Opera Company Leaves Warsaw; Tour Successful

Warsaw — The American Everyman Opera company whose performances of "Porgy and Bess" received tremendous ovations in Poland, has left the country for a tour of Czechoslovakia.

Capacity audiences attended all the performances of the Gershwin opera which opened in Warsaw January 24. Leading members of the all-Negro troupe also gave a concert in the huge auditorium of Warsaw's newly built Palace of Culture and Science. The company left the capital on February 3 to perform in Stalingrad, the heavy industry city in southern Poland.

A review of the opera in the leading Warsaw daily, Trybuna Ludu, described the artistry of the company as brilliant and that audiences were captivated by the music and dancing.

At its premier performance in the Warsaw Opera House, the company played before an audience which included Aleksander Zawadzki, president of the Council of State; Premier Jozef Cyrankiewicz; Foreign Minister Stanislaw Skrzyszewski; United States Ambassador Joseph E. Jacobs; members of the diplomatic corps, and leading workers and cultural figures of the capital.

Ambassador Jacobs gave a reception in honor of the troupe on January 27 which was attended by Minister of Culture and Art Wlodzimierz Sokorski; Deputy Foreign Ministers Marian Naszkowski and Jozef Winiewicz; Vice Speaker of the Sejm Jozef Ozga-Michalski; and Ambassador J. K. Wende, General Secretary of the Committee for Cultural Relations with Foreign Countries.

The performers visited many of Warsaw's historic sites and met with several theatrical and musical groups including the famous Mazowsze Song and Dance ensemble. They were also entertained at the Fryderyk Chopin Music society where they heard a concert of Chopin works by the well-known young pianist, Tadeusz Kerner. A farewell reception was given by the Association of Polish Theatre and Film Actors.
