

Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (U.P.) — The 1956 Oscar nominees will be unveiled on television Saturday—and this year the show has been remodeled to guarantee "no embarrassment." Last year any star who had a remote chance to cop a nomination sat in on the telecast. When the nominees were announced, the cameras caught the disappointed faces of the losers. This time kindly NBC-TV will not let that happen.

"Not one prospective nominee will be on camera unless actually nominated," resolved Alan Handley, producing the show for the network. "This way there is less chance for embarrassment."

Show Proves Successful
NBC started telecasting the nominations only last year. Handley admits he then didn't think it would be much of a show. But it snared one of the highest ratings of any 90-minute "spectacular."

For this year's show the prospective nominees all will gather in NBC's Burbank studios. Susan Hayward, Spencer Tracy, James Cagney, Ernest Borgnine, Glenn Ford, Marissa Pavan and Frank Sinatra are among those expected to be nominated. Other stars will help announce the nominations.

The technical awards will be flashed on the screen on cards while clips from last year's winning films are shown. The top acting nominees will be revealed by a surprise method—when clips from their movies appear on the screen.

Accountants Keep Secrets
To master this complicated setup, Price Waterhouse, the accounting firm that counts the votes, had to let somebody in on the results for the first time.

Veteran film cutter Bill Hornbeck was sworn to secrecy. Hornbeck is editing clips of the winning acting roles. The can of film will be sealed and opened only on the telecast. Price-Waterhouse is preparing the cards that announce the other winners.

"We have no idea about the nominees," Handley insisted. "Some people always think this isn't on the level. But it is. The secrecy makes five times as much work for us."

Emmy Soon To Observe Eighth Birthday; Television People Wait Annual Awards

New York — (U.P.) — Emmy, a young lady who sports a flowing robe, wings and a comely look, may come into her own this year.

She'll be eight years old and will celebrate her birthday on March 17 in New York and Hollywood. She's awarded by the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences to TV performers adjudged the year's best.

Some observers have compared the Emmy award to the Oscar. However, until this year, this comparison has met with a singular lack of enthusiasm from many performers in the TV industry, notably the New York bunch.

"Credit Life Insurance."

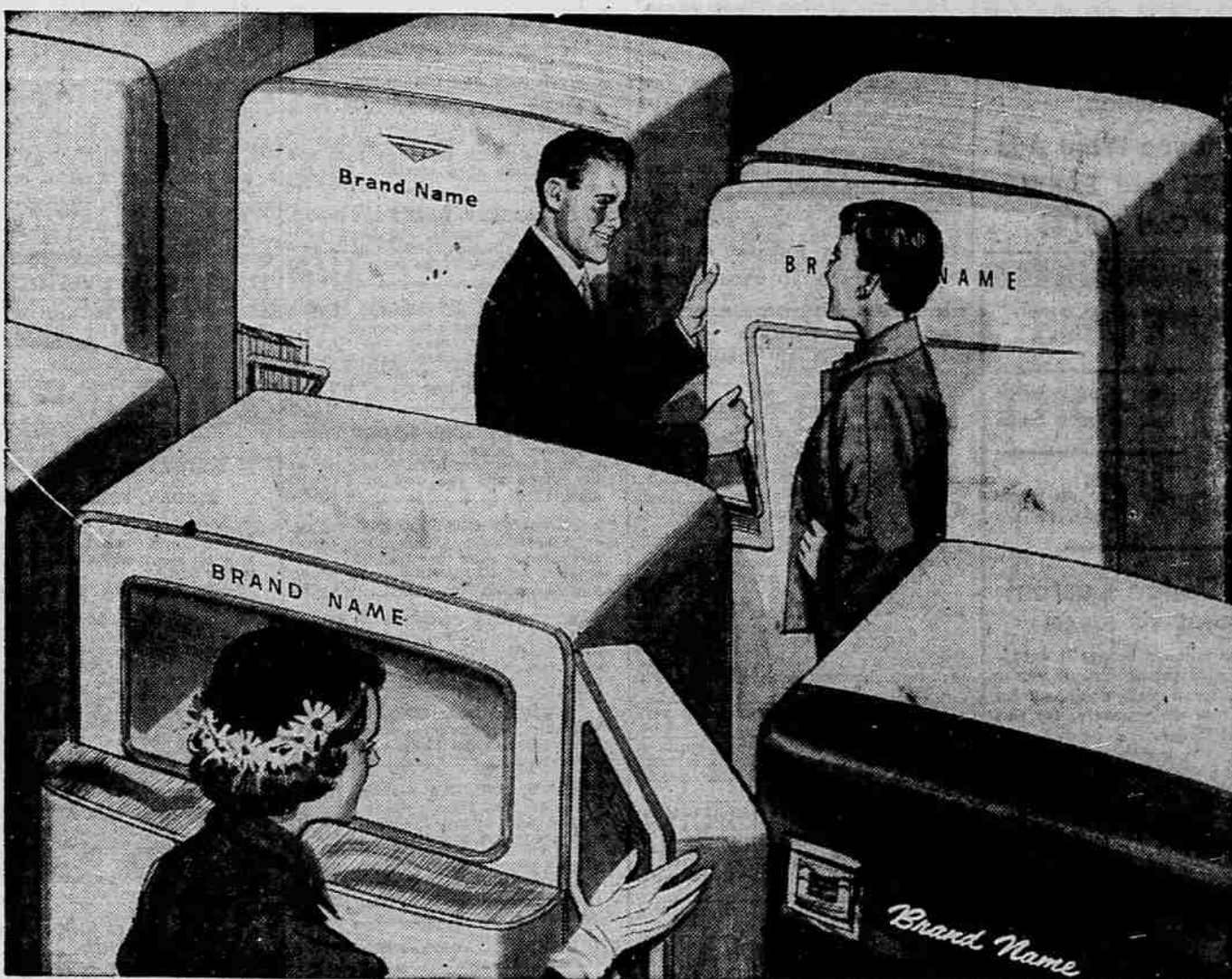
