Mental Health Act Funds Discussed Here

Dr. A. E. Merkel, county health officer, and two physicians from the state board of health met yesterday with the county court to discuss federal mental health act funds for Jackson county. Here from Salem were Dr. Gordon Edwards, director of medical services for the state board, and Dr. Richard Wilcox, director of local services. The \$2,500 received by the county last year supported the Jackson county child guidance clinic, aided follow-up care of patients discharged from the mental hospital, and promoted health education in community groups. The state board also supplies the services of Dr. John Waterman, psychiatrist, two days each month for work with the clinic, seminars with local physicians, and instruction for a county extension class for teachers. Dr. Merkel said the county is making application for \$2,500 again this year.

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Curvy Marilyn Monroe has square with the law today.

More than 15 months after she first was cited on Nov. 21, 1949, for three traffic violations, the blonde actress appeared in Beverly Hills Municipal Court Wednesday before Judge Charles J. Griffin. The appearance cost her \$56 in fines.

Miss Monroe, wearing a high-necked, clinging black dress, sat nervously as the judge read off details of the case of "The People vs. Marilyn DiMaggio."

She was charged with driving without an operator's license, driving when her license had expired, driving too slowly and failing to appear after a citation was issued.

Miss Monroe, greeted by 21 photographers outside the courtroom, pleaded guilty to all counts.

Teamsters Union Faces Ouster Threat

Washington — (U.P.) — The giant International Teamsters Union today faced a veiled threat of being ousted from the AFL-CIO.

The threat was posed by AFL-CIO President George Meany who announced yesterday he is investigating the Teamsters' alliance with the East Coast Longshoremen's Union.

The union, the International Longshoremen's Association, was kicked out of the AFL in 1953 as rickety ridden after an investigation of the New York docks by the state Crime Commission.

Under Meany, the old AFL and now the AFL-CIO have been trying to replace the ILA with a new longshore union ever since.

Smith Urges Strong GOP Candidate List

Gold Beach — (U.P.) — Gov. Elmo Smith urged here last night that the Republican party present strong candidates for every position at every level of government, county, district and state, as a means of carrying the party to victory in Oregon.

The governor spoke before a meeting of Curry county Republicans. He had appeared before a luncheon group in Coos Bay at noon.

Speaking on what he termed "grass roots Republicanism," Gov. Smith stressed the necessity for local precinct organization and the great importance of individual effort in every community in the state, regardless of its size.

Texas Couple Visits All 48 State Capitals

Shamrock, Tex. — (U.P.) — When Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Hill of Shamrock visited Carson City, Nev., recently, they finished a program of visiting the capitals of all 48 states.

The couple first visited a state capital when they went to Austin, Tex., in 1919. But it wasn't until 1945 that they consciously began to visit state capitals with the idea of seeing them all.

"We suddenly realized in 1945 that we had been to more than half of the state capitals," Hill said. "So we decided to see if we could make it to the others."

In 1953 the Hills made a zig-zag tour of the East and visited capitals in that area. That left only three to go—North Dakota, California and Nevada. The following year they traveled 1,050 miles to Bismarck, N. D., last fall they journeyed to Sacramento, then they wound up the skein with the visit to Carson City.
