Miss Jean M. Applegate, 61, member of the Oregon pioneer Applegate family who had lived in Santa Barbara, Calif., for the past 20 years, died yesterday morning in Santa Barbara of burns suffered in an accident at her home early Sunday morning.

News of the accident and death was received here by Miss Applegate's brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Frank L. Applegate, 615 South Oakdale ave.

Miss Applegate, youngest daughter of well-known Capt. and Mrs. O. C. Applegate, Klamath Falls, Ore., often visited here and was in Medford last summer for a time.

According to reports by her relatives, Miss Applegate suffered extensive burns when a robe of synthetic material she was wearing caught fire from a gas stove burner.

Miss Applegate taught drama and English in Santa Barbara High school for 20 years. Funeral services are being held in Santa Barbara and interment will be in a family plot at Junction City, Ore., with graveside services to be held at that time.

Mr. Applegate and his daughter, Miss Ella Applegate, will go from Medford to Junction City for the service.

She is survived by two other brothers, Roy Applegate, Portland, and Oliver C. Applegate Jr., San Francisco, and a nephew Dr. Daniel Halferty, Portland.

Kefauver To Enter Minnesota Primary

Washington—(U.P.)—Sen. Estes Kefauver announced today he is entering the Minnesota Democratic presidential primary even though he faces "a difficult and uphill task" in challenging Adlai E. Stevenson there.

At the same time, the Tennessee Democrat charged that some party leaders in Minnesota had tried to circumvent the primary law by committing Minnesota Democrats in advance to Stevenson.

Minnesota is the third state in which Kefauver and Stevenson, the two chief contenders for the 1952 nomination, will meet headon.

The others are Florida on May 29 and California on June 6.
