This prediction comes from George W. Walker, vice president and director of styling for the Ford Motor company.

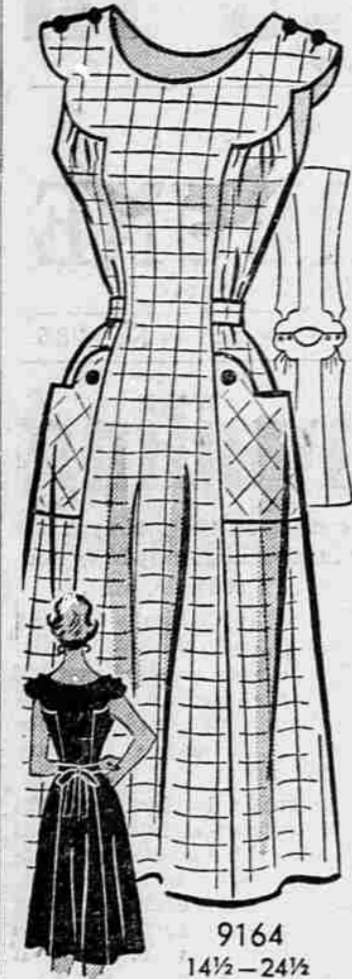
"We would like to get more girls in our styling department," Walker told reporters this week. "We hired our first three girls in the past six months."

### Special Box of Toys Recommended During Illness of Children

Pullman—How do you keep a sick-a-bed school child contented? As every mother knows, that's not easy. But here's a suggestion that might help. It's from Miss Emma Harris, of Washington State college's child development staff.

Miss Harris suggests a special box of toys. The toys should be suited to quiet easy play and should be brought out only when the stay-in-bed rule is in order.

Playthings chosen should be easy to handle and not require too much concentration to prevent tiring the child when he's not up to par. Good choices are jigsaw puzzles with large outlines, coarse weaving materials, sewing cards with large holes, and lightweight blocks. Many children like to cut pictures from old magazines or make paper dolls.

Miniature furniture with a lightweight doll house—or even shoe boxes may provide inspiration for interior decoration ventures. The hills and valley of "counterpane land" offer a background for arranging small boxes for houses and buildings, miniature farm animals, dolls and small automobiles or other lightweight vehicles.

A tray or stiff piece of cardboard may be used as a table or level surface for play-in-bed toys.

If a child is so sick that he must remain very quiet, a balloon tied to the bed where an air current moves it slightly often holds his interest for long periods of time.

To save mothers extra work in keeping the bedroom tidy, a bedside waste basket is suggested where the child can easily put paper scraps. Another small basket may hold crayon and pencils.

New York (U.P.)—President Eisenhower has been "captured" on a fabric for home decorating.
