

Former Medford Man Arrested in Ventura

Thomas B. Hays, formerly of Medford, was arrested recently in Ventura, Calif., on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses.

According to police reports, Hays is a suspect in the cashing of seven fictitious checks in Medford during January. Kenneth G. Hamner, Holland hotel, reported to city police that he had cashed checks totaling \$60, all drawn on the Medford branch of the United States National bank and signed "T. B. Hays." Hamner also told police that Hays had left a hotel bill of about \$102 when he moved from Medford.

A \$30 check, also signed "T. B. Hays," was cashed at the Highway Tavern, 12 North Riverside ave., and was returned marked "unable to locate," according to a police report.

Committee Discusses Beverage Licenses

A committee of beverage dispensers met yesterday with members of the county court to ask for more local supervision in issuance of beverage licenses. County Commissioner L. G. Morthland said the committee wants the county to resume approval or disapproval on all applications or renewals of licenses to sell beverages.

The state liquor control commission approves such licenses now, without consultation with the court, he said.

Trial To Test Rights Of Indians in Oregon

Portland—(U.P.)—A trial opened in Federal Court here today testing the constitutional rights of the government to deny Oregon Indians the hunting and trapping rights they have enjoyed for 100 years under treaty.

Plaintiffs are the 1800 Indians of the Klamath reservation and 1150 members of the Confederate Tribes of the Umatilla reservation. Defendants are the Oregon Game Commission, superintendent of state police and the state attorney general.

'Conspiracy' Seen In Fluoride Plans

Doctors and others in the medical profession are lending themselves to a conspiracy for the sole profit of chemical manufacturers when they fight for fluoridation in public water systems, according to Vern Shangle, local anti-fluoridation leader.

He spoke Monday noon at the regular Jackson County Chamber of Commerce round table presenting the opposition's side of the fluoridation question. Next Monday noon a representative of those favoring fluoride in Medford's water will speak.

Claim Rights Violated

Shangle, president of the Oregon Natural Foods associates, said "We who oppose fluoridation are as much concerned with the health of our children as those for fluoridation of drinking water. We only contend that when we are forced to drink fluoridated water our rights as citizens are being violated."

American people are slowly being poisoned, Shangle maintained, and quoted from a number of sources, who allege that "sodium silica fluoride is a synthetic, metallic, inorganic poison." Fluoridation was described as a "weak crutch to put under a physical deterioration that has been going on among our people ever since the advent of refined foods upon the American scene."

Asks Better Food

The answer to the caries problem, according to Shangle, is not "poison fluoride," but better food for our children and less "devalitized, degenerated, lifeless foods that are being consumed in such great quantities."

Shangle displayed a pamphlet lauding natural foods, distributed by the Southern Oregon district of the Northwest Conference in Dental Medicine. It states that proper eating can reduce caries 90 per cent. Fluoridation enthusiasts maintain a gain of about 60 per cent.

Quotes 1939 Pamphlet

The 1939 year book published by the U. S. department of agriculture, "Foods and Life," which Shangle quoted, warned that fluorine should be avoided from

birth to 12 years. He declared that "the public health service now is urging and promoting its use for our children in those exact years."

"Does anyone have the right to experiment with the lives of our children?" Shangle asked. Proponents do not tell of the 500 cities where fluoridation has been defeated, he charged, nor do they report the increase of deaths in cities that have added fluorides to their water.

He cited Grand Rapids, Mich., and the Newburgh-Kingston, N.Y., test cases where, he maintained, figures conflict and he said heart disease and other diseases increased considerably.

Fluoride in Foods

Speaking of fluorides which appear naturally in foods, he said tea, acid calcium phosphate baking powder, celery leaves, gelatin and others are big providers of the chemical, and that it is possible that the nation actually gets sufficient fluoride from such sources.

From a philosophical standpoint, Shangle declared that Lenin of Russia said, "Get control of the public health agencies and furnish the keystone on the arch of the socialistic state." He alleged that fluoridation of public water supplies is but a step toward complete socialism.

He closed with the words of Abraham Lincoln that "to remain silent when we should speak out in protest, makes cowards of men."

36 Influenza Cases Reported Last Week

Fifty-nine cases of communicable disease were reported to the Jackson county health department for the week ending Feb. 26.

Of these, 36 cases were influenza, 7 were strep throat and 4 were pneumonia.

There were three cases of chicken pox, four measles, two tuberculosis, one impetigo, one mumps, and one case of pink eye.

New Cold Wave Blows To Eastern Half of Nation

A cold wave shoved its way into the nation's eastern half today behind heavy snows in the North and scattered tornadoes in the South.

Temperatures dropped 20 to 25 degrees from the Southern Plains to Ohio valley. More cold was expected farther east and temperatures averaged 10 degrees below zero early today in northern Minnesota.

Tornadoes Hurt Four

In the South, tornadoes injured four persons in Tennessee and hit the central Georgia communities of Russellville and Yatesville.

The Tennessee twister ripped through seven rural communities near Gallatin late yesterday. It leveled two homes, damaged at least 18 others, and churned a three-mile wide path of destruction for 15 miles.

The Georgia tornadoes caused minor damage but no injuries. Elsewhere in Dixie, winds as high as 50 miles per hour lashed a downpour at Nashville, Tenn.

The northern snows stretched from Missouri into northern New York state today. They were blamed for the death of three women whose car was smashed by a streamliner during a blinding Illinois snowstorm.

Bad weather also hit in the West, whipping Cheyenne, Wyo., with 52-mph winds and lashing the Pacific Northwest with a new storm.

Forecasters said the Western storm would send new rains in ever-increasing amounts along the Pacific coast from Washington to central California.
