

## USF Yapping About Ducat Allotment

San Francisco—(U.P.)—A row shaped up today between the University of San Francisco and Oregon State in the wake of a protest by the Dons over the allotment of tickets for next week's NCAA basketball tournament eliminations at Corvallis, Ore.

Father Ralph Tichenor, USF's athletic moderator, charged that Oregon State—which is the host school—had displayed a "lack of objectivity" in spotting 350 of the USF rooters' 500 seats behind a basket.

USF officials agreed that the other 350 were on the sidelines but near the end of the floor while UCLA and Utah had been assigned to center sections.

"We will ask NCAA headquarters to give serious thought to the possibility of other sites for future Western regional tournaments," Father Tichenor declared.

The USF office said that Oregon State defended the seating on grounds that the Dons had asked a greater allotment than any other school and it was the only way to keep the tickets in a block.

Corvallis—(U.P.)—Jim Barratt, athletic business manager at Oregon State and director of the upcoming regional NCAA basketball tournament here, fired back today to a San Francisco University protest about allotment of tickets for next week's event.

He said San Francisco had more tickets than any of the other participating teams. And he added that there are "no terrible seats in Gill Coliseum." Barratt said that San Francisco, "like all other participating schools in the tournament, received 150 tickets along the sidelines with the remainder located in the lower balcony along the end zones." He said that UCLA had only 250 tickets, Utah 400 and either Seattle or Idaho State 400.

One of Best He said there were no posts to obstruct vision of the playing floor and the building, which seats some 11,000, was acknowledged as one of the best in the nation. He said the only seats that could be called bad were those located high in the corners and that USF had none of those.

Barratt said allocations were limited to from 250 to 500 because in the past large blocs of tickets were turned back by participating schools at the last minute after complete sell-outs had been announced to fans seeking tickets.

Barratt said "Our tournament officials feel, after last year's NCAA playoff, that USF's student body was the poorest supervised group ever to follow a team to Gill Coliseum. Although I do not believe in fighting battles in the newspapers, I have to take issue to Father (Ralph) Tichenor's protest."

## Oregon, Oregon State Mix In Conference Concluders

University of Oregon—Oregon's 1956 basketball team ends the season this week end with the annual home-and-home series against Oregon State with the first game set for McArthur Court Friday night and the second taking place at Corvallis Saturday evening.

Coach Bill Borchers' Ducks have undisputed possession of sixth place in the PCC standings, the Chancellor's trophy and an even overall season at stake in the two games. The Ducks (5-9) can take sixth place with only one win from the Beavers (3-11), but could end in a tie by losing both.

The Chancellor's trophy goes each year to the team winning the most games and the Ducks already have one leg on the 1956 series as the result of a 57-46 win over OSC last December. A split in the series would bring the Trophy back to Eugene. The sweep would improve Oregon's total season record to 13-13 and make the second straight year the Webfoots have ended the 26-game campaign even.

**End Careers** The series will also end the varsity careers of three Webfoot players and all are expected to start in the final series. Co-Capt. Max Anderson and Jerry Ross will open at center and guard with Ray Bell starting at one forward spot. Charlie Franklin, a sophomore, will open along with Bell and either Phil McHugh or Wimp Hastings will team with Ross. Hal Duffy, the sophomore post man, is also expected to see considerable action as the result of his improvement in the past two series.

Coach Jerry Frie's freshman team will also conclude its season this week end with a pair of games against the Oregon State Rooks. The Ducklings will again be without the services of their top scorer, Bud Kuykendall, who is out for the season with a broken ankle.

**By UNITED PRESS** The race for the title may be over in the Pacific Coast Conference but the fireworks that always decorate the tag-end of the season are sure to be around when the loop bows out for the year this week end. Only team in the nine-team loop that has the year behind it is Washington.
