Pairings for the Jackson-Josephine county subdistrict AAU basketball tournament were completed last night when Rogue River wound up in lone second place in the Grants Pass city loop and Wimer was put in third place.

Quarter-final scrapes are scheduled Saturday night at the Rogue River high court and Sunday in the Medford senior high gym with two games in each place.

Contestants from the Medford Independent Basketball League will be the champion Prospect Lions, second-spot YMCA and third position Company A of the National Guard. Fourth entry from Medford will be Yellow Cab last year's district victor. Grants Pass loop entrant in addition to Rogue River and Wimer is the champion Camp's Electric team. Ashland Raiders round out the field of eight.

Ashland, RR Open Ashland will take on Rogue River's Merchants in the first game at Rogue River on Saturday. Time is 7:30 p.m. Company A and Camp's are foes in the second brush. The frays are being played in reverse order to the times previously announced.

Klamath Falls—Oregon Technical Institute of Klamath Falls severely mauled the independent Yellow Cab hoop contingent from Medford 71 to 36 here last night.

After a slow start the Owls took the lead at 5 to 4 and stayed on top the rest of the way. They had a 17 to 8 bulge with 9½ minutes played and led 32 to 17 at halftime. Midway through the last half the gap was 49 to 23.

Ted Fischer of OTI was high scorer with 16 counters and Bill Werner had 11 for the Cabbies. Fischer had 12 tallies in the first half.

Again this week Schadewitz paces the league scoring, according to figures released today by the loop fathers. Schadewitz has potted the points at a 24.7 per game clip and has chalked up 247 for the year in counting play.

Hoffine Follows Bill Hollingsworth of Southern Oregon is second in the league with an average of 21.3, followed by Portland State's Jack Parker with 18.2 and another Viking, Jack Viskov with 18.2.

Lloyd Hoffine of Southern Oregon, Johnny Foster of Oregon Tech, and Lowell Kolbaba of Eastern Oregon stand right behind the initial quartet with averages of 18.1, 17.4, and 17.3 respectively.

From there things drop off considerably with Cecil Miller of Oregon College in seventh spot with 12.2, followed by Paul Poetsch of Portland State at 11.3 and John Reinking of Eastern Oregon with the same 11.3.

## Red Raiders Play Vikings In Portland

By UNITED PRESS Portland State and Linfield risk their league leaderships in the Oregon Collegiate and the Northwest basketball loop races this week end.

Portland State, at 9-3 one game ahead of Eastern Oregon in the OCC race, plays host to an in-and-out Southern Oregon five at Portland tonight and Saturday. Eastern Oregon meets upstomped Oregon College of Education, a team which knocked off Portland State earlier this week.

Half Game Lead Linfield, with an 8-3 mark, has half a game lead over College of Idaho and is a game and one half ahead of Pacific. On Saturday night Pacific gets a chance to chop that margin when it hosts Linfield at Forest Grove in the Northwest Conference's top battle. College of Idaho travels to Whitman for a pair.

Lewis and Clark and Willamette clash at Salem tonight and Portland Saturday. Portland University meets St. Martin's here tonight.

## Reigel Sets Pace In Small College Point Production

New York — (U.P.) — Six-foot, five-inch Bill Reigel of McNeese St. (La.), who fired 47 points through the hoop Saturday against Northeast Louisiana, took over as the national small-college basketball scoring leader today with an average of 32.8 points per game.

The move to the top climaxed a steady uphill drive for Reigel and came after he had compiled a total of 120 points in his last three games. He is only the third player to lead the statistics issued by the NCAA this season, succeed Dave Olmsted of Clarkson and Bob Hopkins of Grambling.

Olmsted Second Olmsted, who had been on top last week, dropped to second with a 31.5 average. Chester Webb of Georgia Teachers stands third with 30.6, and Hopkins now is fourth with 30.5.

On the basis of total points, Reigel also leads the nation with 819 and may become the first collegian to top 1,000 this season. Hopkins stands second in total points with 702 and his career total of 3,596 far surpasses the former college career record of 2,959 held by Carl Hartman of Alderson-Broadbudds.

Porter Leads Don Porter of Linfield leads the conference scoring chase with a total of 217 points, an average of 21.7 per outing. Second in line is Whitman's Del Klicker with an average of 19 points per game and in third spot is Linfield's Bill Machamer with an 18.6 collection.

R. C. Owens, College of Idaho; Danny French, Pacific; and Dave Sanford of Linfield follow the top three in that order with averages of 18, 14.6 and 14.5 respectively.

Others in the top ten include: Hal Adrian, Lewis and Clark, 14.2; Jerry Kalapus, Pacific, 13.1; Ed Ramsdell, Pacific, 12.2; and Max Sanchez, College of Idaho, 12.1.
