New Drugs For Acute Leukemia

Acute leukemia, a disease which sometimes attacks children and even adults, is a terrifying ailment because it is often so quickly fatal. The victim may be well one day and dead three weeks later. For this reason any drug that will give the patient even a few extra months of life is welcomed.

Drugs such as 6-mercaptopurine and azaserine have somewhat lengthened the life. Now comes Dr. Joseph M. Hill, of the Wadley Research Institute and Blood Center, in Dallas, Texas, who says that the use of two new anti-leukemic drugs, prednisolone and prednisona has caused the number of persons surviving for more than a year to increase from 13 per cent to 38 per cent. These drugs, also, bring about

more remissions in which the child will feel so well he can go back to school.

I am sorry to have to emphasize that a cure is not yet available, but what has been accomplished will cause all blood-experts now working on the problem to take hope.

A Two-Cell Human Embryo

My old friend, Dr. George Corner, director of the Carnegie Institute's famous department of embryology in Baltimore, has the world's most remarkable collection of early human embryos. Now it is reported in Science News Letter that the research

workers at the Institute have found the smallest and earliest human embryo; one made up of only two cells. They already had one of 12 cells; another of 58 cells, and a fourth of 107 cells. These microscopic human embryos closely resemble those of animals. Only later do they develop far enough so that someone, not an expert, can tell what sort of a creature is being formed.

Quieting Drugs

In the last year new tranquilizing drugs have been very helpful in quieting excited patients in mental hospitals. Often now with these drugs, the excited and pugnacious patient calms down to a point where he will talk to other patients and go to the dining-table with them. He will talk to his doctor and thus get help from him.

According to a note in Science News Letter in one mental hospital alone the number of electroshock treatments given in a year dropped from 11,300 to none at all.

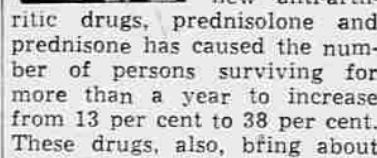

Oregon Labor Leaders Plan Merger Meeting

Portland—(U.P.)—Oregon labor leaders have set tomorrow for a meeting to outline plans for merger action between the AFL and the CIO on the state level. James T. Marr, executive secretary of the state AFL organization said his committee delegated to the meeting would consist of himself, Oregon federation president J. D. McDonald; Al E. Bird, secretary of the Portland Metal Trades council; Kenneth Davis, executive secretary of the Northwestern Council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers; Clell Harris, president of the state building trades council; W. L. Vinson, secretary of the state electrical workers association and Alice Westling, secretary of the state culinary alliance.



Brinks Witness Is Threatened After Testimony To Jury

Boston — (U.P.)—A witness was threatened twice after he testified before the grand jury which indicted 11 men in the \$1,219,000 Brink's holdup, police disclosed Saturday.

James C. Allen of Boston, head cashier of Brink's when it was robbed six years ago, received two telephone calls Friday night only a few hours after he testified. A special police guard was assigned to him.

Allen's wife answered the first call. She said a gruff-voiced man told her he had a "message" for her husband.

"Don't talk. Don't talk," the man warned and hung up. Similar Voice

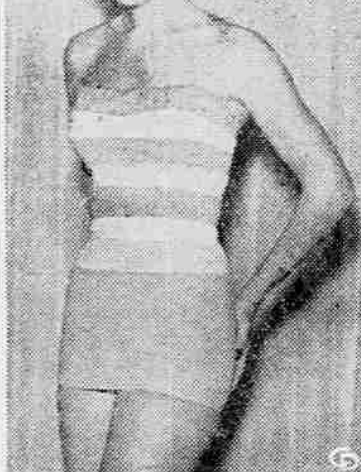
Allen took the second call and heard a similar gruff voice warn: "You'd better not talk. You'd better not talk."

Allen went to the police immediately.

Federal and state prosecutors started preparing "airtight" cases against the gang that was accused of the record hold-up.

It was believed that James (Specs) O'Keefe, the hoodlum who helped the FBI break the fabulous robbery, may have had an eye on the \$100,000 reward when he decided to "tell all" about history's biggest cash hold-up.

Disposition of the reward, offered by Brink's for information leading to the "arrest and conviction" of the bandits, will be decided by a five man Boston committee.

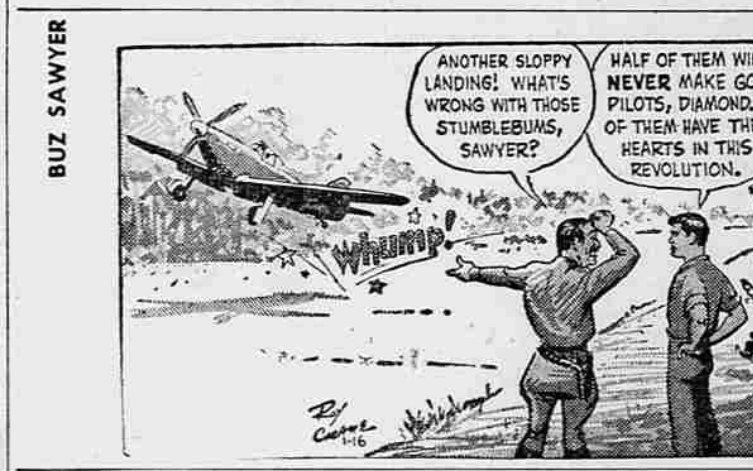
