Public Hearing on Land Withdrawal 'Quite Likely'

Grants Pass—A public hearing on proposed withdrawal of land from mining entries along the Rogue river was termed "quite likely" by Virgil T. Heath, Portland, state supervisor for the Bureau of Land Management.

Heath stated, in a recent letter to L. C. Hansen, manager of the Grants Pass and Josephine County Chamber of Commerce, that a date for the possible hearing would be determined later. Heath pointed out in the letter that all proposed withdrawals are made subject to valid existing rights.

"This means," he explained, "that a valid mining claim location made before the date on which the withdrawal request was filed for notation on the Land Office records would not be affected... and such claims may be carried on to patent without any restrictions because of a withdrawal, provided, of course, compliance is made with general mining laws.

"Such withdrawals do not in any way affect patented lands, even though some such lands may have been listed in error." The proposed withdrawal includes federal lands one-half mile wide on both sides of the river from near Prospect in Jackson county to near Agnes, a distance of about 120 miles. Heath stated in the letter that much of the land has already been withdrawn from mining entry.

"None of the lands included in the proposed withdrawal have been open for mineral location for the past 25 years," he said, "except small areas which may have been restored after a determination of the federal power commission."

Much of the land was included in power site withdrawals which prohibit mining entry, Heath said.

Grants Pass Firm Submits High Bid On BLM Timber

Lloyd Timber company, Grants Pass, submitted high bid of \$62,971.70 for a tract of fire-killed timber offered for sale by the Medford district of the bureau of land management Jan. 19.

The tract contained an estimated 2,281,000 board feet of timber that was killed in the Sykes Creek fire in Sept. 1955. Price per thousand was Douglas fir, \$30; ponderosa pine, \$23.55; sugar pine, \$24; and incense cedar, \$7.

Lloyd Timber will be required to replant the 258 acre tract with ponderosa pine seedlings in order to get the area back into forest production, according to District Forester E. K. Peterson.

A smaller tract of timber killed in the same fire, which received no bids on Dec. 19, was sold to Olson-Ross lumber company, White City, Jan. 12, under timber sale regulations which allowed the bureau to accept offers for 90 days after the advertised sale date.

The tract, which sold for the appraised price of \$1224.70, contained an estimated 251,000 board feet located on 40 acres and will be planted to ponderosa pine by BLM early this spring, Peterson said.

Cruising is progressing as rapidly as possible on the remaining BLM fire damaged timber, Peterson said. According to present estimates, five or six more sales with a total volume of about 15,000,000 board feet will be necessary in order to dispose of all the damaged timber.

The regular February sale will be held Feb. 16 and will consist of an estimated 1,614,000 board feet of fire killed timber located on Jackson creek.
