Presbyterians Will Honor Girls Groups

Girl Scouts and Camp Fire Girls will be honored at both Sunday morning services at First Presbyterian church. The services will open observances for Girl Scout week and celebrate the 44th anniversary of the organization of Girl Scouting. The girls will be seated together.

Dr. D. Kirkland West will speak on the theme, "The Cost of the Cross." This is one of a series of sermons leading up to Holy week and Easter. The Junior choir will sing a number under direction of Miss Janet Jamison, and will be accompanied by Miss Mira Frohnmayer. The Chancel and Westminster choirs will also furnish anthems under leadership of Allan Lehl.

About 40 new members will be received into the church at a service Sunday afternoon with the session. The candidates have been attending churchmanship and communicant's classes taught over the past weeks by Dr. West and the Rev. John Reynolds. The sacrament of baptism will be given to many of the new members at that time, and on the following Sunday they will be welcomed publicly into the church at the second service.

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The Rev. William H. Lavelly To Be Lenten Sunday Evening Speaker



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The Rev. William H. Lavelly, minister of Trinity Methodist church, Toledo, Ore., will be the Lenten Sunday evening speaker at the First Methodist church Sunday, March 11, at 7:30 p.m.

The Rev. Mr. Lavelly is a graduate of Boston University School of Theology and came to Oregon after serving pastorate in Sioux City, Neb. He will be introduced by Dr. Raymond E. Balcomb.

The McLoughlin Junior High school chorus under direction of Ray Lewis and accompanied by Melody Pierce, will sing.

An informal coffee hour will follow in the fellowship hall of the church.

Dr. Balcomb will continue his series of sermons dealing with stories about Jesus when he preaches at 9:30 and 11 a.m., on "His Coming Again." The Youth choir, under direction of Mrs. George Sloniger and the Chancel choir, under direction of Mrs. C. R. Adamson will sing. Dr. G. A. Dierdorff will be soloist for both services.

The fund was founded Oct. 29, 1949, and during the six succeeding years has done much toward feeding the hungry, clothing the destitute, aiding refugees, sheltering the homeless, and bringing relief to disaster victims.

Calls from 42 countries have been answered with 1,390,713 pounds of clothing and bedding, tons of food, and thousands of food packages.

Last year, almost a quarter-million pounds of clothing and bedding were distributed at home and abroad.

On the local scene, clothing and bedding were dispatched to Yuba City during the devastating flood in that area, and other material was turned over to the Red Cross for local distribution.

The Dorcas Welfare society is the backbone of this relief program. Mrs. A. J. Miracle, Medford Dorcas leader, stresses the local need and extends an urgent appeal to valley residents for any such material.

Members of the First Baptist church will hold a reception for the Rev. and Mrs. Haddon Robinson in the church basement at 7 p.m. on Friday.

A covered dish supper will be served by women of the church, and music for the occasion will be provided by the young people's department. The Rev. The Rev. Raymond Hurn, pastor of the Medford church of the Nazarenes, and the Rev. Glenn Wade, pastor of the Berean Baptist church of White City, will represent local pastors. Don Minear will speak for the board of deacons, and Mrs. Larry Adams will give a greeting from the deaconesses of the Medford church.

The Rev. Mr. Robinson came to the First Baptist church in February to assist in the Christian education and young people's work. He and his wife and their 10-month-old daughter, Vicki Ann, live at 223 King st.

On Saturday following the reception, the Rev. Mr. Robinson will travel to Texas to conduct a series of evangelistic meetings in the Lake Highland Baptist church in Dallas.

The Rev. James W. Neely is pastor of the local church.

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Christian Scientists Schedule First Service at New Church

The first services in Medford's new First Church of Christ, Scientist, will be held Sunday, March 11.

The new building, located at the corner of Oakwood and Windsor avenues, was completed this week after a construction period of seven months. It is of contemporary design. Ben H.

Todd was the architect, and the builder was the Minshall Construction company. Electric work was done by Trowbridge and Flynn and the furnace and plumbing by Modern Plumbing

and the Crane company. Services will be at 11 a.m. and at 4 p.m., with Sunday school at 11 a.m.

The main auditorium and foyer are finished in lima wood. The Sunday school room is paneled in mellow-toned fir, and the remaining rooms are painted in soft colors. The auditorium has a seating capacity of about 400, including the main floor and balcony. The Sunday school has several classrooms and a nursery.

The structure is wired for a public address system for use during Christian Science lectures, which will be held there from time to time.

The old Christian Science structure was at 212 North Oakdale ave., which the congregation occupied for some 30 years. It was outgrown and since there was no suitable outlook for expansion, the property was sold to the neighboring St. Mark's Episcopal church in October, 1954.

Off-Street Parking The membership decided to buy a lot outside of the congested downtown area, and the present 3½-acre site was purchased, allowing ample room for the building, for off-street parking and for expansion.

Landscaping of the site and enlargement of the present parking area will be completed later in the spring.

Protestant Heads Off for Moscow

New York—(U.P.)—Nine Protestant leaders leave today for an 11-day visit in Moscow to strengthen the "spiritual fellowship" between Christian leaders of the United States and Soviet Russia.

The delegation, sponsored by the National Council of Churches and headed by its president, Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, was scheduled to depart from New York International Airport this afternoon on a KLM Royal Dutch airliner and arrive in the Russian capital "in time for church on Sunday."

The group will be guests of Patriarch Alexei of the Russian Orthodox Church but will meet also with representatives of other Protestant churches. A Russian church delegation will return the visit, coming to the United States in June.

The delegation of U.S. ministers and laymen is the first so broadly representative of American Protestantism to visit the Soviet Union.

With Russian church leaders they have agreed to an agenda for discussion which will include such topics as the roles of the churches in the two countries in promoting world peace, the freedom of the churches, Christian theology and education, and the relations between churches in the two nations.

Unitarians Visit Grants Pass Group

The Unitarian fellowship of Medford and Ashland will visit the Grants Pass Unitarian fellowship this evening.

The Grants Pass group was organized in 1951 and conducts a Sunday school in addition to adult meetings.

The joint Unitarian meeting tonight will have "Semantics" as topic for discussion.
