Superfluous Hair

Many women are much distressed by hair on the face, hands and legs. They ask about electrolysis and other treatments, and I say that in most cases there is so much hair that electrolysis would be feasible; it would be a lengthy and costly job, and it might leave scarring.

Women ask if a gland expert could help, and all I can say is that I much doubt it. Many hairy women seem to have poor ovarian function but rarely does the giving of ovarian hormones help in the slightest. Other hairy women are perfectly healthy all their days. In my experience, one of the commonest causes of great hairiness is heredity. In some races the women tend to be hairy. In the cases of many hairy women I find that the relatives and perhaps the patient have a poor nervous system. Sometimes I suspect that the hairiness was inherited from a very hairy father.

I always advise women to remove the hair because it is abhorrent to most men. All women should remove excess hair also because its presence gives them feelings of inferiority. Hair on the upper lip can be yanked off with the help of a special wax. Much fuzz on the face and under the lower jaw can best be removed with a razor. Hair about the nipple can be either shaved or pulled out. Hairy moles on the face can and should be removed in a minute by a skin specialist. Hair on the thighs and legs should be shaved. I think shaving is better than the use of depilating creams, but I know many persons who disagree with me. Most women who could so easily get rid of their hair with a safety razor fail to do so because they have the fixed idea that shaving will make the hair coarser and coarser. Tests have shown that this is not true. I have shaved every day for over 50 years and the hair on my face is not coarse and it is not easily visible.
