I said. "But I don't see what..."

"Most stamps you see of this type have fewer perforations along the sides. They are the later ones that came out in 1910 or 1914," Jim said.

"Because these two have 12 perforations to a given length as against eight and a half which they had later—I was reasonably sure these were samples of the first coil stamps put out by the government. And that is what they are. The cancellations date is Nov. 18, 1908, and the first one came out only a few months earlier, on July 31 of the same year."

"As for what they're worth, unused, the value is \$250. But cancelled like these, and on a cover, they are so rare that the catalogues don't even list the price."

"And that means these are coil stamps, from a vending machine," I said. "But I don't see what..."

They had been made by a Peter Gray, of Boston, according to a stamping I noticed in the metal of one of them, and he certainly made them big enough. They measured about 19 inches high, 12 inches wide and better than eight deep. Furthermore, they had wire guards to protect the flame area. A 10-inch reflector of nicked brass enabled them to throw a beam of light that must have looked like the headlight of a locomotive.

They were interesting enough as relics of the close of the gas-light era, but I couldn't see much value in them, let alone any possibilities of a real profit.

Pete smiled at my comments. "They'll sell mighty well long about spring," he said, "when the tourists start coming back into the mountains again. And I guess these'll bring about \$25 each."

Portland Transit Firm Files Papers

Portland — (U.P.) — Incorporation papers were prepared Friday for a new firm to provide Portland with public transportation. It would be known as the Rose City Transit company. It would trade its stock for the physical assets of the Portland Traction company on city lines only.

Meanwhile the Portland city council postponed for a week consideration of an ordinance that would extend the present franchise of the Portland Traction company so that a successor firm could be organized.

The original proposal that the franchise be extended for six months was amended to 11 months at a meeting Thursday after it was learned PTC would prefer that arrangement.

The council has objected to granting a new franchise to PTC because it is controlled by San Francisco interests. Rose City Transit company, however, would still be a subsidiary of PTC.

Portland Traction's interurban operations would not be affected by the stock-equipment trade with Rose City.
