## Judge Ashby Dickson Succumbs in Portland

Portland—(U.P.)—Judge Ashby C. Dickson, 71, former Circuit Court judge and Democratic state senator, died at his home here yesterday. Judge Dickson was prominent in civic affairs here for many years. He had been in semi-retirement since he left the Circuit Court bench in 1954 but maintained law offices downtown. He came to Portland from Texas in 1911 and was a 1915 graduate of the University of Oregon law school. James Jesse Strang maintained the only absolute monarchy ever established in the United States when he defied the United States government and proclaimed himself king of a Mormon colony on Beaver Island, Mich.

## UCLA Bruins Head For Toga At Record Scoring Pace

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—UCLA is racing toward the Pacific Coast Conference basketball championship at a record scoring pace, statistics from the PCC commissioner's office showed today. The Bruins, paced by their mighty one-two scoring punch of center Willie Naulls and guard Morrie Taft, are undefeated in 12 conference games. They have averaged 81.4 points a game to date, far above the old PCC team mark of 75.1 points set by UCLA two years ago. Naulls leads individual scorers with 272 points in 12 games for a 22.7 point game average. Taft is second with 248 points and a 20.7 average. Others with more than 200 points are Larry Beck, Washington State, 245; Dave Gambee, Oregon State, 234; and Bill Bond, Stanford, 224. UCLA set a new game scoring record last week end when it scored 108 points against Oregon. Oregon's total of 89 was the highest ever made by a losing team in PCC play and the combined total of 197 points was another record. Ranked behind UCLA in team scoring are Southern California, 70.8 points a game; Stanford, 66.8, and California, 66.4.

## Tex Sullivan's Boxing License Revoked by NY State Commission

New York—(U.P.)—Ted Cott, vice-president and general manager of the Dumont Broadcasting Corp., hoped to announce today the new promoters of Monday night TV fights who will succeed Tex Sullivan's kayoed London Sporting club. Sullivan, his club and his partner Willie Gilzenberg had their licenses revoked Tuesday by the N.Y. State Athletic Commission, which found them guilty on eight of nine charges. The revocations will become effective next Tuesday. Cott said today, "We interviewed representatives of 16 groups who wanted to promote Monday night fights. Our possible choices have simmered down now to three standouts and one possible combination. Of course the new organization must be approved and licensed by the commission." Prepare Appeal He said he hoped the new promoters could continue to stage the fights at St. Nicholas Arena, where next Monday night Sullivan's outfit will put on the last of its 94 weekly shows, started May 17, 1954. Meanwhile, Sullivan's attorneys are preparing to file an appeal to the supreme court of New York County later this week. They will also ask for an injunction to delay the revoca-

Medford collected 69 points in the poll compared to Eugene's 129 and Franklin's 109.

## Heart Conditions Revealed by Chest X-Rays at Clinic

More than 300 Jackson county people have been advised they have a heart condition requiring treatment, according to a recent report by the x-ray committee. The heart conditions were discovered when people were x-rayed by the chest x-ray clinic operated by the Jackson County Public Health Association. The majority of these are heart enlargements indicating some undue strain on the heart, the committee said. "Many times a chest x-ray gives the first indication that there has been a heart strain," Dr. A. E. Merkel, county health officer said yesterday. "By locating the cause and obtaining treatment the future health and even lives of many persons can be saved."

## Museum to Remain Open Seven Days

Jacksonville—The Jacksonville museum will remain open seven days a week from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. starting tomorrow, March 1. It has been closed Mondays and open from noon until 4 p.m. the rest of the week. Part of the Peter Britt collection is now on display at the museum including eight displays of pictures taken with one of the cameras he used. Three of Britt's paintings, including two scenes of pioneer Jacksonville, and the Britt piano are on display on the second floor of the museum. The piano is a large Steinway grand made about 1883. A picture gallery to hold Britt's photographs of pioneer Oregon, photographic equipment and other pictures will be arranged soon in the museum's south wing, according to Miss Mary Hanley, museum curator. Four wedding gowns and an evening dress, all made between 1850 and 1890, have been placed on display.

## Urban Planning Okayed For Three Communities

Washington—(U.P.)—The Urban Renewal Development Administration today approved a federal grant of \$9,000 for urban planning in three Oregon communities—Albany, Forest Grove and Sweet Home. JUST IN TIME Limington, Me.—(U.P.)—Largely through the help of Arthur Libby, a new medical center was opened in this doctorless town. ## Negroes Use White Rail Station Door Without Being Challenged

Florence, S. C.—(U.P.)—Negroes swarmed into a previously segregated railroad waiting room entrance without challenge Tuesday night after authorities refused to press charges against the arrested leader. Clarence Mitchell of Washington, D. C., a director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said after winning his case, "I hope this means the end of segregation in Florence." Arrest Protested But before Mitchell demonstrated his victory with the help of 50 other Negroes late Tues-

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day night his arrest was protested in Washington by Rep. Charles C. Diggs Jr., (D-Mich.), one of three Negro House members. Diggs wired President Eisenhower and Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr. that the arrest was "part of a developing pattern of terror tactics" in the South. Diggs also sent a telegram to Interstate Commerce Commissioner J. Monroe Johnson stating "this arrogant defiance of your regulations demands immediate investigation and appropriate action." The ICC ordered segregation of interstate travelers ended effective last Jan. 10. Mitchell and the Rev. Horace Sharper, Negro Baptist minister of Sumter, S. C., were arrested.

## Oregon Corporations In Stock Transaction

Portland—(U.P.)—Officials of two of Oregon's largest corporations were scheduled to meet in San Francisco tomorrow to put their signatures to a stock option transaction involving more than \$100,000,000. Coos Bay Lumber Co. and Dant and Russell, Inc., lumber and shipping firm, were reported to have already reached tentative agreement to option the shares of principal stockholders to the Blyth and Co. investment firm. Blyth has until June 28 to decide whether to accept the stock. An official of the firm denied that his house was acting for a fourth party and said "if we buy Dant and Russell and the Coos Bay Lumber company stock we'll buy it for ourselves."

## Mrs. Paul Patterson To Move To Portland

Salem—(U.P.)—Mrs. Paul Patterson, widow of the late governor, will move to the Portland area Thursday from her home here which served as the governor's mansion for three years. Mrs. Patterson will live in Cedar Hills, west of Portland. Her daughter now resides in Oswego.

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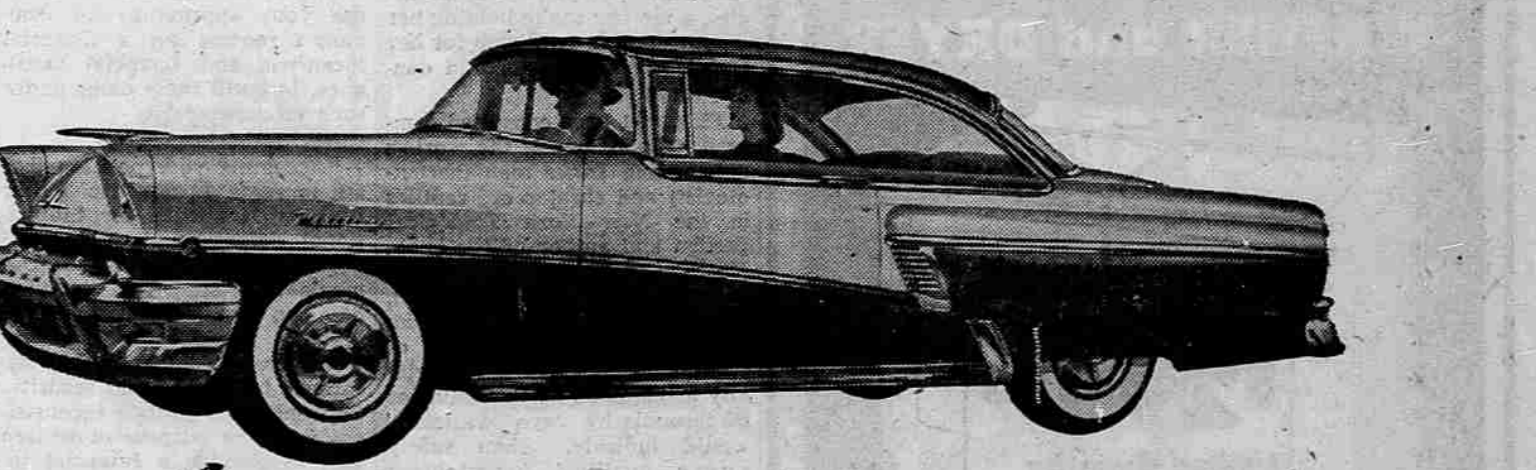
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
