

# Dons, Bruins Rematching Seen Likely

San Francisco — (U.P.) — A rematch seems to be shaping up between the fabulous University of San Francisco Dons and the UCLA Bruins to determine what team will represent the West Coast in the NCAA championships.

The top-ranked Dons took a firm grip on the California Basketball association lead Friday night, while the Bruins scored their fifth win without a defeat in Pacific Coast conference play.

If these two teams win their respective titles, they will meet in the NCAA regional playoffs. But it won't be their first meeting. USF humiliated UCLA in the finals of the Holiday tourney at Madison Square Garden last December.

Still Different

There was quite a difference in Friday's games, too. The Dons trimmed Loyola of Los Angeles, 68-46, using a benchful of reserves, while the Bruins battled tooth and nail to get a 61-60 victory over Washington.

The UCLA-Washington game was a crucial one. Washington was tied for second place with Southern California going into the game, but the Huskies' defeat, coupled with Oregon's 55-45 victory over USC, pushed idle Stanford into the No. 2 spot.

In the only other PCC game, California dumped Oregon State, 65-63, in an overtime contest. Washington State and Idaho were also idle. Standings as of Friday with conference records were: UCLA (5-0), Stanford (6-2), USC (5-2), Washington (5-2), California (3-2), Oregon (3-4), Oregon State (2-7), Washington State (1-5) and Idaho (1-7).

Last Second Shot

Willie Naulls dropped in a last-second shot for the Bruin victory after Washington took a 60-59 lead with just a minute remaining.

A crowd of 5,500 fans at San Francisco watched the top-ranked Dons rack up 12 points before Loyola scored its first field goal. All-America center Bill Russell netted 14 of his 16 points in the first half to pace the Dons to a 35-22 halftime lead.

When San Francisco increased its margin to 49-25 early in the second half, Coach Phil Woolpert yanked his regulars.

# UCLA Downs Wash. 82-75

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — UCLA's fast-breaking Bruins, led by jumping Morrie Taft's 21 points yesterday defeated Washington 82-75, to tighten their hold on the Pacific Coast conference basketball lead. It was the Bruins' sixth straight PCC win without a loss.

Washington held a 40-39 half-time edge in the regionally televised game played at Pan Pacific auditorium. But a crowd of about 2,500 fans watched the Bruins take command midway in the second half, opening up a 64-58 lead which never was threatened. With only three minutes left to play, UCLA led 81-68.

The win gave UCLA a sweep of the two-game series. Washington now is 5-3 in PCC play. The first half was a see-saw battle, with not more than three points separating the teams at any time as the lead changed hands often. When star Husky forward Jim Coshov fouled out only a minute after the start of the second half, however, Washington found itself in a losing battle to keep up with the speedy Bruins.
