

# NCAA Tournament Ticket Orders Not Accepted Until February 20

Oregon State College — Jim Barratt, OSC athletic business manager and manager of the 1956 Western NCAA regional hoop tournament to be staged here on March 16 and 17, has released information governing ticket distribution.

Barratt, who has been in charge of ticket sales at each of the four previous regional tournaments at Gill coliseum, predicted interest for this year's affair probably would be greater than ever before and advised fans to follow all regulations in procuring tickets.

First of all, mail orders and applications for tickets will be first accepted through the mails on Monday, Feb. 20. Applications and orders received earlier than that date will be returned.

A limit of four tickets per applicant will be followed, with one applicant to an envelope. All seats are reserved for each night. Each of the four participating teams will receive a minimum of 250 choice tickets per night to service their own students. Orders are to be filled by lottery.

At three of the last four tournaments held here, immediate sell-outs resulted. Last year, with

the OSC Beavers entered, the ticket office received some 7,000 mail orders and applications the first day orders were accepted. This resulted in some 2000 applicants missing out on tickets. The limit of four per customer is again imposed to spread the base among purchasers.

For the championship contest between University of San Francisco and OSC last March, a record crowd of 11,206 was established for the event here. In four years, some 78,000 fans have been on hand at Gill coliseum.

On Friday, March 16, the Pacific Coast conference champion will play the California Basketball association winner. At 9:30 p.m. winner of an earlier play-off between a selected member-at-large and the Rocky Mountain conference champ will meet the Mountain States conference titlist. On Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

## Legislators Told Cherberg Fired Because of Complaint To Press

Seattle, Wash.—(U.P.)—A legislative group was told yesterday that Johnny Cherberg was fired at Washington football coach because he complained to the press that his assistants were barred from a "gripe session" with his players.

H. P. (Dick) Everest, university vice-president, told a three-man executive committee of the Legislative Council that there was feeling on the part of Athletic Director Harvey Cassill following the Jan. 19 meeting that the "situation was resolved far enough."

"Then, suddenly," Everest continued, "John moved into the newspapers with the non-appearance of coaches."

"Was that why he was fired then," asked Rep. John O'Brien, speaker of the House and chairman of the council.

"If I did the same thing, I'd get to my desk, clean out my personal papers and start looking up my home address," replied Everest. "Johnny started the whole thing boiling again."

Cherberg was fired Jan. 27 by Cassill, whom Everest said had "full authority" to take such action. Cassill contended that the coach had not quelled dissatisfaction among the players.

O'Brien said Cherberg would be heard by the three-man group next Tuesday. He explained if the executive committee decided that the Washington athletic department needed investigating, such action would be recommended to the council as a whole.

"Something good may come if we can do anything to eliminate the tremendous amount of publicity given the discharge of a football coach," said O'Brien.
