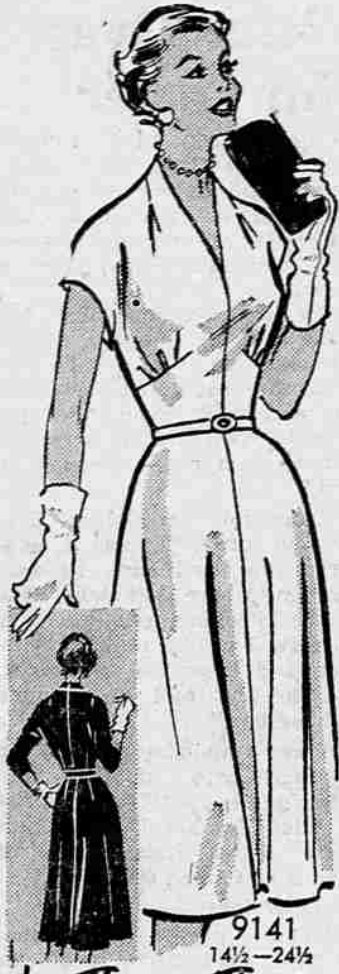

Strike Against Air Lines Continues

Los Angeles (U.P.)—A strike of Brotherhood of Railway Clerks against Western Air Lines ranked today as the longest strike in the airline's history. The strike entered its 24th day with negotiations still stalemated.

The 850 clerks struck Jan.

9 over demands for a \$50 monthly raise. Western closed its operations serving cities in 12 Western states and Canada, throwing about 2000 employees out of work.

Five persons were injured, none critically, in auto accidents yesterday in Jackson county.

A collision between a truck and a Southern Pacific switch engine at about 9 a.m. yesterday at the Talent Main st. railroad crossing, resulted in the injury of Mr. and Mrs. Manley James Porter, route 1, box 438, Talent, according to state police.

Porter told police that morning sunlight and frost on the windshield of his truck prevented him from seeing the warning signal. The truck was carried about 107 feet from the point of impact with the train. Mr. and Mrs. Porter were taken to Ashland General hospital by Lill-willer ambulance. Mrs. Porter suffered facial cuts and an injured collar bone. She was reported in fair condition at the hospital today. Porter was treated for facial cuts and released.

Unions Restive in Bay Area Strike

San Francisco (U.P.)—Four maritime unions appeared today to be getting restive at a four-month old strike of the Masters, Mates and Pilots union against the coast-wise shipping industry.

The Sailors Union of the Pacific has already voted to limit its support of the striking union to demands for the 1955 Pacific Coast maritime pattern, which involves \$25 to \$30 monthly pay increase.

The Marine Firemen, Marine Cooks and Stewards and Marine Engineers Beneficial Association were to meet today, presumably to take similar action.

The MMP has demanded contract changes which employers estimated would add \$152 to the monthly wage of every mate and master. The MMP estimated they would add no more than \$30.

The strike has cost the maritime unions 300 jobs and \$1,000,000 in wages.

WALL STREET

New York (U.P.)—Prices on the Stock Exchange turned higher late today, wiping out the losses accrued earlier in the session. Dealings were the slowest in three months.

All departments joined in the late recovery movement.

Motor shares staged a good recovery with Chrysler leading the way. It ran up more than 2 points. Directors of the company meet next Thursday on the first quarter dividend. General Motors directors meet next Monday.
