The Medical Roundup

ACNE ROSACEA. Many persons wonder what they can do about an acne rosacea reddened area on the nose, spreading out onto the cheeks. The y wonder why, after going to many skin specialists, they still have their trouble. One woman who has had the disease for years says that the only time she got relief was when she was in a foreign land away from her usual job, and having to walk a good deal. At that time an anti-histaminic drug helped her but when she got back home it didn't help any more. Now, nothing helps.

Rosacea is a disease of the middle part of the face and mainly of the nose. At first there may be a simple redness, but later little papules or pustules may form, and the blood vessels in the skin may enlarge. Sometimes the lids become inflamed a bit, and sometimes the nose becomes a bit bulbous and enlarged. It is known that there are decided nervous factors. I remember a woman who developed the disease when her husband left her. Some skin specialists try restriction of diet and interdict the drinking of alcohol. Some salves can at times be helpful, and occasionally some x-ray treatment helps. A few physicians give ovarian hormones but others doubt if these do any good. Sometimes it helps much if the patient can adjust better to some unhappiness or worry.

Mixed Tumor of the Parotid Gland. Some persons write describing a nodular tumor which, they say, has been growing very slowly under the angle of the jaw near one ear. One man says the tumor is now as big as half an orange and he is getting worried. But still he does not want to be operated on, and so he refuses when his wife and daughter try to drag him to a surgeon. His action has been most un-

wise because if the tumor is what I think it is, it is what we doctors call a mixed tumor of the parotid gland. Since this is somewhat cancerous in nature it can keep growing until it kills the victim. Long ago he should have had it removed, and thoroughly removed, by an expert surgeon. The parotid gland supplies much of the saliva that runs into the mouth. All persons, and particularly persons past middle-age, should know that almost any tumor that appears anywhere should be examined quickly by an expert. Among a few exceptions are the smooth ovoid wens that grow in the skin, often around the back of the neck or head. They are like a huge blackhead, filled with a greasy substance. Other harmless tumors are lipomas, little ovoid lumps of fat which slip around slightly just under the skin. Often a person will have a dozen or so of these lumps in various parts of his

body. They do not have to be removed unless one gets big enough to be a nuisance. Another usually harmless tumor is a tiny dome of bone that appears on the skull, and another is the little "ganglion" attached to a tendon sheath on the back of the wrist. When a person finds a tumor growing anywhere he or she should quickly show it to a physician to find out if it is a cancer or likely to grow into one. Sometimes, in cases of doubt, the physician will make what is called a biopsy. He will cut out a small piece of the tumor, and will have it examined under the microscope by an expert pathologist. Hepatitis and Rest in Bed. A recent extensive report on hepatitis, made by Capt. Thomas C. Chalmers and others of the U.S. Army show that after the first stage, it does no good to keep the patient in bed. He might as well get up and go back to work. In the Army, the total duration of disability of a soldier with hepatitis was usually a little more than 80 days. Von Recklinghausen's Disease. Some persons have asked, what is von Recklinghausen's disease? I imagine they are referring to the disease in which the skin is covered with a number of little soft masses, some as big as the end of the little finger; others smaller. A few people have their face covered with these nodules. Usually, these little lumps remain unchanged throughout the person's life. They arise in nervous tissue. We doctors have come a vague idea why they come, and so far as I know, there is nothing that can be done about them. Occasionally, I have seen persons who said that some of the lesions became painful.
