Tombstone Located In Used Car Trunk

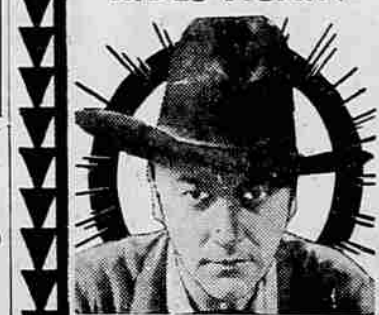
Bismarck, N.D.—(U.P.)—Police were checking up on a tombstone thief today.
