Failure To Consult Congress on Arabia Tank Deal Brings Charges

Washington (U.P.)—Officials today were privately disturbed by Democratic charges that administration failure to consult Congress on the Saudi Arabian tank deal would weaken bipartisanship in foreign policy matters.

Chairman James P. Richards (D-S.C.) of the House Foreign Affairs Committee Monday night accused the administration of treating the House like a "weak-minded illegitimate son" on foreign policy matters in general. He mentioned the tank deal in particular.

Earlier, Sen. Herbert H. Lehman (D-N.Y.) angrily told the Senate the tank deal "is but another illustration of the consistent policy of the administration of failing—indeed of refusing—to take the public into its confidence."

The State Department declined to comment. Officials claimed that Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has consistently tried to keep congressional leaders informed on foreign developments but conceded that neither Senate nor House leaders were advised about the tanks.

The 18 light U.S. tanks bound for Saudi Arabia left New York by ship Monday. The ship's departure was allowed after the

government reversed its earlier order to indefinitely halt the shipment of any arms to the unsettled Middle East.

Officials feared the sharp congressional reaction to the tank deal might result in a stiffening attitude to administration foreign policy proposals.

Senate Said Favored

Richards accused the administration of favoring Senate leaders when it does consult Congress about important foreign policy matters.

"Evidently, the State Department thinks we in the House are kids and the Senate is grown up," the South Carolina Democrat said. "The department pitches a crumb over this way only once in a while."

He warned the administration would learn "the viewpoint of the House is just as important as that of the Senate" when administration bills reach the House floor.

Both Lehman and Richards demanded a complete investigation of the tank deal by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Sen. Walter F. George (D-Ga.), Foreign Relations Committee chairman, said the committee plans tentatively to question Dulles Friday about the tanks.

Two OSC Fraternities Placed on Probation

The fraternities, Phi Sigma Kappa and Delta Upsilon, were banned from engaging in any campus social activities as an organization for the remainder of the school year.

School officials said Phi Sigma Kappa was put on social probation because members had hit a student with a paddle during a pre-initiation ceremony, causing an aggravation of a physical condition. The incident occurred Jan. 27 and the student required medical attention at the college infirmary the following day, authorities said.

Delta Upsilon was put on probation because some members took liquor on a ski party to the Hoodoo Ski Bowl, the week-end of Jan. 21-22.
