2 KF Players Round Out First Five

Bob Tisdell, high scoring ball-hawk of the Medford high school Black Tornado, and Glenn Moore, elongated sophomore sensation of the Klamath Falls Pelicans, were the top choices in the 1935 Medford Mail Tribune All-Southern Oregon conference basketball poll.

They were unanimous selections on an all-star first string composed of three players from the conference champion Medford quintet and two from the runner-up Klamath Falls aggregation.

Phil Sword, Ashland, and Lloyd Cearley and John Foust, the remaining members of the top six of the Medford squad, received honorable mention.

Coaches of the four member schools and one sportscaster and one sportswriter from each of the conference cities participated in the poll with two points given for each first team vote and one point for a second team selection.

The poll was conducted and the ballots tabulated by the Mail Tribune sports department. Moore and Tisdell got 24 points apiece as the first team pick of all participants in the poll.

While the 1935 all-league first quintet was an all senior lineup, only two seniors, Tisdell and Taucher, are on this year's team.

Parent is the only all-star repeater. He has been named to the second team three consecutive years.

Exact team position was disregarded in voting for the all-stars but the first five has its standard allotment of two forwards, Copple and McLaughlin; a center, Moore, and two guards, Taucher and Tisdell.

Coaches voting were Frank Roelandt, Medford; Don Peterson, Klamath Falls; Al Simpson, Ashland, and Ray Davis, Grants Pass. Sportswriters participating were George Curtis, Grants Pass Daily Courier; Clay Hanon, Klamath Herald and News; Glen Prescott, Ashland Daily Tidings, and Dick Jewett, Medford Mail Tribune.

Kip Explains His Remarks On Violation

Portland — (U.P.) — Kip Taylor, former football coach at Oregon State, yesterday explained that some comments he made Saturday night may not have been taken in exactly the right light.

While addressing the Portland Bowling association captain-sponsoring banquet, Taylor said that he knew of an incident at Oregon State where the Pacific Coast conference code on paying athletes had been violated.

Immediately the statement was taken as pointing out flagrant violations of the PCC athletic policy by the Beavers — until Taylor hastened to point out that it was just the opposite idea that he was trying to put across.

Yesterday Taylor said the one instance he mentioned, "was the only violation I knew of in my six years as Oregon State coach, and Oregon State is one of the cleanest institutions with which I have been associated."

He said that as soon as the single violation came to light, immediate action was taken by the school to rectify the situation.

"I cited that case to show how clean the school actually was athletics-wise."

The MAC girls rang up 86 points with Santa Clara, Calif., Swim club second with 58 and the Los Angeles Athletic club third with 47.

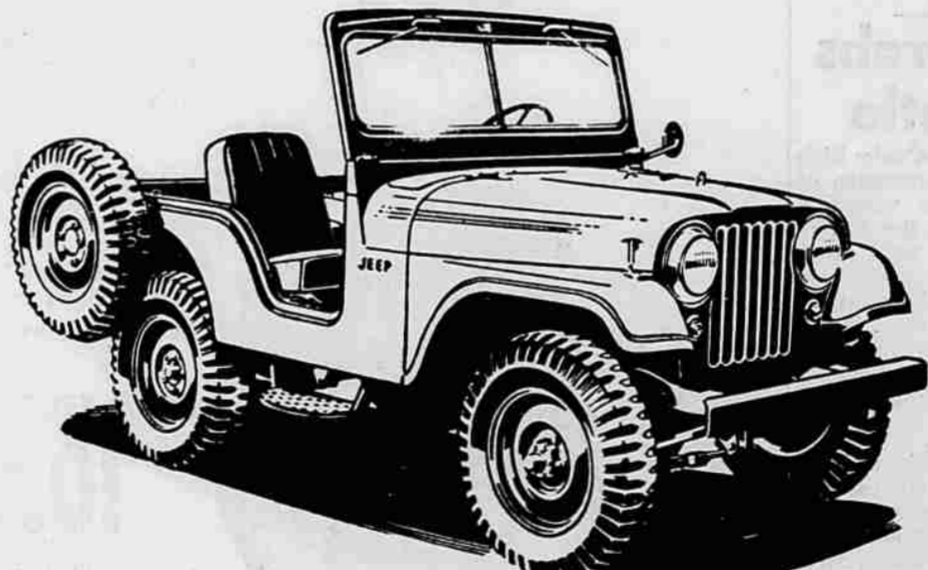
INKS WITH INDIANS
