

New Enlistments Are Announced by Local National Guard Units

Several new enlistments were announced recently by officials of Medford's units of the National Guard, bringing the companies to the largest strength since they were in federal service during World War II.

Units stationed in Medford include Headquarters company, first battalion, and Company A, both of the 136th infantry.

Additions to Headquarters company include Maurice Butts, Eldon G. Francis and Raymond E. Cox, all of Medford, and enlistments include Pfc. Arlen W. Hukill, SP3 David R. Ashton, and Sfc. Paul J. Blair. Officers transferred to battalion headquarters are Captain Roy L. Huson, former commander of Company A, and Captain Thomas E. Engle, former commander of Company B.

Total Personnel

The additions to Headquarters and Headquarters company brought the total personnel to 81, but because of transfers, two openings remain in the units. Full strength of the units is 99 men.

Enlisting in the company last week was Ken Jacks, route 1, box 487, Medford, who is a member of the Melody Wranglers. Sfc. Blair received orders and left for Ft. Benning, Ga., Friday. He will attend the advanced non-commissioned officer course which will continue until June 16.

Guard officers attributed the increase in enlistments to the Ready Reserve Act, which provides that military obligations may be fulfilled through the National Guard.

A one-day campaign throughout the country will be held Feb. 19, to recruit some 75,000 Guardsmen in the United States, Puerto Rico, Alaska and Hawaii. The goal was set by Congress for this fiscal year. The one-day drive will include a two-hour drill period by local units, followed by a house-to-house recruiting campaign.

The armory on North Bartlett st. will be open for inspection, and refreshments will be served. Representatives of the National Guard will be available to provide information on military obligations of young men.

TRAINING PROGRAM

More than 2,200 recruits enlisted under the Army's six-month training program for men between 17 and 18½ during the first three weeks of January, according to the Oregon Military district headquarters. Under the program, young men may enlist for six months active duty, and 7½ years of Ready Reserve duty in local units.

NAVY PROGRAM

The Navy has announced a program to receive applications for active duty for certain ranks from reserve officers.

Applications are being accepted from line, aviation line, supply corps and civil engineer corps officers of ensign, lieutenant (junior grade) and lieutenant; medical service corps ensigns through lieutenants; nurse corps officers of lieutenant and below; and medical and dental corps officers, all grades.

Applicants must remain on active duty for at least three years with the exception of medical, dental and nurse corps, who must remain on active duty two years.

Fish Spawn Damaged By Christmas Floods

Portland — (U.P.) — Salmon and steelhead runs in Oregon streams may be sharply reduced for the next several years because of extensive flood damage to fish spawn, the State Fish Commission said Thursday.

M. T. Hoy, state fisheries director, said the Christmas week floods dealt Oregon fisheries one of the greatest blows in years.

Most serious loss occurred at gravel spawning beds where eggs and newly hatched fry were destroyed.

Hoy said that on the Siletz river an entire spawning bar was washed away, destroying thousands of eggs and young fish. He pointed out that the present fish cycle will not be complete for three to five years and the flood damage would be felt in reduced salmon and steelhead runs of the future.

More Polio Vaccine Released In Oregon

Portland — (U.P.) — An additional 8,901 shots of Salk polio vaccine has been allocated to Oregon.

Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, said the federal allotment brings the total number of cc's of the anti polio vaccine released to Oregon to 222,108 since July 1, 1955. He estimated some 200,000 shots have been given in the state.

The latest release will go to private physicians.
