### War Vet Hunt, Fishing License At Reduced Rate

Salem—(U.P.)—War veterans 25 per cent or more disabled are entitled to low-cost hunting and fishing licenses in Oregon, Vere A. McCarthy, service officer for the State Department of Veterans' Affairs, said today.

The eligible veteran may obtain a hunting or fishing license for 50 cents, or the combination license for one dollar. He must have been an Oregon resident for a year prior to applying. His disability must be current, and must be certified by the Veterans Administration.

Veterans of the Spanish-American and Civil wars, the Philippine insurrection and the Boxer rebellion are considered 25 per cent disabled without VA certification.

Application is made to the State Game commission, Portland. County service officers and the State Veterans' Department have the application forms and can assist disabled veterans in filing for the benefit.

The veterans' department also reminded men an active duty with the armed forces in Oregon that they are entitled to hunting and fishing licenses in this state at the same price as residents. They may apply at any sporting goods store which issues game licenses.

### Agua Caliente Tourney Slated

### Demos, GOP Divided On Help To Farmers

Republicans and Democrats split sharply today over how to help the financially-squeezed farmer.

Democrats called the administration farm bill partisan, inadequate and unworkable. The blast came as the Senate Agriculture Committee continued hearings on farm legislation.

Sen. George D. Aiken (R-Vt.) and five of the six other Republicans on the Agriculture Committee introduced the administration bill Tuesday. Its main feature is a voluntary "soil bank" plan under which farmers would be paid to take acreage out of production. Some Democrats have favored a mandatory "soil bank."

Committee Chairman Allen J. Ellender (D-La.) renewed his call for the writing of a "bipartisan, non-political" farm bill.

### Pressure Sewer Line Washed Out In Flood

Central Point—High water in Bear creek has prevented engineers from making complete estimates of repair cost of about 70 feet of pressure sewer line washed out in the December flood, according to city recorder Arden Pinkham.

The 12-inch pipe line washed out when the creek channel changed and deepened during recent high water. The break prevents pumping of sewage to the Medford sewage line.

### Tom Mont New Coach At Maryland

College Park, Md.—(U.P.)—"The quiet man" took over Maryland's football fortunes today.

That's 33-year-old Tommy Mont, a former Maryland football star just handed a three-year contract to replace big Jim Tatum as the Terrapins' head coach.

Tatum hovered around like a proud father Tuesday while Dr. Wilson H. Elkins, Maryland president, announced Mont's appointment to a jam-packed news conference. Tommy has been Tatum's backfield coach since 1951, and it was Tatum himself who recommended Mont as his successor when he resigned to coach at North Carolina.

### Unassuming

But while Mont absorbed some of Tatum's split-T system, he acquired absolutely none of the big guy's personality. Tatum is big, impulsive, personable and always ready to comment on anything. Mont is unassuming, soft-spoken and reticent to talk about anything more controversial than the weather.

Tatum's Maryland teams have been built around the defense, a system designed to strike for an early lead and then protect it. Mont, who played three years for the Washington Redskins as an understudy to Sam Baugh, has more of the pros' "the best defense is a helluva offensive" philosophy.

### Bruins Pace PCC Quints In Statistics

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—UCLA, led by its one-two punch of center Willie Naulls and guard Morris Taft, has moved into the Pacific Coast Conference lead by setting a blistering scoring pace and controlling the backboards, statistics showed today.

While UCLA led in the key team statistical departments, its stars, Taft and Naulls, ranked one-two in the scoring department. Taft has poured in 105 points for a 26.3-point average. Naulls has 92 for a 23-point average. Other scoring leaders include Larry Beck, Washington State, 85; Dave Gambee, Oregon State, 70; and George Selleck, Stanford, 62.

Trojans Second  
In team statistics, Southern California ranked second behind UCLA in scoring with a 67.5-point game average followed by Idaho, 66, Oregon, 66, and Stanford 61.8.

Oregon has the best field goal shooting percentage with a mark of 44.6 per cent, sinking 46 goals in 103 attempts. Other leaders are SC 41.8 per cent, and UCLA 40.7.

Idaho is the best free throw shooting club with 86 points in 112 attempts for 76.7 per cent. Washington is second with 71.7 per cent and Stanford third with 66.3.

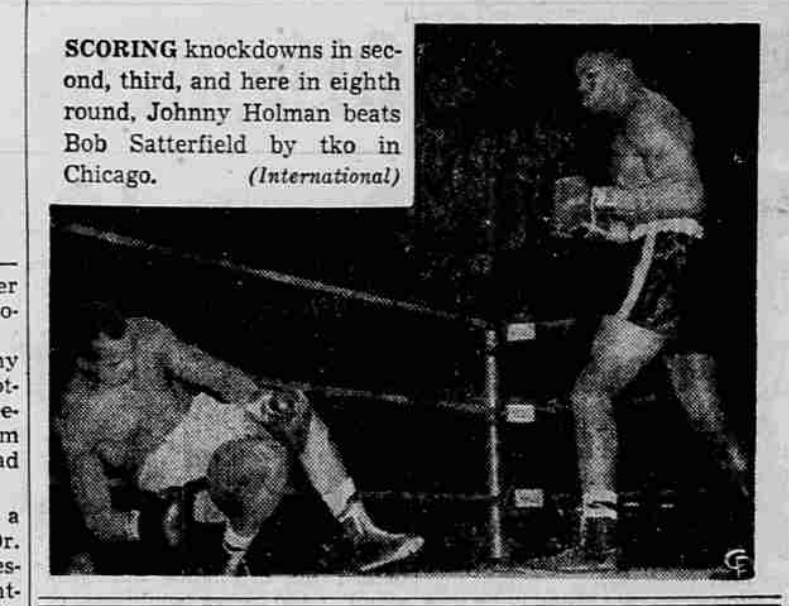
Washington is the No. 1 defensive team, holding opponents to an average of 50 points a game, four better than SC.

**Terrific Average**  
Taft tops scorers in field goal percentages. He has hit on 42 of 77 tries for a phenomenal 54.5 shooting average. Charlie Franklin of Oregon, and Carroll Adams of UCLA are tied for second at 53.3 per cent, followed by Ray Bell, Oregon, 52.8, and Jim Kaufman, SC 50.0.

Bill Bauscher of Idaho sets the pace from the free throw line with 20 points on 20 attempts. Trailing Bauscher are Bill Boyd, Stanford, 87.5 per cent; Bob Blake, California, 85.7 and Jack Mitchell, Idaho, 84.2.

Naulls led the conference with rebounds with 71 out of 363 chances for 19.6 per cent. Jim Coshov of Washington was second with 24 of 149 chances for 16.1 per cent.

### Split Week Set Up for Coast Loop

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—Pacific Coast League teams have adopted a 168-game schedule for 1956 in which split-week series will be played throughout the 23-week season.

The season will open April 10 and close Sept. 16. Teams will play 24 games each against other clubs in series ranging from three to five games. Previously most PCL series were seven games.

The league adopted the new schedule yesterday by a 7-1 vote after deciding a previously adopted schedule was unworkable. President John Holland of the Los Angeles Angels and league president Leslie O'Connor worked out the new schedule, which still may be revised, for the last part of the season.

Series will open on Tuesday and last through Thursday. Clubs then will switch opponents for single games on Friday and Saturday and Sunday double-headers. There will be no games on Mondays except for holidays.

Season openers are Los Angeles at San Diego, Seattle at Hollywood, Portland at San Francisco.

Pacific Coast League baseball makes its debut in Vancouver, B.C. on April 27 when San Francisco travels to meet the former Oakland club which transferred its franchise.

The league's All-Star game will be held Aug. 13 at Portland, Ore. Players from Seattle, Portland, Vancouver and Sacramento will oppose a team of players from the four California teams.

The northern team will be picked by Portland fans. League newsmen will select the southern team.
