Girl Scout Birthday Week Opens Today

To observe the 44th anniversary of the founding of the Girl Scout movement, Girl Scout week will be celebrated throughout the United States from March 11 to March 17. Juliette Low founded the organization in Savannah, Ga., March 12, 1912.

More than a thousand girls and 195 adult volunteers in the Medford district will join over 2,500,000 girl members and more than 600,000 adult leaders in small towns, cities and in U.S. military installations overseas, in the birthday celebration.

Girl scouting in the Medford district has grown from one troop organized in 1927 to 86 troops today. The troops will be celebrating their 29th year in Medford. The Rogue Valley Area council now has a membership of 2200 girls and 450 adult volunteers in Josephine and Jackson counties. Troops are active in Ashland, Talent, Phoenix, Central Point, Jacksonville, Medford, Rogue River, Wimer, Kerby, O'Brien, Cave Junction, Shady Cove and Grants Pass.

Theme of Girl Scout week is "Believe, Belong and Build." All members of the organization believe in the Girl Scout Promise, which makes girls want to help other people; they belong, regardless of race or creed; and they build knowledge of the world for a better future for all.

The seven service days of Girl Scout week each have a special meaning for members of Brownie, Intermediate and Senior troops. Today the girls will worship in churches of their choice, and some troops will attend services together where they will hear special mention of Girl Scout Sunday. Monday, March 12, the troops that hold meetings will have special birthday celebrations in honor of their founder, Mrs. Low. Tuesday is Citizenship day; Wednesday, Health and Safety days; Thursday, International Friendship day; Friday, Arts and Crafts day; and Saturday is Out-of-Doors day.

Several neighborhoods in the Medford district, which are made up of many troops in one school, will have window displays which feature the various fields of interest of the Girl Scout and Brownie programs. Troop 72, Lincoln school, will have a display "Birds in Natural Habitat" at Purucker's Music store showing the work Intermediate scouts have been doing on the Bird badge.

Troop 85, St. Mary's, will display copper plaques at the office of Dr. Frank Freeburger. Roosevelt neighborhood has planned a display at Medford Flower shop featuring the story of the annual Girl Scout cookie sale. An international friendship field display of dolls at Dykes Floor Covering store will be arranged by Washington troop 36. Jackson Neighborhood has chosen an Americana theme, "United States, the Melting Pot of the World," for a display which will be located at Mann's store. Hedrick Junior High school Neighborhood will arrange a display on the good grooming badge at Acme hardware and Griffin Creek Neighborhood plans are on the arts and crafts field at S. C. Jones and Sons Insurance company.

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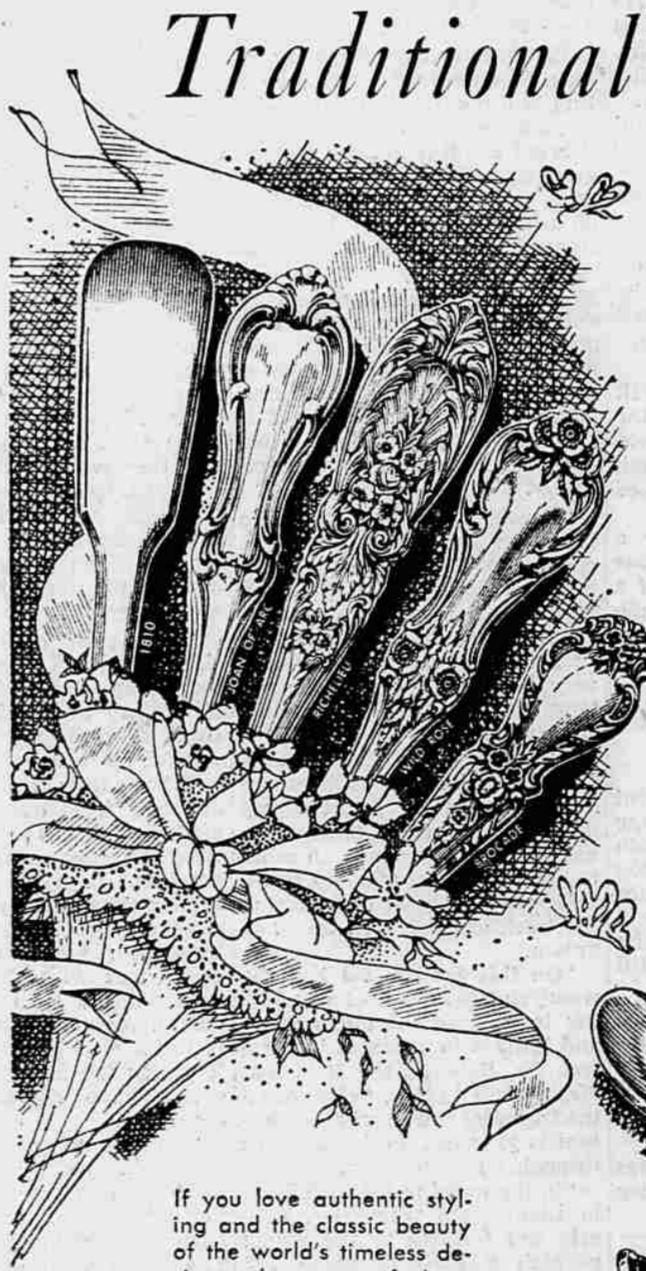


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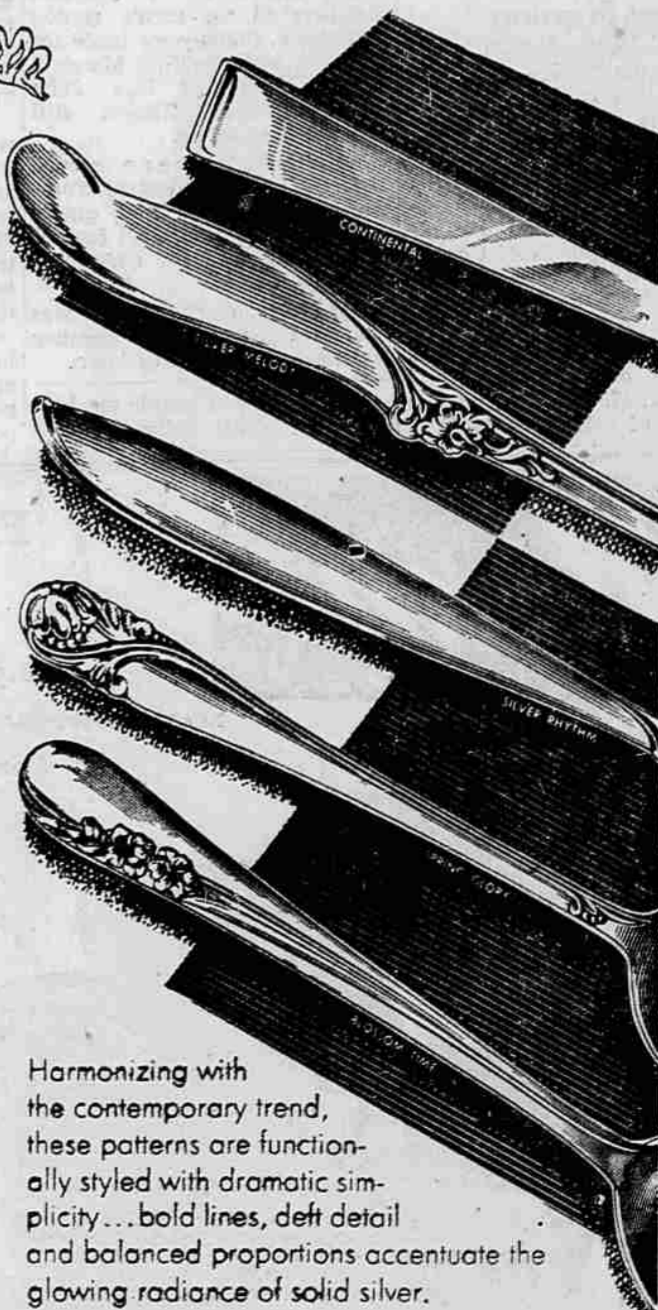
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
