Stengel Says Yanks Loaded For 1956 Pennant Campaign

Glendale, Calif.—(U.P.)—The New York Yankees are "loaded" with talent at every position and do not need additional players, Manager Casey Stengel said.

"Of course, I ain't saying we will win the pennant again," Stengel said. "That depends on how well everybody pans out for us and how the other teams strengthen themselves."

Stengel, whose Yanks have won the American League championship in six of the last seven years, said he had men "for every position," however.

"Why, I got so many short-stops I can't even remember their names. Of course Phil Rizuto is still the best, but at his age 37 we got to have some help for him."

As additional infield strength, Stengel cited Gil McDougald, "a real major leaguer who can play anywhere," and Billy Martin, both of whom have been used successfully at third base, shortstop and second base.

Stengel said he planned to work Howard more behind the plate in 1956 than last year, first in the majors for the Yankees' first Negro.

Howard still will be used at times in the outfield, with Mickey Mantle, Hank Bauer, Irv Noren and Bob Cerv, Stengel added.

"Why should we trade around and bust up a team like that?" he asked. "A first division club has to be careful about trading to avoid being hurt."

W. G. Evans, AL Umpire, Club Manager, Dies

Miami, Fla.—(U.P.)—William G. (Rilly) Evans, prominent figure in the American League for four decades as an umpire and later a club official, died here Monday night of a stroke at the age of 71.

Evans, who was visiting his sons here Saturday when he suffered the attack, was an American League umpire for 22 years. Later he was general manager of the Cleveland Indians and the Detroit Tigers.

Evans, one of baseball's most colorful figures in modern times, never played a single game in professional baseball. Instead, he started his career in sports as a sports writer for the Youngstown, Ohio, Vindicator. Part of his duties there was to cover games in the Class D Ohio-Pennsylvania League.

Evans became general manager of the Cleveland Indians in 1927 and held that post for eight years. Later he held executive posts with the Boston Red Sox and the Detroit Tigers.

Funeral Services will be held in Cleveland.

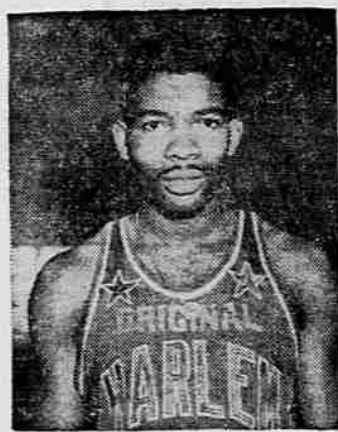

Kline, Wagner Among Globetrotters' Best; Will Play Thursday

Johnny Lee Kline and Ernest Wagner are two of the stars who are making the current Harlem Globetrotters one of the most interesting of Abe Saperstein's touring basketball clubs in recent years. Both will see action at Crater high school gym in Central Point Thursday night when the famed Negro quintet opposes the House of David. A 7 p.m. preliminary matches the YMCA against Yellow Cab and a five act professional variety show holds the spotlight during halftime of the game.

Tickets are on sale at Barker's Men's store and Lampert's Sporting Goods store and will be available at the gate, which opens at 6 p.m. There are no reserved seats.

Kline gained experience for his assignment with the Globetrotters as a member of the farm club Kansas City Stars.

The 24-year-old speedster from Detroit, Mich., is a well coordinated youth which may account for his holding seven high jump records while a student at Wayne University. He also was named All-American basketball player by Our Sport magazine.

Kline is well-schooled in the Trotters' style of play and razzle-dazzle basketball and was an all-sport man at Northeastern high school at Detroit before enrolling at Wayne.

Wagner, also from Detroit, is another farm club player who was rewarded with a promotion by Saperstein after last winter's program. Wagner helped to bring Wayne University to national prominence as a basketball school and was signed by Saperstein upon graduation. He traveled to Europe with the Globetrotters last summer, a tour on which he soon caught the eye of the owner-coach in demonstrating he was among the best of the Trotters.

Washbond Second In Bobsled Trials; Try To Move '60 Games

Cortina, Italy—(U.P.)—Bud Washbond, East Hartford, Conn., emerged as the chief United States threat for an Olympic gold medal in the two-man bobsled competition today by finishing second in the official trials.

Monti, a red-haired brush salesman from Cortina, had to set a record of 1 minute, 21.98 seconds in today's heat to beat the 31-year-old Washbond. Washbond was timed in 1:23.62 in today's run down the one-mile course with its 16 tricky curves.

Lamberto Dalla Costa of Italy was third with an aggregate time of 2:46.65 and Max Angst of Switzerland was fourth with 2:48.13. Art Tyler, Roch-

ester, N. Y., rounded out the first five with a total of 2:48.50. Fastest Sleds

The trials were held to determine the 20 fastest sleds in the field of 25. These 20 will race first when the official two-man competition begins Friday. The other crews will race after the 20 have taken their runs and will have no chance to make good times, because the track will be badly cut up by then.

The trials ended amid a growing battle over whether the 1960 games should be held in California and with a U.S. plea for a change in the bobsled rules that favor the Italians.

Austria has announced an all-out fight to take the 1960 games away from Squaw Valley, Calif., and the matter is due for a complete hearing before the Congress of the International Olympic committee during the next three days.

Donna Fox, U.S. member of the bobsled jury, who said Italian teams have found a way to use the present rules to give them an advantage—an edge that allowed them to dominate all the bobsled practice sessions on the Olympic course here.

The battle lines are drawn in the California vs. Austria competition for the 1960 games and the California delegation, whose spokesman is James Cushing, is confident of victory.

Dons See Cal As Possible Upset Team

San Francisco—(U.P.)—Coach Phil Woolpert, disdainful of the clamor that his USA Dons are cinches to win their 40th straight basketball game next Saturday night, warned today that the possibility of California "upsetting us is real good."

The candid Woolpert rated the Golden Bears as "a well balanced, good shooting team," during yesterday's session of the Northern California Basketball Writers association.

"We are on the spot until we drop one—which can happen anytime," Woolpert went on. "If we happened to look up on our work we could stub our toe Saturday night," Woolpert asserted. "But we're still a pretty good ball club and I think we'll be up for this one."

Pete Newell, whose rebuilding Bears have carved out a fine 9-3 mark this year and have everything to win and nothing to lose Saturday, took the humorous approach.

"Maybe we'll put blinkers on our kids, or point 'em the other way," the folksy Newell joked. "Anyway it will be an experience for those who haven't played against USA yet and we'll take the floor as scheduled."
