

Drive Defensively, Warns Bus Driver With 1,500,000 Miles of Accident-Free Driving

Editor's note: George Scott of Chicago, a Greyhound bus driver for 22 years, has driven 1,500,000 miles without an accident. After the Christmas and New Year week ends brought a combined toll of close to 1000 deaths on U. S. highways, the United Press asked Scott if he had any pointers for motorists who every day gamble their lives on our crowded highways.

Chicago—U.P.—The best safety slogan I can think of is: "Drive Defensively."
You might know what you're

going to do, but you can never count on the other fellow. The best way to stay alive is to stay alert.
I've been driving a bus for 22 years and I've never had an accident. I'm cautious—and lucky. I've had my share of close calls. Everyone does nowadays, no matter what, how or where he drives.
I drive for a living, not for pleasure. As a matter of fact, I

don't think there is such a thing as pleasure driving any more. I'd rather take a bus out than drive my own car. There are just too many cars on the road these days and too many careless drivers. It seems to me there are an awful lot of people driving cars who shouldn't be allowed behind the wheel. They're physically, mentally or emotionally unfit.
You'd be surprised at the number of hard-of-hearing drivers I encounter. I blow my horn to pass and the car ahead doesn't move, as if the driver doesn't hear. So I turn on my lights and he moves over.
Prefers Women

Speaking of passing, I would rather pass a woman driver than a man. A woman might not handle the car as expertly as her husband but as a rule she's more cautious. Lots of times she has her children with her and may be it's her maternal instinct.
We hear a lot about the causes of accidents—carelessness, drunken driving, speeding and downright selfishness. A little common courtesy would go a long way toward cutting down the death toll.
But there are some specific things, too. I don't think the average driver uses his rear view mirror or his side mirror often enough. Lots of cars don't

even have side mirrors. Commercial drivers like me learn that mirrors are as important as the windshield.
Power steering is a big help sometimes. If you have to hit the shoulder of the road, power steering makes it a lot safer and easier.
Check Shoulder
I think motorists should check the shoulder now and then so if they have to go out on it they'll know what to expect. I drive the Chicago-Toledo run, 242 miles, and it's mighty comforting to hit the Ohio Turnpike. The shoulders are wider than my bus.
I'm dubious about automatic

gear shifts. I think you can stop faster with the old standard shift, using the motor to brake the car and fanning the brakes at the same time.
A lot has been said pro and con about the horsepower they're building into cars these days. It enables you to pass more quickly but it might encourage some people to pass when they shouldn't.
You have to respect all that power. The scenicruiser bus I drive has 300 horsepower. I'm awfully careful with it.

Finland Candidate Friend of Russia

Helsinki, Finland — (U.P.) — Premier Urho Kekkonen, a friend of Soviet Russia, emerged today from Finland's presidential elections as the nation's most powerful political figure. He is almost certain to be elected president next month.
Kekkonen's Agrarian Party gained the most votes and the most seats in the electoral body which will name a president Feb. 15 on the basis of final unofficial results from the two-day elections.
Kekkonen captured votes which heretofore had gone to the Communist Peoples Democrats. But he was virtually assured of winning support of the Communist electors because of his proved ability to get along with neighboring Russia.
The results showed the Agrarians winning 89 seats of the 300 in the Electoral Assembly. The Communists, who finished third in the six-party race, captured 57 seats.
Kekkonen is almost certain to pick up the additional five votes necessary for the 151 vote majority to be named president.
Juho Paasikivi, 85, present president and most revered statesman in Finland, is not a candidate for re-election although the Russians asked him to run because of his friendliness to Moscow.

Kaiser Corporation Reports Net Earnings

Oakland, Calif.—(U.P.)—Kaiser Steel Corporation reported Tuesday net earnings of \$3,913,375 for the six months ending Dec. 31, compared to a loss of \$710,744 for the same six months a year ago.
Net earnings amounted to 87 cents a common share after payment of the dividend on 1,556,965 shares of preferred stock.
Sales for the six months were \$73,239,702 against \$53,729,130 for the same period in 1954.
A company spokesman said there has been no evidence of any decline in the demand for steel in the West. He said current operations are at capacity. Many departments of the company is establishing new records, he said.
