Warsaw—A tremendous ovation has been accorded the American Everyman Opera company for its brilliant premier performance in Warsaw of George Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess."

The all-Negro troupe played before a capacity opening-night audience which included Aleksander Zawadzki, President of the Council of State; Premier Jozef Cyrankiewicz; United States Ambassador Joseph E. Jacobs; members of the diplomatic corps, and leading workers and cultural figures of the capital.

After the playing of the Polish and American national anthems, Ambassador Jacobs was invited to the box of Foreign Minister Stanislaw Skrzyszewski and Minister of Culture and Art Wlodzimierz Sokorski. A reception in honor of the troupe was given by Mr. Sokorski later in the evening.

The musical drama which opened January 24 and will continue to February 1 is being shown at the Warsaw State Opera house. Two performances are being given daily.

During its stay in Warsaw, the company has visited many of the capital's historic sites and has met with theatrical and musical groups including the famous Mazowsze Song and Dance ensemble.
