HEAVY WOMEN MUST BE STRONG-WILLED

Heavy women who spend much time in the kitchen must be particularly strong-willed if they are to keep from nibbling all day.

It does not take much nibbling to make one put on weight. Bread and bread-stuffs are particularly hard on the would-be reducer. If I go to a restaurant and nibble at bread and butter while I am waiting for the waiter to bring me my food, I can easily gain a pound. Other persons put on weight by adding an extra fourth meal. They raid the refrigerator at bed-time, and this habit soon enlarges their waist measure.

One of the troubles we physicians face when we try to reduce stout persons is that they say, perhaps truthfully, "I don't eat much. I really eat less than my brother and sister, and they are thin." Because it is a chemical impossibility to gain weight if one is not eating more food than one needs to maintain activity and nutrition, I know that these people must be eating too much, probably between their meals. They must be nibbling, or they must be drinking bottled drinks that are full of sugar, or they must be eating too much during the morning and afternoon stretch, or they must be raiding the refrigerator at night. **Excess Fat Stored**

If, in the morning when I get on the scales, I find that I have gained a pound or two, I know of no alibi. I just know that during the preceding day I have eaten more than I needed, and I have stored the excess as fat. If I am to take it right off, for the next two days I must eat less than I would like to eat. The big secret in reducing is to eat much less starch and fat and sugar, and more of salads and vegetables and fruit. Always it is well to take, each day, some meat or chicken or fish — to maintain strength — and an egg and a glass of skim milk to get needed vitamins and minerals.

The person on a reduction diet must remember that 60 per cent of alcohol is burned in the body as a food, and hence if one drinks several cocktails or highballs or beers one can gain.

People should get over the idea that they can reduce by exercising. As I remember, someone once showed that in order to take off a pound of weight, one would have to walk about eight miles.

IBM Agrees To End Rental Business

Washington—(U.P.)—The government has announced that International Business Machines Corp. has agreed to break up its vast tabulating machine rental business in settlement of an anti-trust suit.

The firm must also release certain patents it owns, some on a royalty free basis and others for "reasonable" royalties, and provide American industry with technical know-how to operate the machines.

In the future, the firm must offer for sale all new tabulating and electronic data processing machines that it produces.

The consent judgment, filed in New York City, also permits persons now leasing IBM machines to buy them "for a reasonable" figure.

The original 1952 suit against the firm charged it had "monopolized the tabulating industry in the United States."

Funds Allocated From Liquor Commission

The Oregon liquor control commission has reported that warrants totaling \$363,186.90 are being allocated to counties, and incorporated cities.

Jackson county will receive \$4,163.42 of the total, while Medford will receive \$5,389.95. Other county cities, and the amount each will receive are Ashland, \$1,231.15; Butte Falls, \$171.04; Central Point, \$260.41; Eagle Point, \$49.31; Gold Hill, \$531.60; Jacksonville, \$311.26; Phoenix, \$285.05; Rogue River, \$292.76; and Talent, \$388.30.

Salem—(U.P.)—More than 1500 Oregon drivers had licenses suspended in 1955 through discretionary powers of the secretary of state's office.

Production Workers Get Highest Earnings

Salem—(U.P.)—Production employees of machinery manufacturing and plywood mills received their highest earnings on record during December to lead Oregon workers to new marks.

Average earnings of 122,000 product workers amounted to \$101.20 for a 43-hour week. Machinery industries averaged \$99.20 for a 42-hour week.

Printing and publishing employees still led with \$103.23 for 37.8 hours but the margin was much smaller than usual, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission said. Loggers and sawmill workers earned \$93.44.

Hiring of many temporary, part-time workers during the holidays held down average paychecks in trade-and in food processing. Considerable overtime for telephone men and truckers helped communications employees wages during the month.

Arrangements Made For Mausoleum at CP

Central Point—Final arrangements for a community mausoleum in the IOOF cemetery in Central Point have been announced by Wayland M. Frye of Grants Pass, who will finance construction.

Frye said construction plans will be announced later, when the size and material are determined.
