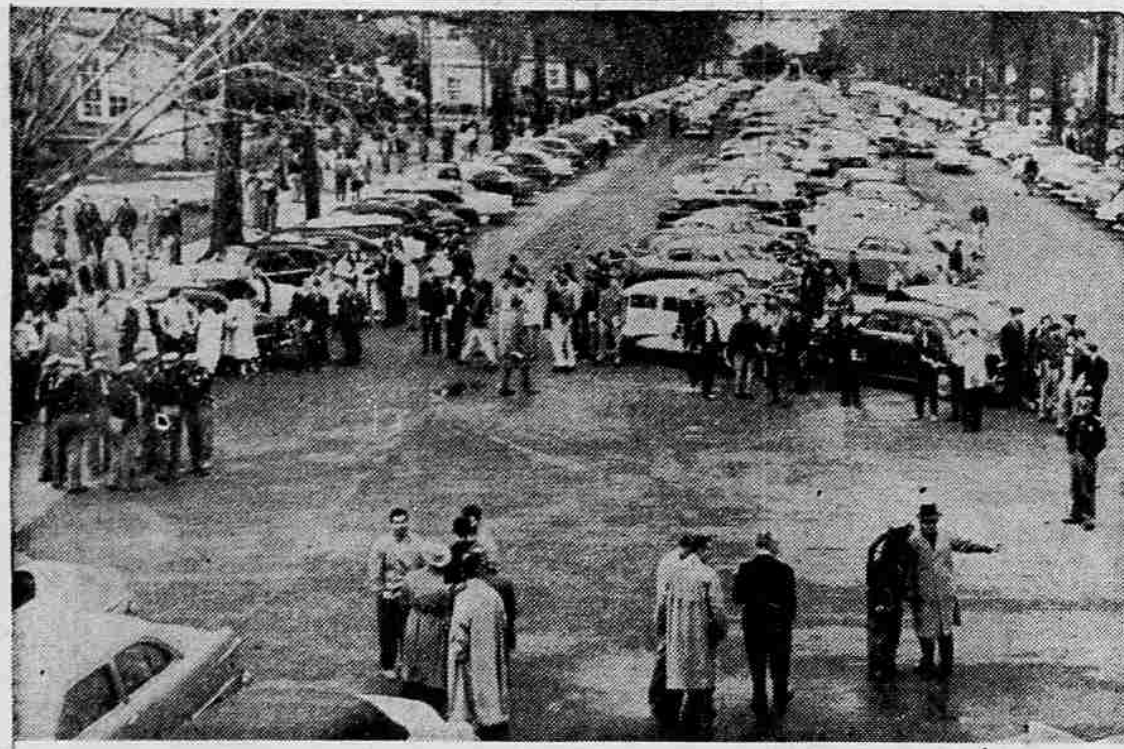




ALABAMA MOBS WIN RACE RIOT—A view of the Mall at the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa as students gathered in demonstration against admission of the first Negro, 26-year-old Autherine Lucy, to classes at the university. School trustees voted to use "police powers" to exclude the girl from classes after mobs threw stones and eggs. O. C. Carmichael, university president, warned that violence might force the university to close. Demonstrators threw an egg and gravel at Mrs. Carmichael and two eggs pelted Police Chief W. C. Thompkins.

Contempt Charge Against Dean Of Alabama School Dismissed

Birmingham, Ala.—(U.P.)—A federal judge today dismissed a contempt charge filed against a University of Alabama dean for refusing to admit a second Negro to the school.

The action by Judge Hobart Grooms tended to lessen for the moment mounting tension over the race crisis at the state university at Tuscaloosa which has suspended one Negro coed after riotous demonstrations.

Today's phase of the drama came in federal court here where a Negro attorney pressed demands that Dean W. F. Adams be cited for contempt of court for refusing to admit Mrs. Polly Ann Hudson as a journalism student.

Postponement Sought

A federal court decree had ordered that Adams enroll "all qualified persons regardless of race."

Both Mrs. Hudson and Autherine Lucy, the coed whose admission to Alabama caused a big

uprising earlier in the week, are Negroes.

Mrs. Hudson's lawyer moved for a postponement of the hearing on grounds that Miss Lucy's suspension would mean that "Mrs. Hudson would not be allowed to enroll at this time anyway."

Adams rejected Mrs. Hudson's application for enrollment after the university's board of trustees ruled she was not entitled to admission on moral grounds. The board pointed out that she is seeking a divorce.

Police Powers Employed

The same board barred Miss Lucy from the school on Monday, days after she began attending classes in library science. It decided to employ "police powers" to keep her away from the school after two days of severe demonstrations in which eggs and stones were hurled.

Trustees said the action was taken to restore order and to

insure safety "for all concerned."

The next day Negro attorney Arthur Shores, who represents Miss Lucy and Mrs. Hudson, said he would give the university just 48 hours to readmit Miss Lucy or "face further legal action."

He was expected to point out in court today that the deadline for his ultimatum arrives this afternoon.

Challenges Police Power

Shores said the "police power" the board used to exclude Miss Lucy can be overruled by "constitutional rights."

He said the university's action in rejecting Mrs. Hudson, 23, had no foundation.

He indicated he might petition the federal district court to cite each member of the board for contempt if they disregard the deadline.

The university campus at Tuscaloosa was calm and orderly today. The university claimed a large part of the rioters were "outsiders," but a student segregation leader disputed the claim and said most were students.

Gov. James Folsom was told Wednesday night in a formal report on the situation that the Monday rioters intended to kill Miss Lucy.

At his news conference Wednesday, President Eisenhower said he "deplored" the mob action.

UCLA Fraternities In Racial Dispute

Los Angeles —(U.P.)—UCLA's 33 fraternities are expected to follow the lead of 22 campus sororities by withdrawing from the student government in a dispute over a study being made of racial restriction clauses in their constitutions.

The Panhellenic council, representing the school's sororities, withdrew yesterday from the student government rather than submit to the student legislative council report on the number of racial restriction clauses in their constitutions. The Interfraternity council is expected to take similar action next week.

About 20 per cent of the school's 15,000 students are fraternity and sorority members. Spokesmen for the Panhellenic and Interfraternity councils told the Associated Student Body of UCLA that their constitutions were national rather than local in most cases.

The social groups said that submitting information on their constitutions and placing membership requirements under regulations of the student body would conflict with rulings of their national groups.

Withdrawals by the sororities mean the group would have no representative on the student legislative council.

Negro Coed Turns Down Copenhagen School Offer

Copenhagen, Denmark —(U.P.)—Autherine Lucy rejected an invitation to study at the University of Copenhagen because the Negro co-ed wants to continue her fight for admission to the University of Alabama, the newspaper Politiken said today.

The invitation was extended Wednesday by the Danish "League for Tolerance" to the Negro student whose admission to the University of Alabama touched off a campus riot. The league offered to pay Miss Lucy's transportation and tuition costs.

Divorce Study Shows Most Mothers Rewed Within Two Years

New York —(U.P.)—A Kinsey-type study of divorce just published indicates three out of four divorced mothers in America remarry or are on the way to remarry within two years after their divorce.

Those with more children seem to remarry faster than those with fewer children.

A divorcee of 30 has, statistically, a better chance of catching a husband than a single woman of the same age.

These and other aspects of divorce that run counter to some accepted ideas on the subject were turned up in a study conducted by William J. Goode, a Columbia University sociologist from Houston, Tex. He got his data from exhaustive interviews with 425 divorced mothers in Detroit, Mich.

The study, published this week as a hard-cover book by the Free Press of Glencoe, Ill., is more concerned with a woman's adjustment after divorce than with the causes of divorce. In this respect it is one of the first major field studies of its kind.

Divorced wives are more likely to get the house and furniture when there is a property split, but the study showed they fare poorly in getting money from their ex-husbands for child support. Only one-third of the moth-

ers interviewed said they could count on receiving support payments regularly.

Younger divorcees, in the 20-24 age group, begin dating again sooner after their divorce than older women but they are slower to remarry. Women 25 to 35 remarry the soonest, while those over 35 have the lowest remarry rate.

Monaco Stamp Will Honor Prince, Fiancee

Monte Carlo —(U.P.)—A new stamp bearing the likeness of Prince Rainier III and Grace Kelly will be issued shortly, Monaco officials announced today.

The stamp office said it had enough pictures of the Prince but was searching for a suitable one of Miss Kelly. What they have in mind, officials said, is a picture "in which Miss Kelly is looking serious."

The issue will be limited and priority will be given to the 18,000 regular subscribers to the Monaco Stamp office.

The new stamp is scheduled to go on sale April 19. It will be issued in a series of eight monetary values "in commemoration" of the marriage of the Prince to Miss Kelly.

Recommend County Health Department To Siskiyou Board

Yreka—Dr. S. E. Lamb, county physician, and Dr. John De-ment, of the California state board of health, recently recommended to the Siskiyou county board of supervisors that a county health department be established.

Dr. Lamb pointed out that Siskiyou county has a higher rate of disease than the rest of the state, and that the tubercular rate alone is about three times higher than elsewhere.

He pointed out that a health department could exercise and enforce preventive measures which could lower the disease rate. He cited as an example a recent case of fatal tubercular meningitis to a seven-year-old county youth.

Reduce Hospital Load

He also said a health department would reduce an increased load on the county hospital through preventive measures, as well as conduct a public education program on health and sanitation.

Dr. Dement explained the cost of financing such a department, pointing out it would cost about 42 cents per capita to start the program.

The supervisors delayed action on the recommendation pending additional study of the proposed plan.

Atlantic Scanned For B26 Bomber

Halifax, N.S. —(U.P.)—An armada of planes searched today for survivors of a downed U.S. Air Force bomber believed to be tossing helplessly in a rubber dinghy in the storm-lashed Atlantic ocean.

An Air Force spokesman said the search area was being lashed by heavy rains today. Rough seas are hampering the search.

The Air Force said the only hope for the survivors would be if they had lashed themselves to the dinghy and could survive the tempest.

A spokesman for the USAF Sixth Air Rescue Unit at Fort Pepperell, Nfld., said the pilot ditched his twin-engine bomber carrying three men late Wednesday when heavy ice formed on its wings.

The plane, one of two flying from Keflavik, Iceland, to Goose Bay, Labrador, was last heard from about 5:30 p.m. (EST). At that time the crew of the second B-36 heard the pilot radio that he could not carry on. The second plane also was heavily coated with ice but completed its overwater flight.

PIPE BURNS WOMAN
