

Tornado Girding For Roseburg Fracas Here on Saturday Night

Changes in the Medford Black Tornado starting line-up when it encounters the Roseburg high basketball quintet here Saturday night were seen as possible today.

Coach Frank Roelandt said that a number of the hoopers, who have had reserve roles in the past, have apparently hit their stride, blossoming out and showing better in drill. The mentor indicated that the players could move out previous regulars or, at least, see more extensive duty if they continue to flash their form in remaining workouts this week.

Roelandt particularly mentioned Ed Reinking and Gary Riley. He reported that Reinking looks very good and stated that Riley is coming along better now. Drill on defense.

The Black Tornado resumed practice yesterday after laying off Monday and Tuesday for a rest. There was long work on defense yesterday. "When you score 73 points (against North Bend Saturday) and can't win, something's wrong," Roelandt declared. A hard drill was slated this afternoon with an easier workout set for Friday.

Roelandt said that Tornado aims this week are to smooth out its attack and add to the offensive pattern as well as to strengthen its defense. While the Roseburg fray is non-conference, the definite objective is to get back on the win trail after losses to Marshfield and North Bend.

The Tornado received a possible setback yesterday when Larry Perkins, one of the leading reserves on the club, sprained his ankle. Seriousness of the injury was not learned this morning.

Medford will go into the Indian tussle with a record of 11 wins and four losses compared to Roseburg's six and five standing for the season. The Indians have split with Grants Pass, Suther-

lin and Reedsport, have taken two games from Myrtle Creek and have trimmed Springfield. Medford tripped the Indians in December. Eugene also has a victory over Roseburg, scoring 12 points in the last 1 2/3 minutes to do it.

Big gun of the Indians is Dick Woolstenhulme, star in past years at North Bend high. The 6-foot 3-inch forward is the leading scorer of the team with 153 points. He has a 13.9 average for 11 games. Guard Bill Oerding is

second high with 135 and a 12.3 average. Jerry Droscher, 6-1, is the only other likely starter over 6 feet. Lee Burkhardt and Rod Hoenisch, a freshman may round out the quint. A reserve who may see a lot of duty is Fred Skeels, 6-2.

The Roseburg fracas is a make-up for a game postponed in December. Action Saturday will be at Hedrick junior high with Roseburg and Medford javees playing in a 6:45 p.m. pre-lim.

Company A Captures Third Place In Medford Independent League

Company A of the National Guard won the play-off last night for third place in the Medford Independent Basketball League, getting by Hawkinson Tire Tread 56 to 49 in a closely contested battle which was settled in the final two minutes of play.

The verdict gives the Guardsman one of three MIBL slots in subdistrict AAU run-off games slated for February 18, 19 and 20. Prospect, regular season champion, and YMCA, which took second, have the other two.

In scuffles last night which wound up the regular schedule for the loop, Headquarters Company of the National Guard beat Moose lodge 55 to 44 and Prospect defeated Butte Falls. Score was not available.

Hawkinson's headed Company A 49 to 48 with two minutes left to play when Darrell John-

son swished a long one-hander. Seconds later in the skirmish Herb Trautman goaled from the side corner to give the Guard the lead 50 to 49. Four free shots by Joe Nolan, one by Jim Higginbotham and one by Denny Burns rounded out the count. Final score represented the widest margin between the clubs.

Score was tied six times in the game and there were 12 changes in the lead. Four of the deadlocks and eight of the lead switches were in the last half. For much of the final half the clubs were only one or two points apart. Halftime score was 25-11.

Higginbotham paced the Guard with 21 points and Trautman had 14. Bob Serak, who sank several long jump shots, tallied 14 for the Tirenmen. Bob Cavanaugh collected 10 for Hawkinson's.

The Tire team was on top 11 to 6 early in the fray. After Company A pulled up to lag by two points on three occasions, Hawkinson's extended to 19 to 13. The Guard pulled even at 19-all. Hawkinson's went back ahead 21 to 19 but Company A fought on top 25 to 21. A bucket by Derald Wooton and one by Lloyd Johnson knotted the game at the half.

In the second half the score was tied or alternated until the Guard went in front 38 to 37. The Militiamen stretched to 42 to 37 and had their fourth lead of five points at 48 to 43. Serak hit on a jumper, Dick Wallace on a steal and Darrell Johnson hit his long shot for the Hawkinson 49 to 48 edge.

Headquarters Company had only five men on hand for its game and finished the last six minutes with four when John Drew fouled out. Bruce Bateman rolled in 27 points for the winners and Gilmore had 18 for Moose.

Tenley Albright Cops Olympic Skate Title

Cortina, Italy — (U.P.) — Pert Tenley Albright, 20, Newton, Mass., ice ballerina, fought off the pain of an ankle injury today to win the women's Olympic figure skating championship with a brilliant performance in free figures.

Miss Albright, first American ever to win the Olympic women's crown, thus completed a U.S. sweep of the two Olympic figure skating championships. Hayes Alan Jenkins of Colorado Springs, Colo., won the men's title yesterday. These are the only two gold medals won in the 1956 classic.

The attractive New England girl, who became a world champion figure skater after recovering from a childhood polio attack, turned in a near-flawless performance in the free figures despite a throbbing pain in her right ankle.

Gene Littler, Palm Springs, Calif., one of the most successful young golfers in 1955, is defending champion in the tournament, scheduled this year over the long, narrow fairways of the Phoenix Country club course.

But Jimmy Demaret, Kiamesha Lake, N. Y., and Lloyd Mangrum, Apple Valley, Calif., who were making the tournament circuit when Littler still was in grammar school, walked off with top money at Palm Springs and Los Angeles, respectively.

Both Mangrum and Demaret have been effective in the past on the Phoenix Country club course. Mangrum, competing in the pro-amateur event Wednesday over the windswept course, turned in a two-under par score of 69.

Mangrum shared honors with Arnold Palmer, Latrobe, Pa., and Fred Hawkins, of El Paso, for the best score for a professional in the pro-amateur competition. The veteran golfer is a two-time victor at Phoenix, having last captured the event in 1953.

The pro-amateur provided a thrill for the biggest gallery of the day when Dizzy Dean, baseball sportscaster and hall of fame member, teamed with Jim Turnesa of Spring Valley, Calif., to card the winning best-ball score of 60.

Shaw Indicates He May Give Up Baseball Plans

Portland — (U.P.) — George Shaw, rookie quarterback of the Baltimore Colts, indicated today that he may have given up plans to play professional baseball as well as football.

Shaw, who is working for a bank here in the off season, was a star outfielder with the University of Oregon in college days and has been mentioned as a possible player with the Portland Beavers of the Pacific Coast league.

Asked if he was thinking about baseball, Shaw said, "Not very much. I've been too busy in my new job and right now I find myself liking football more and more."

Joe Ziegler, Portland general manager, said, however, that he hoped to talk to Shaw later this week and would be willing "to gamble a little" on him.

Muhlenberg Ends Temple Win Streak

And then there were two — San Francisco and St. Francis. Those were the only major college teams left on the unbeaten list today as mighty Temple was charged with a stunning 67-66 upset by Muhlenberg that ended the Owl's winning streak for the season at 13 games.

Temple came to grief in the hard fought game at Allentown, Pa., Wednesday night after falling 18 points behind in the early going, making it up midway in the second half, and then waging a see-saw battle for the last 10 minutes.

Temple, ranked seventh nationally by the United Press Board of Coaches, included a 12-point victory over Kentucky in its winning streak.

And so only San Francisco (15-0) and St. Francis of Brooklyn (14-0) are left alone in the unbeaten class among major colleges. St. Francis was reported unofficially to have accepted a bid to the National Invitation Tournament, the third team picked for the 12-team field.

Kentucky scored a stirring 81-76 victory over Duke at Lexington, Ky., Wednesday night in a game between two Dixie rivals both high in the national ratings. The ninth-ranked Kentucky Wildcats headed into the third period with a 20-point lead but nearly blew it. Each team now has a 12-3 record.

Dayton, the nation's No. 2 team which was knocked from the unbeaten ranks by Louisville last Saturday, returned to action and to the winning column with an easy 75-37 decision over Loyola, Ill., using only one first-stringer in the game, but taking a 42-15 halftime lead. Dayton's record now is 15-1.

A top conference game saw Arkansas nip Texas Christian, 74-72, to tie Southern Methodist for first place in the Southwest conference. The co-leaders will clash on Saturday night.
