Medford corporation will resume full sawmill operations Monday, it was announced this morning by B. L. Nutting, manager.

The big mill in Medford has been shut down for annual winter repairs since Jan. 20, he said. The situation this year was complicated by floodwaters which took out six bridges on the company's railroad to its logging

operation headquarters near Butte Falls. Because of high waters, repairs could not be completed until last week, but the hauling of logs to Medford started yesterday, Nutting reported.

Logging has continued during the shutdown, and a considerable supply of logs is now on hand, both in decks and in the pond.

Some employees have been laid off since Jan. 20, and some of them have been employed "on and off." About 350 will resume full-time work Monday, Nutting stated.
