Plane Believed Flown By 'Whitey' Dahl Lost

Halifax, N. S. (U.P.)—Canadian and U.S. planes hunting a war surplus DC-3 transport carrying three men and believed piloted by American soldier of fortune Harold E. "Whitey" Dahl.

A spokesman for RCAF Search and Rescue headquarters said "a man named 'Dahl' was flying and possibly owned the plane that was on a classified mission supplying equipment to the strategically important Defense Early Warning radar line. The others on board were not immediately identified.

Veteran pilots at Mont Joli, in Northern Quebec, and other points on the far-flung radar network said the only Dahl they knew of was "Whitey."

Medford Youth Has Rare Heart Surgery

A 20-year-old Medford youth underwent rare heart surgery this morning at Mayo clinic, Rochester, Minn., according to reports received shortly before noon by the family.

Dr. John W. Kirtlin, heart surgeon for the clinic, performed the operation on Leon McDougall, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. McDougall, 315 Perrydale ave.

Mrs. McDougall reported that she talked over the telephone with her husband, who stated young McDougall had survived the operation, during which both a mechanical heart and a mechanical lung were used, and had been "on his own" for an hour.

Mrs. McDougall said she learned from the telephone conversation that the surgeon found a "large jagged hole" from the left auricle to the ventricle which, too large to be closed surgically, was plugged with a sponge.

It was said that the condition, present since birth, had caused the blood to circulate in a reverse fashion through the heart. The operation required about 6 1/2 hours, McDougall told his wife, and it was reported that young McDougall would not be completely out of danger for some time.

Eugene Woman on UNESCO Commission

Eugene (U.P.)—Mrs. Jennelle Moorhead, well-known Oregon PTA leader, has been appointed to the national commission for UNESCO, according to word received from the State Department.

Mrs. Moorhead was named to a two-year term, ending with the closing of the commission's 1957 meeting. She will be one of 15 persons on the 100-member commission representing state and local governments.

The national commission was established in 1946 to advise the state department on U.S. participation in UNESCO, which acts as a type of clearing house for information in education, sciences, arts and mass communications.

Elmer Deetz Says Amount Demanded In Suit Not Owed

Canby (U.P.)—State Rep. Elmer Deetz, candidate for the Republican nomination for the United States Senate, said today he doesn't owe the \$7511 demanded in a lawsuit filed against him in Portland yesterday.

The suit seeks payment on a promissory note made by Deetz in 1954, the year he conducted his personal vendetta with the State Milk Marketing administration and campaigned successfully for a seat in the state legislature.

The suit seeking payment on the note was brought by M. F. Keller, a Portland salesman who purchased the note from Attorneys Norman L. Easley and Stewart M. Whipple.

Deetz claimed the note had been made on a "contingency" basis and was for legal work in connection with his battle to repeal the Oregon milk marketing act. He said there had been an understanding the note would not be foreclosed.

Whipple, however, denied there was a "contingency" agreement and said the note was for legal fees in connection with Deetz' defiance of the state milk law in the courts.

Whipple said legal work on the milk act repealer would have been valued at \$12,000 but that that fee was not included in the \$7511 value of the note.

Michigan Bridge To Withstand Gales

St. Ignace, Mich. (U.P.)—The \$100,000,000 Machinac bridge will be able to withstand "any gale or hurricane that can conceivably occur," its designer said.

Dr. D. B. Steinman of New York said the five-mile span "will stand like the Rock of Gibraltar" after it is completed in November, 1957.

Steinman said the bridge's 552-foot main towers were un-moved by winds of 76 miles an hour during a recent storm even though they were not yet entirely riveted or weighted by the completed bridge structure.

"They withstood the storm with strength to spare," Steinman said. The 76-mile-an-hour winds were within two miles per hour of the highest velocities ever recorded at the Straits of Mackinac.

War Games Bolster Anti-Communist Cause

Bangkok, Thailand (U.P.)—Rear Adm. Lester K. Rice, commander of American forces taking part in this week's South East Asia Treaty Organization's war games, said today the huge military exercise has bolstered the cause of anti-Communists in Asia.

Rice told United Press in an exclusive interview that the operation "has ended any doubts among SEATO nations or anybody else" regarding effectiveness of the anti-Communist military forces.

After the biggest day of the exercises, the soft-spoken Pacific

combat veteran termed the maneuvers an "unqualified success, especially considering it was an unrehearsed show."
