

Marine Corps Probes Crash Victim Mixup

El Toro Marine Air Station, Calif. — (U.P.) — A Marine corps court of inquiry is investigating the tragic mixup in which some Marines not connected with a Niles, Calif., plane crash were identified as its victims.

The court will also probe the improper disclosure of the names of some actual victims.

The names of five crew member victims of last Friday's Marine transport crash were correctly identified in the first list of victims, but wrong names were given for the plane's passengers. The mistake resulted in the relatives of 33 Marines being told erroneously that the service men had perished.

Several hours later a corrected list was released. It was made up of 34 passengers, five actual crewmen and one Marine listed as a crewman who was "hitching" a ride.

Camp Pendleton, Calif. — (U.P.) — Three Oregon Marines were among those listed by the Marine corps as being on the plane which crashed last Friday near Niles, Calif., killing all 40 persons aboard.

They were: Pfc. Charles L. Howard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold T. Howard, Corvallis; Pvt. David R. Kendrick, son of Mrs. Marie M. Kendrick, Portland; and Pvt. Glenn I. Newton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Adrian Newton, Beaver Creek.

Curry Given Praise For Gambling Cleanup

Salem — (U.P.) — Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton has praised Curry County District Attorney Samuel A. Hall for "cleaning up gambling in Curry county" and at the same time said Oregon laws are "wholly inadequate to deter the professional gambler."

Thornton said: "It is a matter of keen regret to me that our laws provide for a fine only, upon conviction for operating gambling establishments, and do not permit the courts to impose jail sentences even in habitual cases. Our laws are wholly inadequate to deter the professional gambler, who regards a fine as merely part of the cost of doing his very profitable business."

Hall led raids last Friday night in which several persons were arrested in Curry county.

Salem Publisher Heads Press Group

Eugene — (U.P.) — Bernard Mainwaring, editor and publisher of the Salem Capital Journal, was elected new chairman of the Oregon Press Conference at the conclusion of the 37th annual conference here this past week end.

Verne McKinney, publisher of the Hillsboro Argus, was named to the board of trustees of the Eric Allen Memorial fund. Carl C. Webb, Eugene, was reelected secretary-manager of the group.

The annual affair is sponsored by the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association and the University of Oregon journalism school.

Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (U.P.) — This is the year when movie-goers will have their eyes stretched by gigantic movie spectacles. But the director of one insists his really is not a spectacle.

Robert Rossen is back in Hollywood for the first time in four years with one of 1956's super colossal movies in his satchel, "Alexander the Great," starring Fredric March and Richard Burton.

This year the gigantic screens and stereophonic sound also will bulge with "War and Peace," "Helen of Troy," "The Ten Commandments," "Richard III" and "Around the World in 80 days."

But Rossen seems alarmed that his picture will be classed with the million-extras, lavish-costume epics.

Spectacular Story

"It's spectacular only because the life of Alexander is spectacular," he said in his hotel suite. "The basic ingredient still must be the story."

"In many spectacle films the story is separate from the spec-

...tacle. But if I cut the battle scenes out of my film, I would cut out the story. The film is a profound search into the life of Alexander, who founded the principles of modern warfare."

Rossen, who also wrote and produced the movie in the tradition of true one-man movie-makes, shot for seven months in Spain on a budget of \$4,500,000.

He recruited the Spanish army for his battle scenes. One war sequence featured 1,000 horses. This is one gigantic epic that will outdo even Cecil B. DeMille in the romance department — one scene shows 10,000 soldiers being married at the same time.

Return for Rossen

"Alexander the Great" means quite a homecoming for Rossen. The director, who gained renown for such films as the Oscar-winning "All the King's Men," left Hollywood in 1952 after being paged by the un-American Activities committee. He later testified in New York he had been a Communist party member.

Rossen figures he will "probably settle in the East now because my children are in school there." Many other top movie makers have deserted this town to make films any place in the world. Joseph Mankiewicz, Josh Logan and Elia Kazan reportedly plan to build their own studio in New York. John Huston lives in Ireland.

"I go wherever the film takes me," Rossen said. "People should make pictures any place in the world, wherever the story is best suited. I am a gypsy now."

New members are Ricky Davis, Karen and Brad Gettling. Nancy Redhead served refreshments. Next meeting will be at Fossens' Feb. 27.

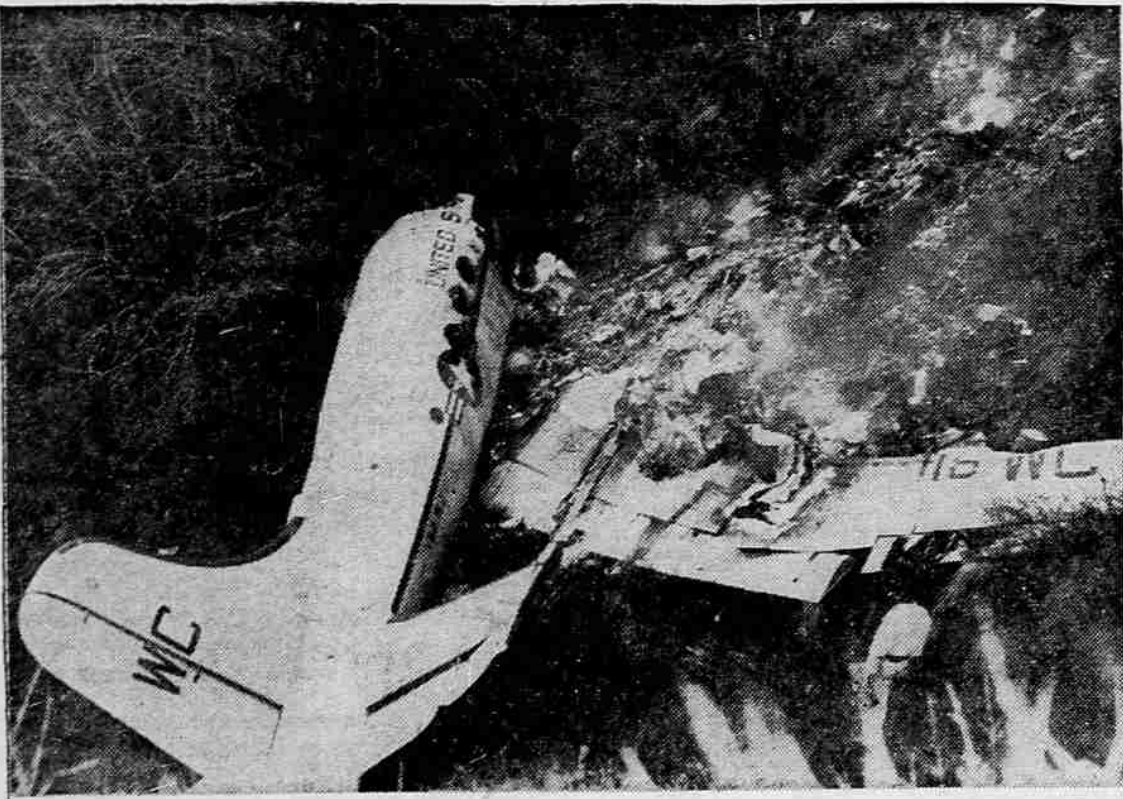

Horses Like Stock

"Same as the horses," said one of the attendants. "Like the last time out, how they did in the last work out. Things like that."

Actually, most of the business of the newspaper reference room is on the serious side. It is headed up by Pauly Berry, chief of the serials divisions, and James Sutton, head of newspaper reference. Their worries, though, generally rest on the shoulders of two able assistants—Paul E. Swigart and George M. Hall.

I visit the reference room frequently. It's a wonderful place. You can rent a typewriter for a dime a half hour and it works fine if you know the "touch system."

Thousands of Papers

There are 151,600 bound volumes of newspapers around the walls and in the cellar are uncounted thousands of unbound copies.

The team of Swigart and Hall relies on "Gregory's Union List of Papers" for reference, which had its beginnings in 1821. It is a compilation of libraries around the country concerning files of newspapers.

Swigart thought he was in for a bad time when a man came in and wanted to know if the annex had a picture of his mother who had been a victim of homicide.

A search was made, the right paper was found and the man was given special permission to take out his brownie and use some special lights to reproduce it. He went home happy.
