

Illinois Replaces Dayton in Second Place in UP Ratings

seven other leading teams switched places. The 35-leading coaches who make up the United Press rating board gave San Francisco 29 first place votes and a total of 337 points. The Dons stretched their victory streak to 46 games and their season record to 20-0 last week with victories over San Jose State and St. Mary's (Calif.) but they received one less first place vote and two less points than in the previous week's balloting. Illinois (16-1) made the most impressive gain when the balloting produced new positions for each of the other nine leading teams except sixth place Vanderbilt. Doubled First Votes The Illini, 9-0 in Big Ten competition, advanced from third to second following their impressive road triumph at Michigan State Saturday. They doubled their first place votes from two to four and their point total went from 276 to 307, only 30 points behind San Francisco. Louisville (21-2) moved from

fifth to fourth with the other first place vote and 171 points. North Carolina State (19-3) dropped from fourth to fifth with 148 points. Lost Four Points Vanderbilt (18-2) lost four points in this week's voting but held sixth place with 129. Coach Adolph Rupp's Kentucky team lost the most ground, dropping from seventh to tenth when its point total fell from 106 last week to 76. The Wildcats have a 16-4 record. Southern Methodist (19-2), leading the Southwest conference with a 9-0 mark, advanced from eighth to seventh with 106 points. Temple (19-1) moved from ninth to eighth with 83 and North Carolina (16-3) advanced from tenth to ninth with 80. Alabama again headed the second 10 teams in the ratings. Then came Iowa, UCLA and Houston. Utah and Holy Cross tied for 15th. St. Francis (N.Y.), and Iowa State followed. Cincinnati and Xavier (Ohio), two schools located in the city of Cincinnati, tied for 19th.

Alabama; Kentucky Post Loop Victories

Adolph Rupp's Kentucky Wildcats, emulating those frisky thoroughbreds in the blue grass country, were making a strong stretch run today for the Southeastern Conference basketball championship and its automatic berth in the NCAA tournament. The Ruppmen pulled into second place in the conference race Monday night by whipping Vanderbilt, 76-55, while front-running Alabama turned back Louisiana State, 77-59. That left Alabama with a 10-0 league record, Kentucky 10-1 and most of their followers panting for tickets for their Saturday night showdown battle at Montgomery, Ala. Illini Dump Boilermakers In the Big Ten Conference, Illinois downed Purdue, 102-77, for its 16th straight triumph but Iowa remained on the Illini's heels but out-lasting Iowa, 87-83, on two-pointers by Bill Logan and Bill Seaberg in the final minute. Two tournament-bound teams, meanwhile, suffered humiliating defeats. Notre Dame, led by Lloyd Aubrey's 36 points, edged

Marquette, a nominee for the National Invitational, 88-85, while Tennessee Tech rolled to a 90-81 upset over Memphis State, named only 24 hours earlier to the NCAA slugging. Duquesne, another NIT selection breezed to an 87-65 win over Fordham, and Marshall warmed up for the NCAA championships by bowling over Bowling Green, 95-91. Eighth-ranked Temple remained in the running for a tournament bid by turning back Lebanon Valley, 72-68. The Owls now boast a 20-1 season record. Ohio State Wins Robin Freeman's 27 points carried Ohio State to a 79-71 triumph over Wisconsin; Oklahoma City pranced to a 93-78 victory over Loyola of the South on a 40-point effort by Hubert Reed; Norm Stewart's 33 points enabled Missouri to crush Iowa State, 73-66; Wichita edged Detroit, 85-84; Colorado tripped Oklahoma, 61-53; Wake Forest downed Maryland, 76-70, and Houston edged Bradley, 68-63, to clinch a tie for first in the Missouri Valley Conference.

Gus Triandos Stands Out In Oriole Training Camp; Other Teams Sign Players

The Baltimore Orioles turned down an offer of \$125,000 for Gus Triandos three months ago and the way he's been belting the ball today it looks like the best deal they never made. Triandos, who will do double duty for Baltimore this year, going behind the plate on days when he doesn't play first base, has been the slugging standout so far in the Orioles' spring drills at Scottsdale, Ariz. The 200-pound 25-year-old from San Francisco hit a ball over the distant left field wall for the third straight day Monday and kept the outfielders moving for his sharp line drives. Triandos, who came to the Orioles in their big trade with the Yankees during the winter following the 1954 campaign, is taking special batting instruction from Vancouver Manager Lefty O'Doul.

Dickeys Down Crossettis
At St. Petersburg, Fla., the Yankees' rookies engaged in their first intra-squad game with the "Dickeys" defeating the "Crossettis" 5-1. Jim Dunn, who relieved Billy Short in the seventh inning was the winning pitcher.

The Yankees also announced the signing of shortstop Woody Held, who hit .261 with Denver of the American association last season.

Branch Ricky was a visitor at the Phillies' camp at Clearwater where Curt Simmons continued to impress with his smooth pitching delivery. Other varsity members who joined Simmons in the workout were Saul Rogovin, Willie Jones, Del Ennis and Granny Hamner. The White Sox staged their first spring drill at Tampa, Fla., and Manager Marty Marion put 48 players through a four-hour session under a blazing sun. Back on the home front, the Dodgers announced the signing of pitcher Don Bessent, who posted an 8-1 record, chiefly in relief, with them last year. Only Two Unsigned Bessent's acceptance left outfielder Sandy Amoros and Chico

Fernandez as the only unsigned Brooklyn players.

Don Newcombe left by train Monday but World Series hero Johnny Podres was given permission to report later due to his grandmother's illness.

The Red Sox announced the signing of pitchers Ivan Delock and Al Schroll. Delock had a 9-7 record with Boston last season while Schroll won 11 games and dropped six at Louisville in the American association.
