The Medical Roundup

Many Thanks Go To Many Kind Persons Day after day during the holiday season my secretary picked out of my huge pile of mail lovely letters from kind men and women everywhere who said that they love this column and have received much help and encouragement from it. Some felt that their life or health or the life or health of a loved one had been saved by a timely warning. One man had suddenly realized that he was neglecting a serious disease of his eyes that could have deprived him of his sight. A mother was very grateful because, after reading a column on diabetes, she realized that her little daughter had a bad form of the disease.



Several women wrote that I had given them the courage to retain a fibrotic uterus; several were very grateful because I had put them in touch with an expert on epilepsy who had stopped a child's convulsions; dozens wrote that they were happy now that they no longer feared their migrainous fuzzy-eyed spells.

Many spoke of their great hunger for authentic medical information. To all of you good people who wrote me so kindly at Christmas time I am very sorry that, in my terribly busy days, I did not have time in which to answer all of you personally.

A Big Medical Convention For Laymen

I recently returned from California where I had the pleasure and privilege of working with the doctors of the huge Los Angeles County Medical Society and their Assistant to the President and Director of Public Relations, Jerry Pettis, as they put on the first "Cavalcade of Health" for lay men and women. They filled the great hall of the Shrine Auditorium with over 140 interesting exhibits designed to show laymen how their bodies are built and how they run in health and disease. There was an operating-room with manikins representing surgeons and anesthetists and nurses hard at work.

There were several theaters in which, all day, operators kept showing movies of medical interest, and there were other theaters in which lecturers, like me, held forth day and night. For ten days men and women and children crowded in, hungry for information. I have an idea that, now that the ice is broken and a precedent has been set, and physicians have seen that no harm came of sharing knowledge with laymen and no prestige was lost, many more such cavalcades will appear in the cities of this land. I hope, also, that more permanent medical museums will be built.

(Q) "When I was a boy, I felt that my parents were older, wiser, and more experienced than I. For that reason, I was glad to get their opinions on problems that troubled me. He thinks he knows it all and won't listen to anything his mother or I tell him. He has been this way for several years and is getting worse rather than better.

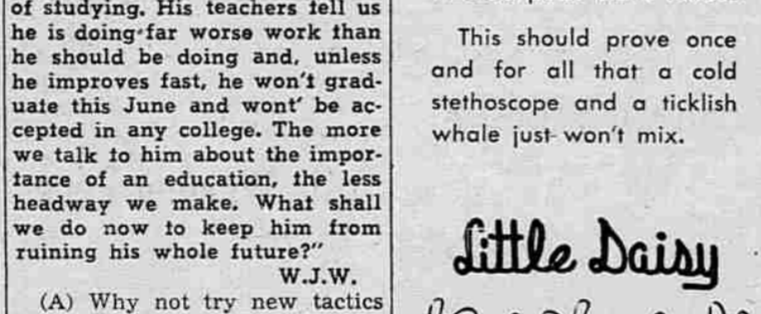

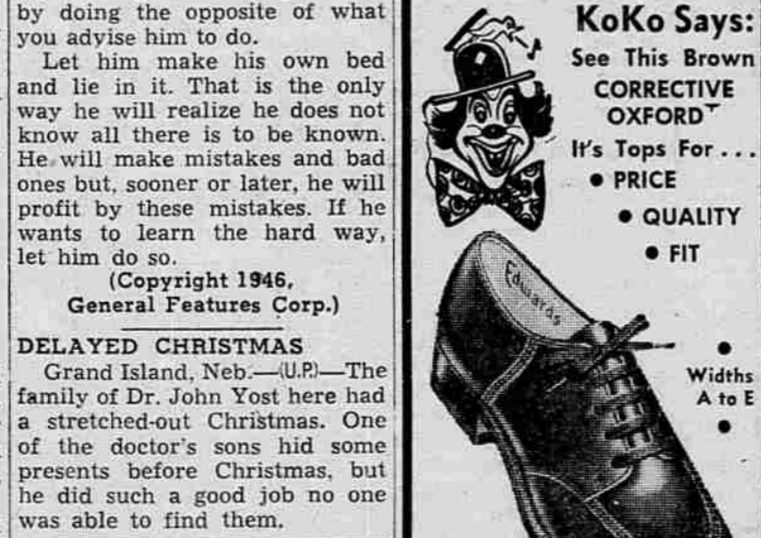


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Livestock, Poultry Value Decreases

Washington—(U.P.)—The Agriculture Department said yesterday the value of livestock and poultry on U. S. farms and ranches on Jan. 1 was \$10,757,612,000, down four per cent from a year ago.

The number of livestock and poultry showed a net increase of 2 per cent during 1955. The aggregate increase resulted from a substantial boost in hogs and a small increase in cattle. Sheep, horses, mules, chickens, and turkeys were down from a year ago.

There were a record 97,465,000 head of cattle as of Jan. 1, compared to 96,592,000 head a year ago. Hogs numbered 55,088,000 head against 50,474,000 head a year earlier. Sheep dropped from 31,582,000 on Jan. 1, 1955, to 31,109,000 on Jan. 1, 1956. The horse and mule population on Jan. 1, was 3,962,000.

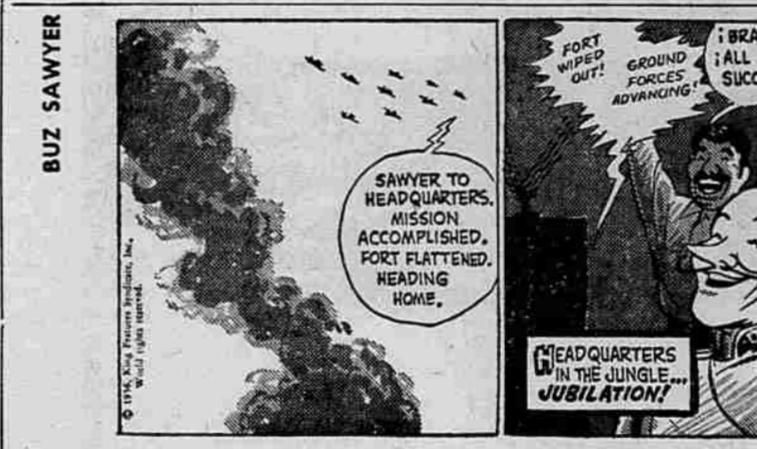
