The Wilsons were presented two large table lamps and a purse of money to buy something for their new home.

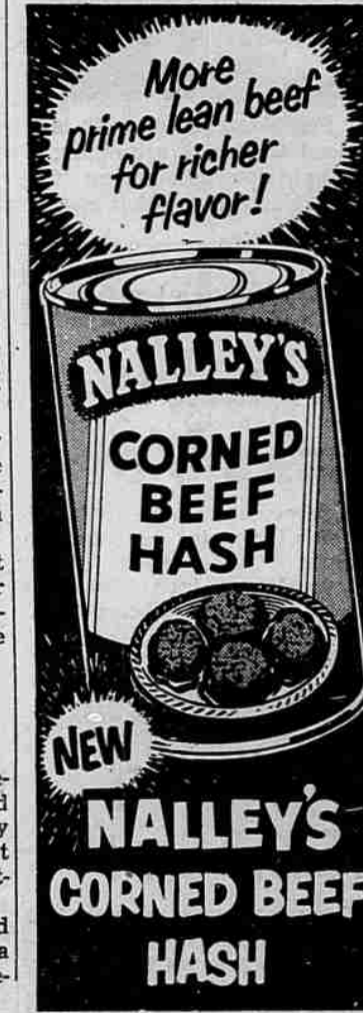
