two to six points during seven minutes of the second half. There were gaps of 42 to 36 and then 46 to 40. Perkins and Taucher tallied for KF on a driver and jumper. With 55 seconds to go in the quarter Moore took a feed in close and dumped a two-pointer for 46-41.

Ed Reinking swished a push shot for Medford but Sutherland evened the game with a jumper. At the buzzer Plumley snagged a shot by Copley which fell short and relayed it through the hoop for 50 to 48.

A gift toss by Moore and two

by Perkins made it 51 to 50 for Klamath and Sutherland followed from the field for 53 to 50. Tisdell got his free one. Taucher sank a drive in bucket and three free tries and Perkins connected from the gift stripe for 59 to 51.

Cearley hit from the side of the key for Medford's only field goal of the canto. Moore put in a rebound and a free shot and Perkins a free heave for 63 to 53, the widest margin between the clubs during the night. There was a minute left to play. Cearley collected four free points and Taucher a fielder on an

interception to round out the scoring.

Player Ousted

The rough closing moments saw McLaughlin ejected following an altercation with Perkins and Copley was benched for his fifth foul.

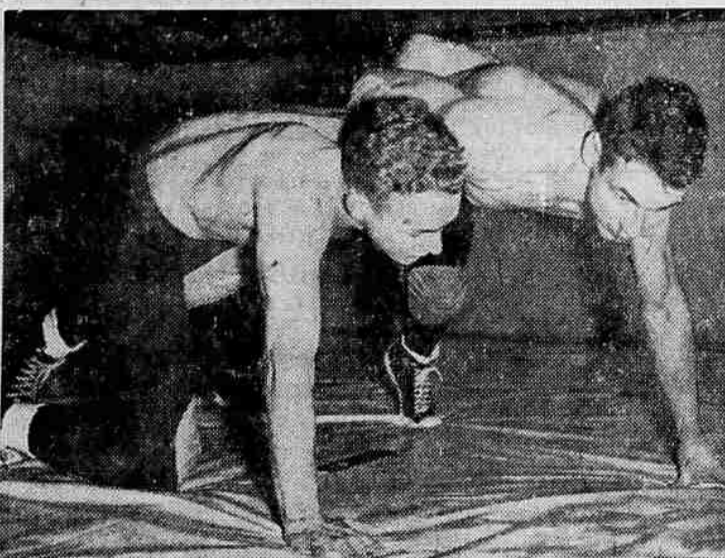
Medford was without the services of Tisdell for almost half the game. The ballhawking guard and leading Tornado scorer was charged with his fourth personal infraction after 14 minutes of the second period. He left the action and didn't return until the fourth quarter. While he was in the fray, the Pels, remembering his 27 points against them in a first round game, pressed him but Tisdell still rang up five field shots.

Moore was high point man of the night, Cearley got 15 points and Taucher and Plumley each 14. Medford had the rebound margin 30 to 27 with Plumley getting 11 and McLaughlin seven. Perkins and Moore got seven and Sutherland five for KF.

Klamath had the best of it from the field 23 to 22 and from the foul line 19 to 13. The Tornado had a 380 field gunning average for the game but put through only eight shots in 28 attempts for .285 in the second half. Only eight shots were tried with one made in the fourth panel. Medford hit 14 for 30 for 466 in the first half.

Jim Bocchi and Harold Douglas, both of Klamath Falls, were the referees and their calls frequently met with disapproval from the partisan Medford crowd.

Dave Newland Seen as Definite Threat for National Mat Honors

University of Oregon, Eugene—Pacific Coast Intercollegiate 147-pound wrestling champion last year as a sophomore, University of Oregon's Dave Newland, junior from Medford, could well be gunning for bigger and better things this year.

With still a year of wrestling to go after this season, the Webfoots' Newland stands as a definite threat for national collegiate honors. In seven matches this year the husky Newland has won six, three of them by falls.

His only loss was to Multnomah Athletic Club's Wilbur Bauer, former PCI champion at that weight. But to match this he has won by falls over Washington State twice and against Oregon State.

Cog In Team

The defending champion Newland has been a strong cog in Coach Bill Hammer's strong Oregon wrestling team, gunning for its best season since the start of wrestling at the Duck athletic plant three years ago.

As a team, Oregon had a six match winning streak going at the first of the year, 10 in a row over a two-year period. Their season record stands right now at six won, one tie, and one lost.

MH Jayvees Trip Klamath In Overtime

Medford high junior varsity basketballers got a 59 to 52 decision over the Klamath Falls Jayvees Friday night by accomplishing it the hard way.

After fighting to 11-point leads, the Tornado juniors saw their margin dwindle away and they had to go into extra time to subdue the Pelicans.

The Medfordites had a 45 to 34 command after three quarters and then turned erratic and scoreless as Klamath came back to go on top 47 to 45. Ron Croxford put the Pels in front.

50-All Score

Richard Puhl knotted up the count but Danny Shaw's gifter made it 48 to 47 for KF. Puhl came through again for a 49 to 48 Medford edge but Croxford spoiled it and KF led 50 to 49 with slightly more than a minute to play. Gary Riley then got a free heave for Medford and 50-48 was the score at the end of the regular playing time.

In the overtime Bilbee Lane scored for Medford off the tip off but Croxford retaliated with a tip in bucket. Then Johnny Payne and Tom Hamlin connected to make it 56 to 52 for Medford. Payne got another goal and Puhl a free shot before the buzzer sounded.

Medford had leads of 11 to 10 at the quarter and 29 to 18 at the half. Croxford had 20 points for Klamath and Lane 13 for Medford.

SO Circuit Plans Split This Spring

The Southern Oregon conference, which has had a membership of 10 Class A high schools for several years, will split into separate A-1 and A-2 organizations effective after the spring meeting on May 12.

That action was taken yesterday at a conference meeting at the Medford hotel.

Medford, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass and Ashland are the longtime members of the organization. Crater was next to be included and other members in recent seasons have been Eagle Point, Phoenix, Illinois Valley, Henley and Brookings.

The smaller schools, however, have had their own league activity and have varied in play-offs with the larger schools when necessary. A-1 and A-2 divisioning through the state for all the major sports now makes the big organization unnecessary. And the groups have different problems.

Crater Joins Big Group

At the separation Crater, which becomes an A-1 school, next fall, will go into the big school organization with Ashland, Medford, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls.

At the Saturday meeting the district wrestling touring was set for next Friday and Saturday at Southern Oregon college and Jim Bocchi, Klamath Falls, was named a state A-1 basketball tournament official from this district. Coaches got together to work out baseball and track schedules for this spring, football schedules for next fall and the A-1 basketball schedule for 1957.

Conference members voted to use the same method this year as in the past in determining school sportsmanship ratings and this year's football and basketball admission prices were extended for the 1956-57 school year.

Seven schools were represented Saturday. Absent were Eagle Point, Henley and Brookings.

Ski Conditions

Skating conditions at Crater Lake National Park were reported to be fair to good as of 4 p.m. yesterday. Seven inches of new snow fell Friday and it was snowing yesterday. The snow depth at park headquarters was 132 inches. Highway 62 was open with chains advised. The road from Annie Springs to the rim was open with chains or abrasive snow-tread tires required. The warming hut will be open today, weather permitting.

Warriors Widen NBA Leadership

The Philadelphia Warriors, rolling virtually unchecked toward the regular season championship in the Eastern Division race of the National Basketball association, opened a five and one-half game advantage Friday over second place Boston.

The Warriors, in scoring their seventh straight victory, downed the Minneapolis Lakers, 134-111. Friday night after the Syracuse Nationals had defeated the New York Knickerbockers, 91-86, in the first game of a twin bill in Philadelphia.

In the only other game played the Fort Wayne Pistons increased their Western Division lead to six games by defeating the Rochester Royals, their nearest competitors, 93-81.
