

Winter Olympics To End Today; Russians Win In Cross-Country

Cortina, Italy — (U.P.) — The seventh Winter Olympics end today with the event which many fans regard as the most spectacular in the games — the special ski jump.

A total of 53 top jumpers from 17 countries are entered for the competition on the "Trampolino Italia" hill.

They will come down a 35-degree angled run, and soar out into space at about 80 miles an hour.

Cortina, Italy — (U.P.) — Russia's snow and ice stars clinched the unofficial team championship in the winter Olympics Saturday by winning the ice hockey tournament and the gruelling, 24-mile cross-country ski race.

Appearing in the winter games for the first time since Czarist days, the Soviets picked up their sixth gold medal and an important 10 points when their high-scoring hockey team followed up Friday's 4-0 victory over the United States by downing Canada, 2-0.

Canada had ruled as a slight favorite in the hockey tournament but was no match for the undefeated Russians in Saturday's climatic showdown game.

The United States ice hockey team, which bounced back yesterday with a 9-4 victory over Czechoslovakia, wound up a surprising second in the round robin tournament. This silver medal was worth five points and enabled the Yanks to tie Switzerland for fourth place in the overall standings with 5 1/2 points.

There is no official team championship in Olympic competition. But with points awarded on a 10-5-4-3-2-1 basis for the first six places in each event the Russians now have totaled 121 points. Austria, runner-up with 78 1/2, has no chance to catch Russia in tomorrow's final event — the special ski jumping.

The United States won the unofficial winter games team titles in 1924, 1928 and 1932. Norway led in 1936, Sweden in 1948 and Norway again in 1952.

While Fedor Terentiev, Pavel Kiltchin, Nikolav Anikin and Kuzin won the cross-country test in two minutes, 15.30 seconds, Switzerland's wily, 47-year-old Franz Kapus outfoxed the world's top bobbleheaders on the hole-dotted chute to win the four-man title.

Kapus, who suffered a broken back on the one-mile, 109-yard Cortina course in the 1954 world championships, lulled 20 rival teams into a sense of security by making slow practice

runs. But he bettered the old course record three times during four championship heats to win with an aggregate of five minutes, 10.44 seconds.

Kapus won by more than a second, a tremendous margin in the daredevil sport. Italy's red-haired Eugenio Monti was second with 5:12.1 and Art Tyler, 40-year-old Rochester, N.Y., physicist, won the bronze medal with 5:12.39.

Tyler made a far better showing than the rest of the American bobbers and skiers.

Southern Oregon Subdues EOCE Mountaineers 89-83

Portland State increased its lead in the Oregon Collegiate conference basketball race Friday night by thumping Oregon Tech, 81-74, while second-place Eastern Oregon College of Education was dropping an 89-83 contest to Southern Oregon College of Education.

The Portland State-Oregon Tech game at Klamath Falls was close all the way with only four points separating the teams through much of the second half.

Jerry Fasten scored 19 points for the Owls. Jack Viskov was Portland State's big gun with 18.

The win gave Portland State an 8-1 conference record.

Ashland — Southern Oregon college whipped Eastern Oregon 89 to 83 here Friday night to put a damper on Oregon Col. legiate conference mapletout aspirations of the Mountaineers.

Red Raider triumph moved the pennant a little farther from Eastern Oregon grasp.

Action was nip and tuck in the early minutes. Southern Oregon had an 8 to 7 margin with about four minutes played. They didn't trail after that and really took command about midway through the opening half when Hollingsworth got a pair of gifters and Ted Tenney a bucket on a fast break for 23 to 19.

Halftime score favored Southern Oregon 43 to 35. About five minutes into the second half the Red Raiders had a bulging spread of 23 points, 64 to 41. The Mounties picked up stride a bit after that and with 9 1/2 minutes remaining to be played had cut the gap to 15 points, 70 to 55.

Coach Ted Schopf began sending in reserves one by one and until a complete club of non-starters were on the floor. That gave Eastern Oregon chance to close the gap still farther before the final gun.

Hollingsworth Gets 32
Scoring honors went to Hollingsworth who got 32 markers before fouling out with six minutes to play. Tenney, another sparkling hometown hero added another 21 to the Raider score. Ted Schadewitz was high for EOCE with 20.

The two clubs averaged out about even statistically. Southern Oregon canned 30 out of 75 field goals for a .400 mark and the Mounties had 28 for 72 for .388. Each had .659 average from the free throw line, the Raiders making 29 of 44 and Eastern Oregon 27 of 41. SOC snared 47 rebounds and EOCE 42.

Three Mounties fouled out, Ken Westenskow early in the second half, Bill West with about 10 minutes to go in the game and Gary Burton with five to play.

Hollingsworth shot 11 for 15 from the field for Southern Oregon and Tenney eight for 21 including a two-hander from midcourt just before the half-time buzzer.

Lloyd Hoffine, usually high scoring Raider forward, was held to one field goal in seven tries in his battle with Schadewitz. He had a six point total for the night. Schadewitz picked up six goals while Hoffine was in

action and sank three quick fielders and a couple of free shots after he left.
