## The Medical Roundup

### FATS AND HEART DISEASE

Many persons ask what connection there is between the eating of fats and the coming of a heart attack. The common "coronary" attack is due to the plugging-up of one of the main arteries that supplies the heart with blood. Usually the artery plugs up because its lumen has become smaller and smaller from a hardening or thickening or a narrowing of the walls, or because a little ulcer has formed. This caused a roughening of the normally very smooth inner lining of the artery, and this led to the clotting of blood. The formation of the clot put an end to the flow of blood through the artery.

The next question is, Why did the little ulcer form? We doctors don't know exactly but we have been impressed by a number of things. One is that in the wall of the little ulcer we often find many crystals of a fat-like substance called cholesterol. To some extent it is formed out of the fats that we eat. Unfortunately, we cannot get all of the cholesterol out of our body, even when we do not eat any fat. But, especially if we are stout, usually it helps to reduce weight, and this is done by cutting down on the amount of fats eaten. Then the amount of cholesterol in the blood is likely to be diminished.

### Cholesterol in Blood

Recently, Dr. John Gofman, of Berkeley, Calif., has shown that persons who early get heart attacks almost always have, in their blood, large amounts of cholesterol, bound to certain large molecules. By estimating the number of such large molecules in the blood, Dr. Gofman can tell fairly well which persons are likely to get a heart attack. Fortunately, a reduction type of diet will cut down a good deal on the number of these large molecules in a person's blood. It is interesting that if one gives large amounts of cholesterol to chickens the amount of this substance in their blood will greatly increase, and they will tend to develop ulcers in their arteries.

Now, the problem is to find drugs that will lower the amount of cholesterol in the blood. Dr. Gofman has found that for some months it can be done with the help of some thyroid substance taken each day. Another substance called sitosterol appears to be a sort of antidote against cholesterol, but so far as I know, more work has to be done on this before it can come on the market as a medicine.

## Resigns Job With State Department

Washington — (U.P.) — Bryton Barron, who helped to compile the controversial Yalta papers for publication, has retired from the state department.

Barron, a veteran employee of the department's historical section, has been reported unhappy with the official version of the Yalta record which was made public last year. He is said to feel that important documents were left out.

Barron himself refused to comment on the case. He told a reporter he is scheduled to make an address in Chicago soon, and did not contradict reports that he may open fire on the state department at that time.

Barron, 57, had been with the department since 1929. He is a native of Iowa.

Reports last fall said the state department had disciplined Barron and Donald M. Dozer, 57, another state department historian who pressed for early publication of the Yalta conference record. Barron was reported placed on limited duty until becoming eligible for his retirement.
