World's Only College for Deaf Located At Washington; Sports, Drama Popular

Washington — (U.P.) — The world's only college for the deaf has systems worked out for "knocking" on dormitory doors and "ringing" bells for fire alarms.

Gallaudet college, a government-sponsored institution here, is much like other colleges as far as studies, sports and campus activities go. The only difference is that its 300 students communicate almost entirely by sign language.

And since most of the pupils could not hear a fire alarm, a special master switch turns on lights which flash on and off all

over campus. Students living in dormitories also use a heavy sash-weight knocker suspended in the door jamb which a visitor may use by dropping it. The vibration announces the caller to the student.

Classroom discussions are lively and often heated although most students specialize in fields that require little conversation and much thought. Professors and instructors, who may or may not be deaf themselves, simultaneously speak the words and signal with their hands. Students who lip-read are aided by this method.

Extracurricular activities such as dancing, "listening" to music

by vibrations and printing a newspaper and magazine are also enjoyed by the student body.

The dramatics club recently presented a performance of "Macbeth" entirely in sign language. An interpreter who sat backstage spoke the lines for the benefit of persons in the audience with normal hearing.

While some members of the cast have some speech, sign language is said to be most effective for the deaf.

Some years ago, the cast of the college's production of "Arsenic and Old Lace" was transported to New York where it replaced the Broadway cast for one night.

Though deafness impairs the sense of balance which an athlete needs, sports are very popular here. This handicap and a small enrollment did not prevent Gallaudet from winning several conference champion-

ships in the letter sports and wrestling.

The 97-acre campus also includes a training center for teachers of the deaf. These teacher-trainees have normal hearing and usually work with about 100 youngsters of elementary school age.

Gallaudet was founded by congress in 1864 through the efforts of Edward Miner Gallaudet, a pioneer in education for the deaf and college president for 46 years. Its charter was signed by Abraham Lincoln.

The school is plagued by inadequate space and turns back two-thirds of the students applying from 48 states and several foreign countries.

Houseful of Furniture Buying Comes Only Once in Lifetime

Chicago — (U.P.) — Most people buy a houseful of furniture only when they get married or get rich.

Which means, a spokesman for the furniture industry says, that most homemakers buy furniture for the whole house at a time only once in their lives.

"It's more a matter of replacement, either by the piece or by the room, or of rebuilding furniture they already have," said Gen. Lawrence Whiting, president of the American Furniture Mart.

Whiting said most people buy furniture to fulfill expanding family needs or to replace worn out furnishings, not "because the spirit moves them."

"Most people exhaust all other methods before they replace an item of furniture," said Whiting. "They slip-cover upholstered pieces, rebuild and paint or refinish most other pieces."

The average upholstered piece is good for between six and 10 years, depending on the wear, and then it should be "redone" or replaced, he said.

"Appliances are different," said Whiting. "After you've repaired beyond repair, you must have to get a new refrigerator, stove, or toaster."

He said it used to be difficult to tell which room in the house was "done over" most frequently. But the answer is easy now.

"It's the living room," he said. "And the reason? Television."

ORANGE TAPIOCA

All-popular dessert is orange tapioca pudding. Combine 4 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca, 1/2 cup sugar, dash of salt and 2 1/2 cups reconstituted frozen orange juice in a saucepan, mixing well. Cook over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil. Remove from heat. Cool, stirring once after 20 minutes. Cover and chill. Serve with plain or whipped cream and garnish with fresh orange segments.

HASH GOES HAWAIIAN

New York — (U.P.) — Leftover ham is festive when combined with pineapple. For Hawaiian Hash, combine 2 cups each of cut-up, cooked ham and mashed sweet potatoes. Add a dash of mustard and 1/2 cup of pineapple juice. Pour into a buttered, shallow casserole and top with 8 half-slices of pineapple. Sprinkle with brown sugar and dot with butter. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) about 30 minutes.

GINGERBREAD TOPPING

New York — (U.P.) — A top topping for cake or gingerbread: combine 1/4 cup of molasses with 1 teaspoon of cinnamon; 1/4 teaspoon of cloves; and a pinch of salt. Gradually add the mixture to 1 cup of whipped cream. This recipe makes enough to "ice" 2 eight-inch square cake layers.

Tip for a rainy day: let the children cut up some of the year's Christmas cards. If you wish, you can paste the card design on heavy cardboard, then cut into various shaped pieces and you have a jigsaw puzzle.
