Denver — (U.P.) — Accused plane saboteur John Gilbert Graham, who has waived a sanity trial, will be tried on murder charges in district court here April 16. The trial date for the 24-year-old Graham was set Friday by District Judge Joseph M. McDonald.

Graham, accused of sending his mother, Mrs. Daisie King, and 43 other persons to their death last Nov. 1, dropped his plea of innocent by reason of insanity Thursday.

The state charged Graham with planting a time bomb aboard a United Air Lines DC6B to kill his mother for trip insurance money. The plane exploded in flight and crashed near Longmont, Colo., shortly after taking off from Stapleton air field here.

REVOLT ENDS

Bogota, Colombia — (UP) — The Amazon Jungle revolution against the Peruvian government collapsed Saturday. Gen. Marcial Merino Pereyra, who led revolutionary forces in Iquitos region of northern Peru, announced his surrender to government forces in a radio broadcast heard here.
